### The Word, read & proclaimed

Genesis 28:10-19a

Jacob left Beer-sheba and set out for Haran.

He came to a certain place and stayed there for the night, because the sun had set. Taking one of the stones of the place, he put it under his head and lay down in that place. And he dreamed that there was a ladder set up on the earth, the top of it reaching to heaven; and the angels of God were ascending and descending on it.

And the LORD stood beside him and said, "I am the LORD, the God of Abraham your father and the God of Isaac; the land on which you lie I will give to you and to your offspring; and your offspring shall be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north and to the south; and all the families of the earth shall be blessed in you and in your offspring. Know that I am with you and will keep you wherever you go, and will bring you back to this land; for I will not leave you until I have done what I have promised you."

Then Jacob woke from his sleep and said, "Surely the LORD is in this place—and I did not know it!" And he was afraid, and said, "How awesome is this place! This is none other than the house of God, and this is the gate of heaven."

The Nicene Creed

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# Worship Notes

### Prelude

Ruth Watson Henderson has developed a reputation as one of Canada's leading composers. Known especially as a composer of choral works, she has done much to promote the artistry of children through her wealth of compositions for treble voices. Celebration was chosen by the Annual Festival

of New Organ Music in London, England as the winning piece in a competition to honor the Royal Canadian College of Organist's centennial in 2009. It was premiered at the opening of an organ recital on the Harrison and Harrison organ in Westminster Abbey. The use of many dotted rhythms and fast-moving sixteenth notes gives the impression of an extended fanfare.

#### Hymn

William Williams (1717-1791), the author of this hymn, began writing hymns as a Welsh Calvinist-Methodist minister. The Welsh text was translated into English by his brother Peter Williams (1722-1796), who was later expelled from the church for heresy. The Exodus and the journey through the wilderness to Canaan is the basis of the hymn, with references to "Bread of heaven" (Exodus 16:4-18), "the crystal fountain" (Exodus 17:4-6), "the fire and cloudy pillar" (Exodus 13:21), and "the verge of Jordan" (Joshua 3:14-17). The reference to "death of death and hell's destruction" is to Christ (II Timothy 1:10 and Revelation 1:17-18). The tune CWM RHONDDA, by John Hughes (1873-1932), literally means Rhondda Valley, the name for a coal mining district in South Wales. It was composed for the 1907 Baptist Cymanfa Ganu (A Gathering for Song) at Pontypridd; and by 1930 it had been sung at over 3,000 such gatherings.

### Offertory

Elevation Worship, based in Charlotte, NC, is a collective of musicians and singers whose stated goal is to "create a strong, unifying worship culture to connect all people to God." They have been creating worship art and music since 2007. This particular song, "Here As In Heaven," acknowledges God's presence among the gathered body of Christ, wherever it is. The emphasis lies on God's presence in *this* place, here and now. Often we relegate God's presence and grace to significant moments of joy or need, rather than a perpetual reality that remains with us in all things. Recalling 2 Corinthians 3:17 ("Where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom.") and elements the Lord's Prayer, this song carries this critical message for believers, not unlike Jacob, on the long journey of faith.

### Flowers
