This year, the pastor received several boxes of literature and Bibles in the Arabic language to distribute, most of which was developed or translated by the Arabic Literature Committee for the Church of the Nazarene. The church provides worship services and a number of small group meetings—all in Arabic. Give thanks to God that the gospel is being shared through the Church of the Nazarene, providing that the good news of the gospel and the deep truths of holiness are being thoughtfully translated and generously shared from region to region, providing people with hope, love, and community. ## HEALED TO SERVE

Thirty years ago in Papua New Guinea, 11-year-old Masa was in the middle of a fight between enemy families. Although he did not belong to either group, he was severely injured. A Christian man carried Masa to Kudjip Nazarene Hospital. In addition to saving Masa's life, the hospital chaplains and staff shared the Good News of God's love with Masa. The young man made the decision to follow Christ and, as he got older, began lay preaching. In October of last year, after years of study, Masa was ordained as a pastor in the Church of the Nazarene. Today, Masa pastors a church in an area known for heavy tribal fighting. Give thanks that the young boy, who was at the wrong place at the wrong time, is now a man with hope for the future and a new purpose: to help guide others toward salvation.

## CHURCH PLANTING

### STUCK

The pastor sat quietly, pondering the reality of the report he held in his hand. More members had left the church in recent weeks and giving was at an all-time low. The board was demanding an impromptu meeting with him and he sat blankly with no answers. The pastor couldn't quite figure it out, while it was nearly 20 years ago, it seemed like just yesterday that the church was alive and thriving. He remembered when the Holy Spirit would move mightily through the services, when people were getting saved, and when baptisms were a regular occurrence. The pastor wondered, "How can you have so much life in one season and in the next feel so...STUCK?"

That seems to be the question many people are asking these days; "Why do so many churches get stuck?" I believe churches often get stuck for several reasons, but there are three that I find to be the most critical.

**CONFUSION OF VISION & STRATEGY:** Vision is simply having a destination for the church. Once a destination is set, then the strategy by which the church gets there is developed. This is no small task, it takes great work to seek a vision from the Lord and even greater effort to gain unity with everyone on board. The lack of vision causes the church to wander around in circles frustrated and quarreling about direction until ultimately everything just stops. It makes sense when the Proverb says, "Without vision, the people perish" (Proverbs 29:18).

**IDENTITY CRISIS:** As followers of Christ, our identity is found in being children of God (1 John 3:1). From our identity flows our purpose as the Holy Spirit gifts us and leads us in His will. The church experiences a type of identity crisis when what we do has become the identifier of who we are rather than knowing who we are determining everything we do. When we spend more energy defending our traditions rather than seeking obedience to the movement of God, we will be sure to find ourselves in a crisis soon after.

**LOSS OF MISSION:** On the foundation that He is the son of the Living God and the Savior of the world, Jesus said, "I will build my church!" With this truth as the bedrock of our faith, He commissioned His followers to continue the mission and make disciples of all nations. As followers of Christ, the commission is still true for us today. There is no task that supersedes the call to evangelize the world, while continually and progressively making disciples. The loss of this mission causes the church to lose its focus and ultimately lose its way as the body of Jesus.

As peculiar as it may sound, the remedy to all three of these issues are found in one single answer: Church Planting.

Planting a new church focuses the vision and strategy of the existing church. It causes us to remember that more churches was God's plan all along and if our identity really is as God's children, it will lead us to obedience to God's plan. Planting a new church also keeps us on mission, because new churches are the greatest means of evangelism and discipleship that exists in the world today.

So, take a quick evaluation of your church. Are you stuck? It might be because of confusion, crisis, and loss of mission, but the fastest way to get unstuck is to plant a new church. Statistically speaking, nothing brings greater health and life to the existing church faster than planting a new church. Make plans to get unstuck today!
