Our entire staff and student body spent the day on a variety of projects throughout Petaluma, putting our mission into practice in the service of our community.

In the midst of all these exciting changes, much tradition abides; Anne Trott, Gary Galloway, Sue Keller, and Michael O'Toole continue to coach and teach with a combined 148 years of service to St. Vincent's. Former principal Ed Kavanaugh continues to serve as the head of the Board of Regents. The students still graduate at St. Vincent's Church, and the entire school walks to the church to celebrate Mass on the first Friday of the year with Pastor Gary Lombardi.
