The Power of Community Assessments

Community Assessments can be facilitated and used at many different levels. Three layers of tools will be presented that participants can use to strengthen partnerships and engage their communities. (1) System scan aligning birth-to-third grade strategies (2) School-level approach for identifying community resources (3) Programmatic strategies for identifying family needs.

During this roundtable, there will be two discussions. The first will be a discussion on a comparative study on the impact of a full-service Community School on student achievement. The academic performance of students, born between 1991 and 1996, who attended a full-service community school is compared with students who attended a traditional elementary school in the same district. The viability of community schools rests largely on the shared leadership of school principals and community school directors. Together they work to address inequities in schools and communities, and there are significant lessons to be learned from places that have managed to develop, assess, and sustain effective partnerships.
