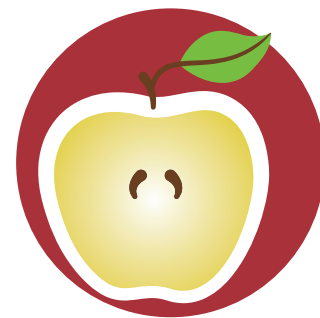


2018 - 2019 ANNUAL REPORT

Greetings from PSFTC! We're very pleased to present this year's Annual Report. The Foundation continues to grow in awareness, contributions, and grants for our local educators. Within this report, you'll find many of this year's success stories.

First and foremost, 20 projects were funded impacting 363 teachers and 8,665 students. Grants were awarded across all grades and throughout all three public school districts. One grant supplied equipment that enabled students with physical limitations to engage in regular physical education activities. Another provided tools to aid in design projects for Engineering Technology classes, STEAM labs, and robotics teams. The diversity of the funded programs was astounding, covering mental health and wellness, literature, coding, nature, economics, music, and more.

Our largest fundraising event, supported generously by Gigi's Cupcakes, is the Cupcake Run/Walk for Public Education. Now in its fourth year, it continues to grow in participants, sponsorship, and donations. It's not too late to sign up for this year's race! Join us on September 22 for a fun morning of camaraderie, exercise, and of course, a delicious Gigi's cupcake!

One of our largest corporate partnerships is with Tate & Lyle, which has provided funding for 20 STEM and health/nutrition grants over the past six years. Last year with their support, we hosted the first ever Cupcake Bake Off involving local bakeries and teachers from all three public school districts. This year, we're taking the program into the high school culinary classrooms. Students will work with their teachers, professional bakers, and food scientists to create a cupcake recipe for the competition. We hope you can attend this year's Tasting Party on September 25 at Ivy Tech Community College.

Our community clearly values public education. Since our founding in 1985, we have awarded more than \$717,000 to local educators. Grants have enabled the creation of sustainable programs that continue to shape curriculum for future students. We are proud to be a part of this community and share your passion for public education!

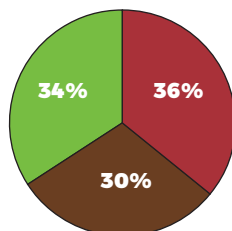
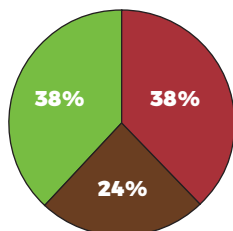
