We are grateful to the Lord for the privilege to serve as Missionaries in the Church of the Nazarene. Our children are doing well. Nomsa and Daniel are now based in Zimbabwe where they are continuing with their studies. Panashe, our last born son is doing high schooling and doing well after disruptions to his schooling due to ill health. He is now well recovered and back on track with his studies.

I continue to travel around Africa coordinating Compassionate work and supporting local churches in community initiatives that empower the poor and those living on the margins of society.

We are currently responding the devastation caused by Cyclone Idai which has destroyed properties and caused many deaths in Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Malawi. A number of Nazarene church buildings in Malawi and Mozambique were destroyed by the floods and we are coordinating relief



response to help with those affected.

We are also working with the leaders in Democratic Republic of Congo to find ways of responding to the Ebola crisis as this continues to affect many people in remote villages where there is also rebel activities making the areas hard to access.

We are asking for prayers and support for these needs, particularly the flood response initiative that the church, through NCM, is putting together. There is great need for blankets, food and tents for shelters for those whose properties were destroyed.

Pray for a successful Conservation Agriculture Workshop to take place in Dakar, Senegal, from the 25th to the 30th of March. I will be facilitating the workshop together with other key leaders.

Pray for us as we place ourselves in areas that are affected by so many needs and pray for the NCM team as they serve with us.
