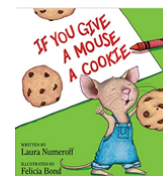

## Pre-K Recommended Books

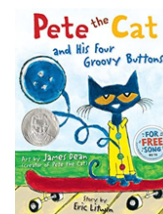
**If You Give a Mouse a Cookie** (by Laura Numeroff, hardcover)

### **There Was a Cold Lady Who Swallowed Some Snow!**

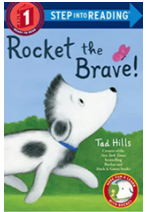
(by Lucille Colandro, paperback)

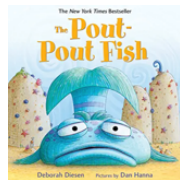
### **An Elephant & Piggie Biggie!** (by Mo Willems, hardcover)

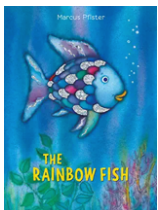
### **The Snowy Day** (by Ezra Jack Keats, paperback)

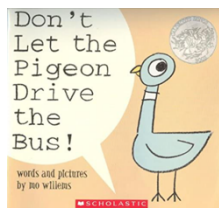
### **The Rainbow Fish** (by Marcus Pfister, board book)

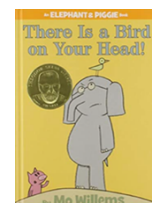
### **The Dot** (by Peter H Reynolds, hardcover)

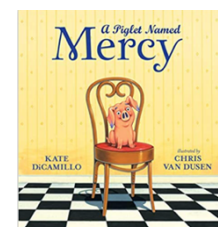
### **Ultimate Shark Rumble (Who Would Win?)** (by Jerry Pallotta, paperback)

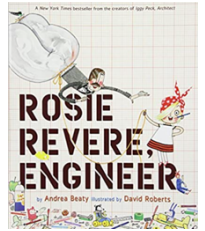




## 2nd Grade Recommended Books

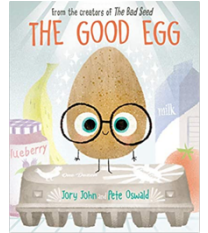
### **Rosie Revere, Engineer** (by Andrea Beaty, hardcover)

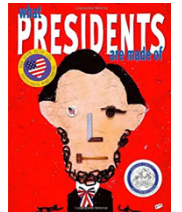
### **The Good Egg** (by Jory John, hardcover)

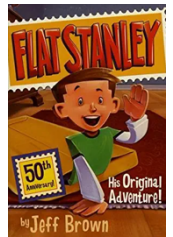
### **What Presidents Are Made Of** (by Hanoch Piven, paperback)

### **Flat Stanley: His Original Adventure!** (by Jeff Brown, paperback)

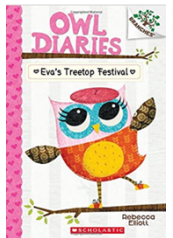

(by Rebecca Elliott, paperback)

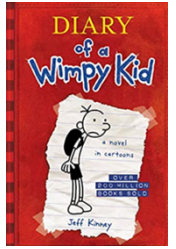

## 3rd Grade Recommended Books

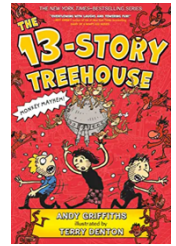
### **Diary of a Wimpy Kid** (by Jeff Kinney, hardcover)

It's a new school year, and Greg Heffley finds himself thrust into middle school, where undersized weaklings share the hallways with kids who are taller, meaner, and already shaving. The hazards of growing up before you're ready are uniquely revealed through words and drawings as Greg records them in his diary.



### **The 13-Story Treehouse: Monkey Mayhem!** (by Andy Griffiths, paperback)

Andy and Terry live in a treehouse. But it's not just any old treehouse, it's the most amazing treehouse in the world! ## 4th Grade Recommended Books

### **Restart** (by Gordon Korman, paperback)

The amazing New York Times bestseller about what you can do when life gives you a second chance. Chase's memory just went out the window. Chase doesn't remember falling off the roof. He doesn't remember hitting his head. He doesn't, in fact, remember anything. He wakes up in a hospital room and suddenly has to learn his whole life all over again . . .



### **Because of Winn-Dixie** (by Kate DiCamillo, paperback)

One summer's day, ten-year-old India Opal Buloni goes down to the local supermarket for some groceries – and comes home with a dog. But Winn-Dixie is no ordinary dog. It's because of Winn-Dixie that Opal begins to make friends. And fact, as Opal admits, just about everything that happens that summer is because of Winn-Dixie.



### **The Lightning Thief** (by Rick Riordan, hardcover)

Percy Jackson is a good kid, but he can't seem to focus on his schoolwork or control his temper. Percy could have sworn his pre-algebra teacher turned into a monster and tried to kill him. When Percy's mom finds out, she knows it's time that he knew the truth about where he came from. She sends Percy to Camp Half Blood, a summer camp for demigods (on Long Island), where he learns that the father he never knew is Poseidon.



### **Wonder** (by R. J. Palacio, hardcover)

August Pullman was born with a facial difference that, up until now, has prevented him from going to a mainstream school. Starting 5th, he wants nothing more than to be treated as an ordinary kid—but his new classmates can't get past Auggie's extraordinary face. WONDER, begins from Auggie's point of view, but soon switches to include his classmates, his sister, her boyfriend, and others.



### **Ban This Book: A Novel** (by Alan Gratz, paperback)

In Ban This Book by Alan Gratz, a fourth grader fights back when From the Mixed-Up Files of Mrs. Basil E. Frankweiler by E. L. Konigsburg is challenged by a well-meaning parent and taken off the shelves of her school library. Amy Anne is shy and soft-spoken, but don't mess with her when it comes to her favorite book in the whole world.



### **Book Scavenger** (by Jennifer Chambliss Bertman, paperback)

For twelve-year-old Emily, the best thing about moving to San Francisco is that it's the home city of her literary idol: Garrison Griswold, book publisher and creator of the online sensation Book Scavenger. Upon her arrival, however, Emily learns that Griswold has been attacked and is now in a coma, and no one knows anything about his epic new game about to launch. Racing against time, Emily and her friend James rush from clue to clue, desperate to figure out the secret at the heart of Griswold's new game.



### **Front Desk** (by Kelly Yang, paperback)
