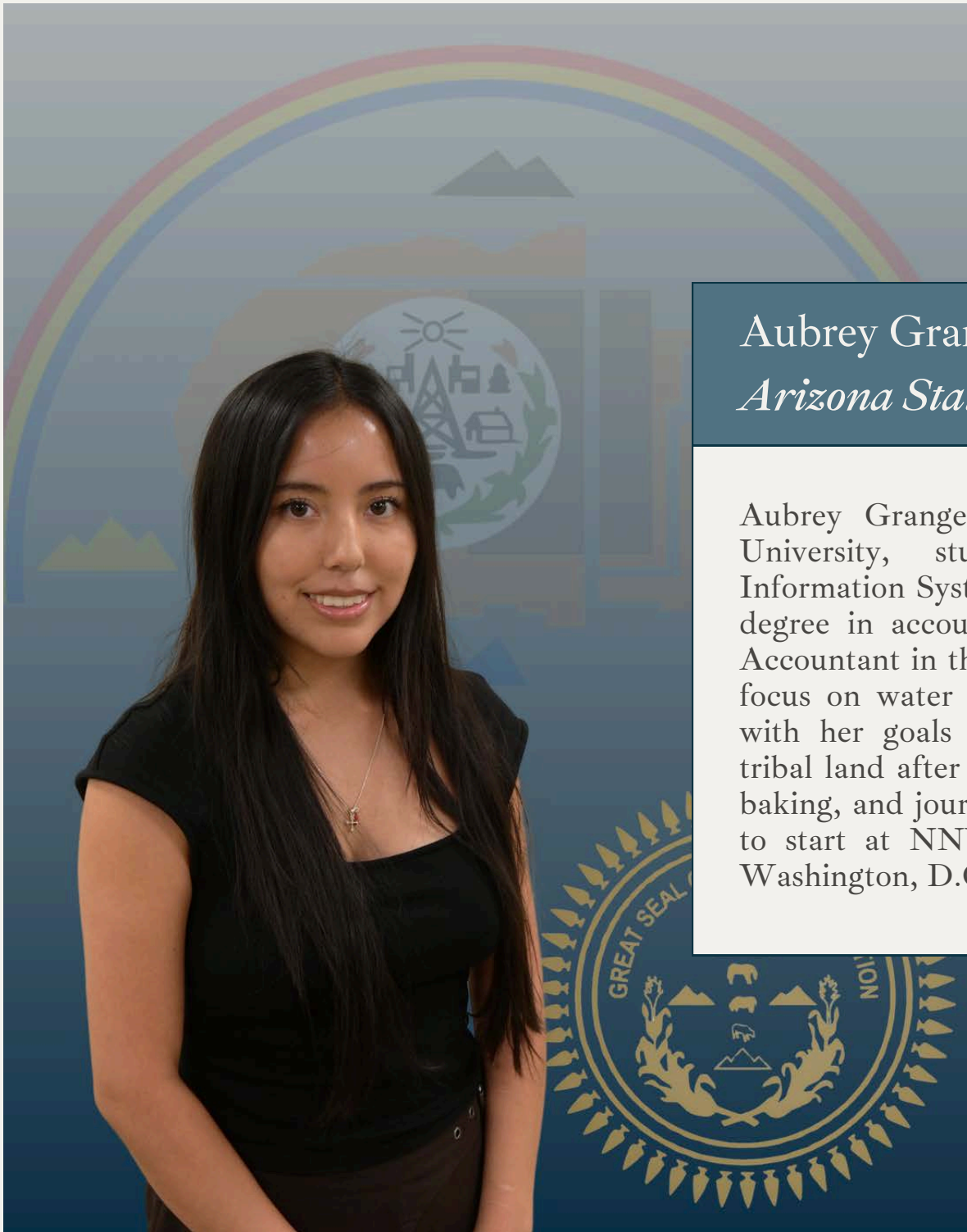


# MEET OUR SUMMER INTERNS



Aubrey Granger

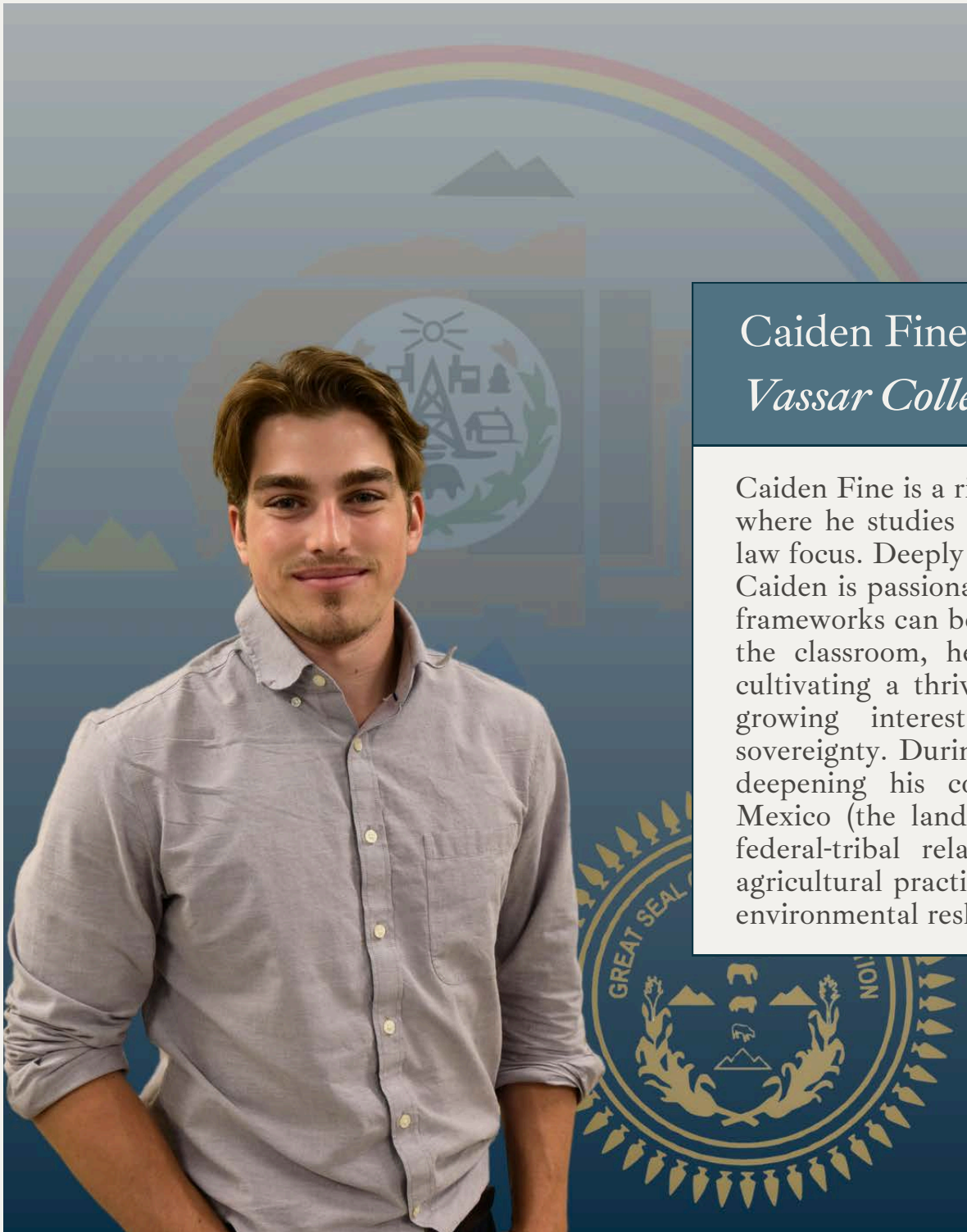

Caiden Fine

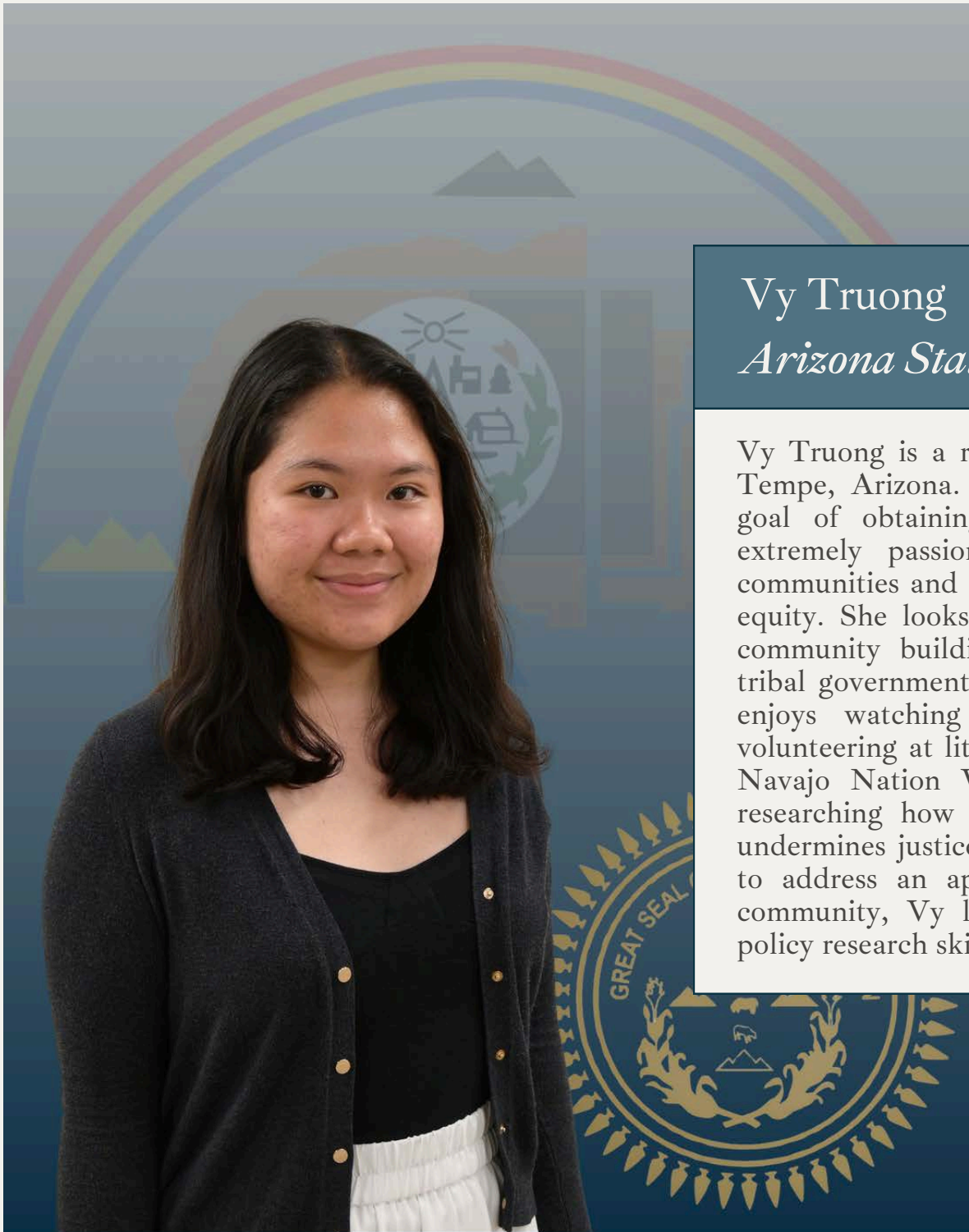

Vy Truong

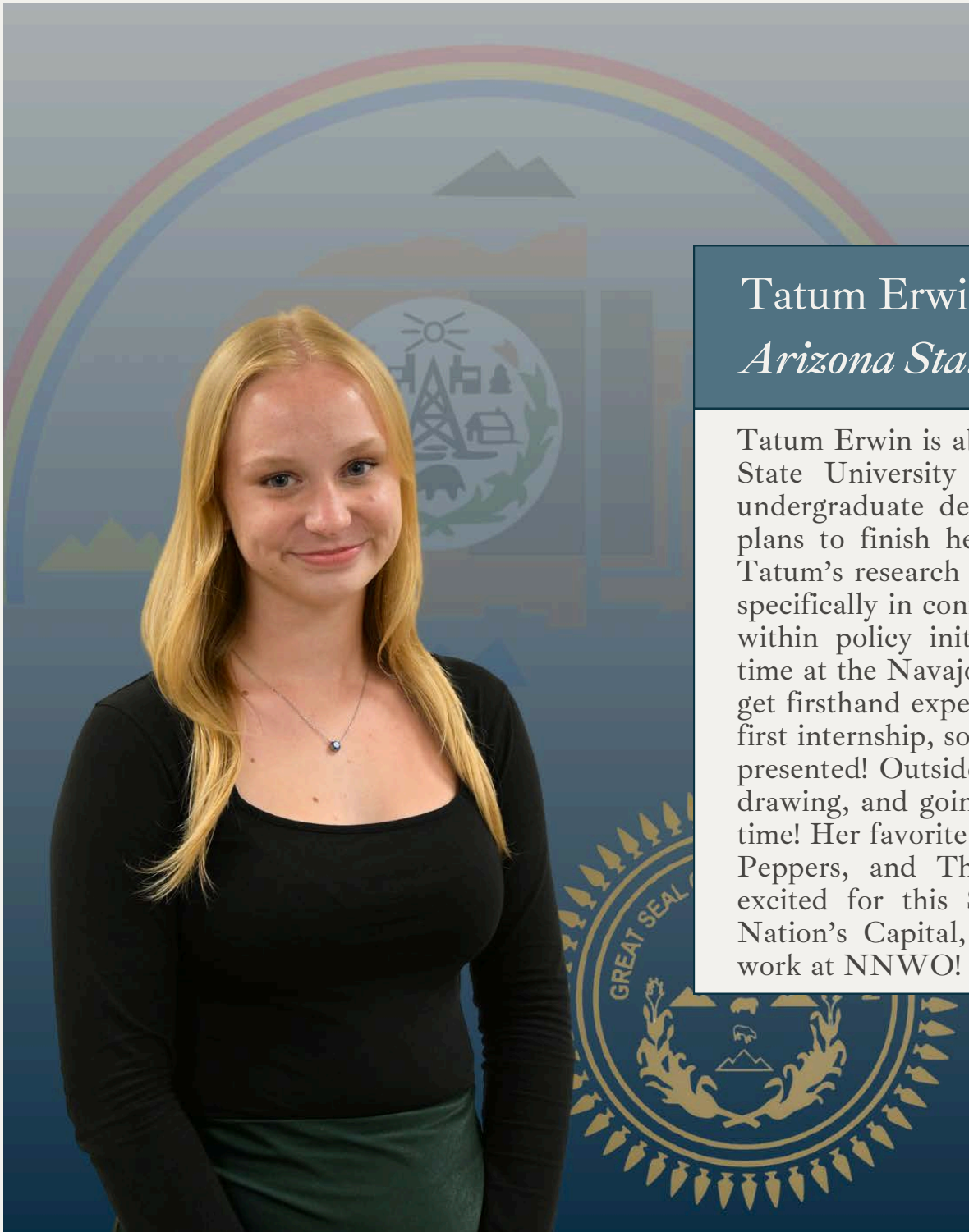

Tatum Erwin

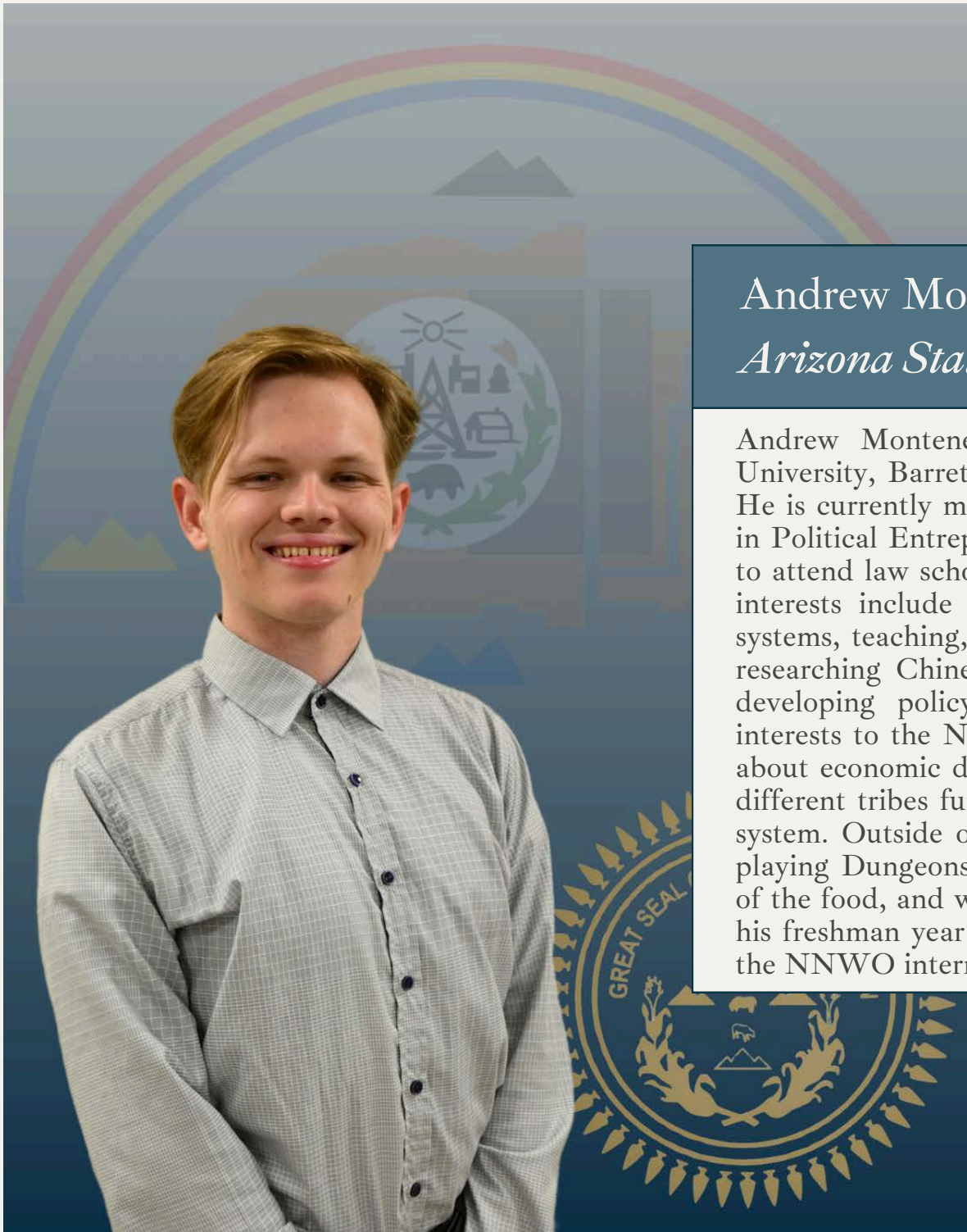
