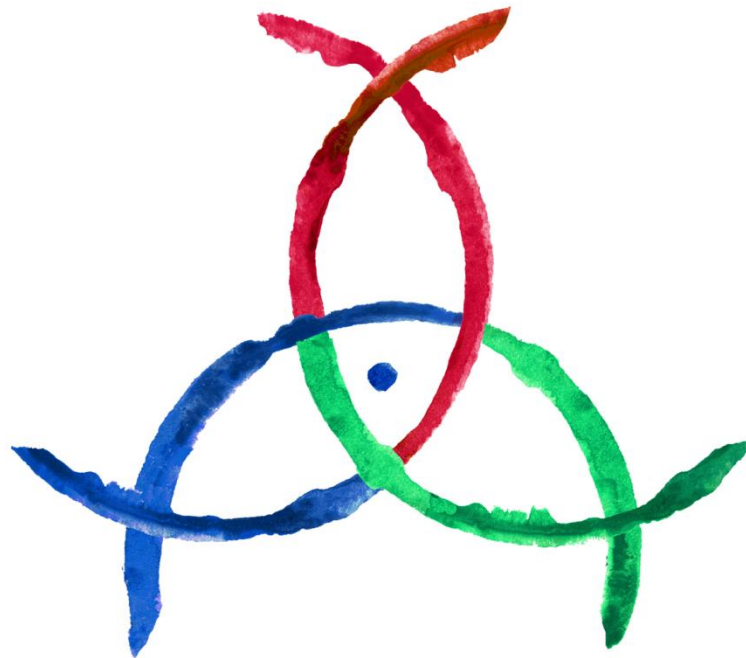

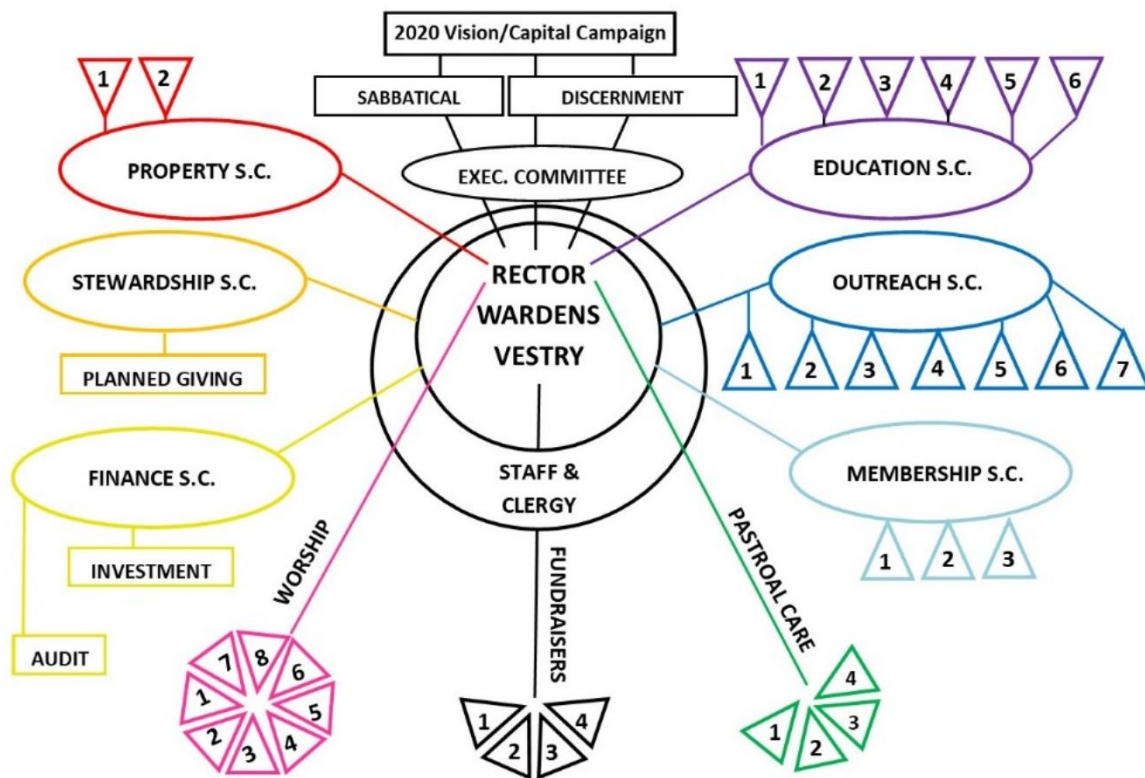

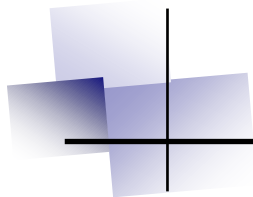

WORSHIP GROUPS

USHERS - Jim Blanchette

Membership: We currently have 17 parishioners who usher for Sunday services and special events. This past year we welcomed 2 new parishioners to be part of our committee. We did have 5 ushers who stepped down. (Thank you to all who serve the parish and community in this valuable ministry).

Mission & Purpose: Greet people as they arrive at our church, pass out bulletins, assist new or visiting people, take the offering, guide people to communion, and handle any issues that may arise during the service.

2019 Highlights: Helped usher for special services such as Evensong, Holy Day Services and Funerals.

2019 Objectives: To have ushers at all Sunday Services and special services. This past summer was very difficult to find ushers for the 8:00 service but since we changed to only one service at 9:00 it made it easier for scheduling. I am hoping that this will be the case again next summer.

Ministry Hopes for 2020: Recruit new people, especially for the 8:00 service, to usher and keep all ushers informed of any changes to our procedures. We will continue to serve and assist St. John's parishioners and newcomers at all major services.

2017-2018 Objectives met: All services were covered even during significant weather challenges.

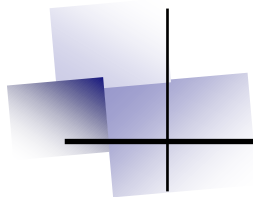

This important ministry cares for the linens and vessels necessary for Eucharists and other services at our church. We learn to do this with care and reverence, knowing that these are not everyday items, but ones set apart for use in worship. Church will happen without the altar guild, because God is where two or three gather, but having willing volunteers to serve adds to the beauty of church, so the congregation will have a respite from the world in a graceful gathered experience.

When I took over as leader almost a year ago, my first steps were organizing the sacristy and writing a new customary. The sacristy contains several items used in worship in years past, which might be reintroduced into use. For instance, women of the church made needlepoint hangings years ago, some of which can become banners; the descending dove at Pentecost has already been used. (And if you know the history of who made these items, or anything we have, please contact me.)

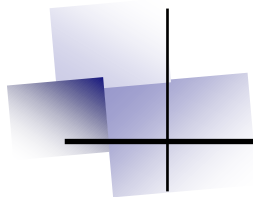
A booklet detailing how things are done – and there is quite a lot – should help ease new members into their tasks. We are always looking for new members, women and men, high-school age and older. Do not be scared off: not everyone does everything, such as taking linens home for laundering. God had given a variety of gifts to different people. All we ask is for your presence and willingness to learn, and give an hour or so a month of your time. So if you are looking for a behind-the-scenes opportunity to serve your church, the altar guild might be right for you!

HEAD CHORISTER - Claudia Blanchette

This is our second year with Dr. Webb Parker as choir director and Josh Singer as organist. Their wealth of musical knowledge, experience, and commitment to this ministry is an asset to St. Johns. Under Webb's direction leading us choristers of all ages, personalities, and singing levels has allowed us to make a worthy offering to this parish, community, and God.

The music we offer for the special services and seasons of the church year such as Advent Lessons & Carols, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, and Evensongs strengthens our faith. The hymns and psalms enhance the theology lessons and gospels for each service. Webb's Baptist upbringing shows in his deep knowledge of the bible, which he shares with us at most rehearsals. Hymns also unite us with the various ages of the parishioners in attendance and with the spirits of those that dwell in this holy place. We offered a service of Remembrance and Peace for the occasion of Veteran's Day in November 2019. Our choir is honored to sing for loved ones and the community at funerals, baptisms, and the annual Martin Luther King Service (unfortunately it was cancelled this past January due to snow storm).

One of my duties, as head chorister, is to lead by example, keep the choir organized in lining up on time before services and observing a quiet time before entering the church, answering any general questions, taking attendance, organizing the Easter Breakfast for choir & clergy, and ensuring everyone has proper vestments and music ready that is needed for that service.

This summer, instead of the usual pick-up choir, any choristers who were in town and attending the service were encouraged to mingle with the parishioners and give a “good lead” to the congregation in singing where we were seated. It is wonderful to have Josh continue to play the organ during the summer months, when he was available. Hopefully we will grow in the number of choristers both adult and youth singers each year. Lastly, we always recite this Chorister’s Prayer at rehearsals and warm-ups:

Bless, O Lord, us thy servants who minister in thy temple. Grant that what we sing with our lips, we may believe in our hearts, and that what we believe in our hearts, we may show forth in our lives; through Jesus Christ our Lord. AMEN

PRAYER SHAWL KNITTING – Cindy Lufkin

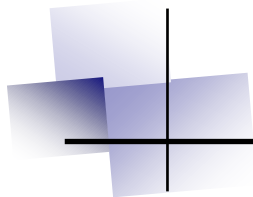

FUNDRAISER GROUPS

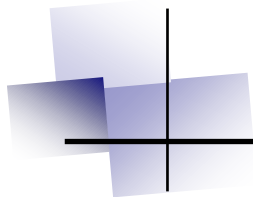
RUMMAGE SALE - Claudia Blanchette

Membership: Volunteers of women, men, and teens of the parish, organized by Claudia Blanchette, Nancy Henry, and Judy Jones.

Mission & Purpose: We have held two sales a year for many years: Spring & Fall. The money raised helps the budget of St. John's. The process of collecting, sorting, pricing, and holding the sale provides valuable fellowship for all involved. I try to keep an eye open for new parishioners and ask if they would like to help. I appreciate the core of faithful workers who show up each time. We share fun and get to have a deeper relationship with each other. We welcomed any able workers on set up days and sale day, whether they could spare only an hour or more.

The actual sale of items benefits the local community by giving them the opportunity to purchase useful household objects, books, toys, jewelry, bedding/linens, and clothes at bargain prices. The sales lighten the load of "stuff" in our homes and makes useful "treasures" from the items donated. We amazingly receive really good quality items from sources such as: people donating items from the death of a family member, households that are downsizing or moving, kids outgrowing clothes/toys, and just the process of people weeding out their excess/unwanted items knowing they will go to a good cause. We often even have a "Boutique" rack of items that are pre-priced such as leather jackets, LL Bean or other brand named clothes, and dresses that are fancy enough for prom or other occasions.

2019 Highlights: The items not sold from each sale are taken to organizations that benefit the Bangor community such as Salvation Army or Goodwill. We give blankets/towels to a pet shelter, and help families who can't afford anything. In the past we have donated remaining men's suits and ladies dresses to an organization who helps outfit people looking to interview for jobs, who can't afford expensive wardrobes to make that first good impression. The jewelry table is always fun and successful at our sales. Thank you to Inez Toothaker and her crew for arranging all the jewelry so beautifully. We really appreciated all who joined us in boxing up and cleaning up after our sales, making the process go so quickly. Thanks especially to some hearty "Dads" from the Sunday School group and other willing recruits that help Jim Blanchette with his truck and utility trailer with this process.

Objectives met: Yes, we provided a much-needed ministry and raised \$2150 in the Spring and \$2455 in the Fall for a grand total of \$4605, our biggest year yet. Our sales have a reputation in the community for being well organized, good variety, fun, and great prices.

Ministry Future: The core group has been contemplating getting done due to our age and the immense task of setting up tables, racks, pricing, lugging etc. in such a short time frame (3 days) each sale due to working around John Bapst needing our undercroft to feed foreign students. It looks very hopeful that a new project: Thrift Shop at 234 French Street will be able to fulfill a need for “all year” donations and sales. 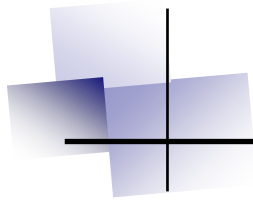

Mission and Purpose: Is to greet new members and visiting people to our church and inform them about ministries, projects, outreach, education and events that we have to offer at the church and for the community at large.

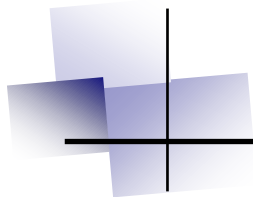
MEN'S BREAKFAST - Jim Blanchette

Ministry Hopes for 2018-2019: To continue taking the food donated by the parish to the shelter and look forward to a 4th annual all parish food drive next September.

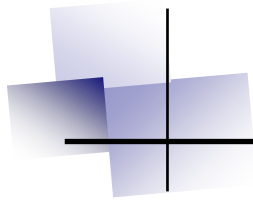
MUSIC & ARTS - Bruce Mallonee
