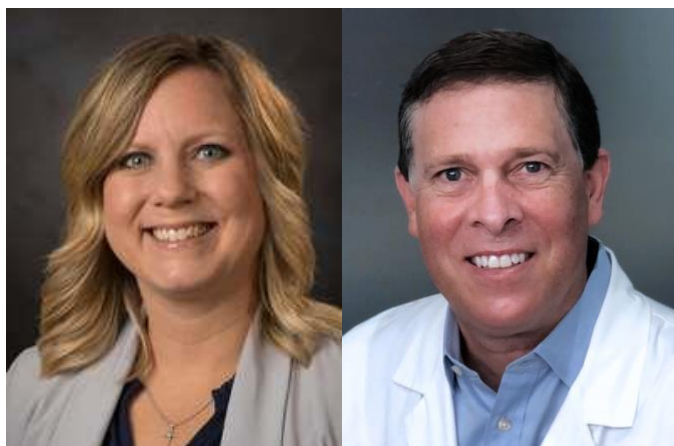




Announcement Kern Institute Announces the 2021 Kern Scholars

Dr. Green is an Assistant Professor of Emergency Medicine and became faculty at MCW in 2017. She serves as the Assistant Dean for Clinical Learning at MCW–Green Bay, wherein she oversees the early clinical courses, clerkships and OSCEs. Dr. Green has played a significant role in curricular enhancement and faculty development at MCW–Green Bay and has served as a course director, faculty facilitator, and academic mentor. Dr. Green is a graduate of the Kern Institute's KINETIC³ faculty development program (2019) and is now an instructor in the program. She will be pursuing a Master's in Health Professions Education at NYU Langone, which is the U.S. site of the University of Maastricht, School of Health Professions Education program. She is specifically interested in advancing her understanding of adult learning theory and evidence-based educational practice and advancing educational scholarship.

Dr. Marks is a Professor of Medicine and Radiology and has been at the Medical College of Wisconsin since 2000. He currently serves as the Vice Chair for Clinical Affairs in the Department of Medicine and has held several operational

and administrative leadership roles at MCW & Froedtert Hospital, as well as with Medical College Physicians. Dr. Marks is a coach in the Kern Institute's 4C coaching program (coaching for character, caring, and competence). He will be pursuing a Master's of Arts in Character Education at the Jubilee Center for Character and Virtues at the University of Birmingham, and has an interest in the incorporation of character in leadership in academic medicine and character development in physicians and students in this new era of digital medicine and artificial intelligence.
