



MODERNIZING VOTER REGISTRATION IN OHIO

A Sophisticated System for More Accurate Voter Rolls, Preventing Voter Fraud, Improving the Efficiency of Our Local Boards of Elections, and Increasing Civic Engagement

Ohio's current voter registration system is antiquated. State and federal law both require Ohio to maintain accurate voter lists. It's a responsibility that has been carried out by Republican and Democratic Secretaries of State for decades. However, it's clearer than ever that Ohio has relied upon an unsophisticated voter registration system which has become less of a tool for registering and updating voter information, and more of a political talking point. By bringing Republicans and Democrats together, we can put our best foot forward and begin to build a more modernized system that will work for Ohio.
