"Gilded"-Touch Of Gold



As we approach the 50th Anniversary of the Ocean County Artist's Guild, we reflect back on its rich history in Island Heights. It speaks of Golden memories shared by dedicated founders, who paved the way for the Victorian Lady to be what it is today. A welcoming place where artists are encouraged, inspired and supported in pursuing their artistic endeavors. The Artist's Guild's mission seeks to promote and cultivate the Arts in Ocean County and the surrounding communities!

Mark Twain once termed the phrase, "gilded age" of society. It referred to the appearance of wealth despite the reality of the thinly veiled, highly prevalent poverty of the times. It suggested an age of much lavishness and excess, especially within the world of fashion and lifestyles of the day. Ordinary objects were often ornately decorated with thin layers of precious metals including gold, in order to beautify them, so that they appeared to be of more value. They became instant masterpieces. This process of covering

something in thin layers of gold or gold leaf became known as "gilding!"

All throughout history, artists have used gold leaf to decorate their pieces of art. Egyptian and Chinese cultures

were some of the first artisans to be masters of gilding. They would gild anything from textiles and pottery, to ornamental wood. The Romans gilded ceilings of palaces, vaults, even walls inside the homes of those who could afford it. Gold was thought to be the color of the gods and for this reason it was often used to decorate tombs and pyramids. And the Greeks used it to decorate statues, fancy borders on manuscripts, sacred figures and soldiers. In their paintings it was used as a symbol of "excellence" in Christian Art.

The Art of gilding has survived since ancient times and is still relevant today. Modern artists continue to transform ordinary objects into brilliant works of art, with skill and precision. Many artists today mix a blend of gold leaf

gilding with traditional paint techniques, as gold adds a "pop" of detail and color.

The word "gilded" is also used to describe something as being covered or "bathed" in bright golden colored light, in such expressive phrases like, "as morning golds the skies," or "the gilded leaves of autumn."

So for the months of December and January, the OCAG Members will be showcasing their interpretations of "gilded" art in celebration of the Golden years of the Guild. By doing so, they hope to highlight the priceless value of turning the ordinary....into something extra-ordinary.... just like our beautiful Victorian Lady, the Ocean County Artist's Guild! Happy 50th Golden Anniversary!!!

Rob Henne

Robert Henne, a familiar face around OCAG, has a lot going on lately even though he just "retired". His newfound time is dedicated to his art and his willingness to explore different mediums and commitment to his artistic growth.

Rob is a talented oil painter who possess a deep understanding of color blending and the ability to achieve lifelike hues in his artwork. Sometimes he switches to acrylics in his more contemporary pieces. He has also delved into the realm of digital art over the past seven or eight years. With digital art, he can swiftly and effortlessly modify an image, enabling him to experiment with various color combinations and shapes. This flexibly allows him to explore numerous iterations until he achieves the desired impact in his artwork.

Rob's journey as an artist began unexpectantly at the age of 27 when on a whim he enrolled in a beginner's night course. Encouraged by his progress, Rob submitted his work to a new gallery for a juried show. To his delight, his artwork was selected, marking a significant milestone in his artistic career. The validation he received after selling some pieces solidified his commitment to art.

Rob draws inspiration from the renowned artist Edward Hopper, appreciating his ability to capture the essence of the world around him. Hopper's portrayal aligns with Rob's temperament and artistic style. Additionally, Rob admires the surreal and thought provoking work of Magritte, finding excitment in his unique approach.

Since 2019, Rob has served as a trustee at the Guild. He has had two solo shows here, 2007 and 2014. He also shows his work at TRAC in Toms River, Freehold Art Gallery, and the Art Alliance of Monmouth., expanding his reach and connecting with diverse art communities.

Rob's latest achievement as an artist is the publication of his book titled "The Perceptive Eye". This compact paperback delves into the exercises employed by art teachers, emphasizing the unique ability of the artist to see beyond the ordinary and infuse their work with profound insight. The book offers valuable guidance on how the artist can harness this perceptive power to create artwork that resonates with greater impact. "The Perceptive Eye" is available on Amazon. Jo Guscott placed second in the state in the professional print category with her linocut reduction print "Flamingo Flourish".





Audubon Artist Gold Medal of Honor






Our first project, geared toward elementary students and led by Kim Cesaretti, OCAG volunteer, was a work showing the beauty of Fall Leaves. First, the students traced leaf shapes on watercolor paper. Then they added the bright fall colors to the leaves using oil pastels. The finishing touch was a wash of watercolor over the whole paper. The oil pastels resisted the watercolor paint, keeping the brilliant warm hues of the fall leaves while leaving behind the wash of cool blue and violet on the bare paper to suggest a beautiful fall sky.

An added bonus was the STEAM element, thanks to Miss Pat, HOM volunteer and retired science teacher, who taught the students the fascinating science of how and why the leaves change color! Best of all was seeing the smiling faces of the children who were happy with the beautiful works of art they created!
