WASHINGTON, D.C. – This year's summer internship program at the Navajo Nation Washington Office is coming to a close. The program, which started the first week of July, included five students who spent the summer getting a first-hand glimpse into government and legislative affairs, as well as the intricacies of the unique government-to-government relationship that the Navajo Nation holds with the United States. Here is what each intern had to say about their experience:

"My time as a summer intern with NNWO has been one of the best experiences of my life! As a political science major, I am used to learning about politics in theory through textbooks and lectures. However, my summer with NNWO provided me a chance to experience politics in motion as I learned about the behind-the-scenes work that goes into advocating for the Navajo Nation to the federal government in the Capital. During the last eight weeks, I have completed everything from attending meetings with President Nygren and NNWO staff to writing suggestions for research and advocacy initiatives for the office and working on my own research project on Navajo intellectual property. On top of the work for NNWO, I have made many useful connections with my fellow interns, NNWO staff, and even with other offices we visited for executive meetings and advocacy. Ultimately, the NNWO internship experience is like no other I have ever had before, and I am very grateful for the chance to dive deep into politics and advocacy for the Navajo Nation in Washington D.C.!
