## **WORSHIP NOTES**

### **Prelude**

Heathcote Statham was a British organist, conductor, and composer who studied at the Royal College of Music under Sir Walter Parratt (1841-1924). He was organist at Calcutta Cathedral (1913), St Michael's Tenbury (1920), Southampton Parish Church (1928), and Norwich Cathedral (1928-1966). Fantasia on 'Veni Emmanuel' comes from the first book (of six) of Festal Voluntaries published by Novello in 1956. The use of the word "festal" likely means "significant," rather than "triumphant." The composers in the series are mostly of the cathedral organist type, such as Statham, William Harris, Francis Jackson, etc. The familiar melody is contained within flowing lines of music that have an air of drama and mysticism about them. Eventually, these flowing lines take over, and the tune becomes completely obscured. However, after a brief pause, the refrain is stated once more in a churchly manor on the Swell diapason.

### **Offertory**

Craig Courtney is an American composer and musician who earned both bachelor's and master's degrees in piano performance from the University of Cincinnati College-Conservatory of Music. His output of sacred music includes over one hundred and sixty choral octavos and eight vocal collections. The text of this Advent hymn dates back all the way to the fourth century, during a time when there was an intense theological controversy as to whether Christ was truly God. The plainsong melody is from an eleventh-century vocal embellishment or trope on the word "Sanctus." This setting sets each of the three stanzas differently: the first is without accompaniment (*a cappella*), the second includes light piano accompaniment, and the third features the melody in canon between voice and piano.
