Park and Cory have developed a wonderful relationship over the past several years due to their common roots---one being meeting in the same impressive building on E. 105th Street in the Glenville neighborhood. Park, then known as the Cleveland Jewish Center, constructed and met in the building from the early 1920's until the late 1940's, and Cory has owned and worshiped in it ever since. As African-Americans and as Jews, their congregations also share a difficult history of persecution and oppression. Today, they, as minorities in our community, face racism and anti-Semitism. We invite everyone in the Cleveland community to come learn about their histories and to discuss what all of us can do to make changes in our society and build a better future for all people.
