



Diné Recognized for Outstanding Contributions in Combating MMIP Crisis

WASHINGTON, D.C. – In a ceremony at Constitution Hall on January 31, 2024, two Diné relatives were recognized at the U.S. Attorney General's Annual Awards Ceremony. Nominated by the FBI, they received the Attorney General's Award for Outstanding Contributions to Community Partnerships for Public Safety for their work on the Missing or Murdered Indigenous Persons Initiative Team.

Reycita Billie, a 17-year veteran of the Navajo Nation Police Department, currently serves as the MMIP liaison for Navajo Nation Police Department. She worked for 13 years in the Crown Point District before being promoted to headquarters staff, where she was instrumental in the roll out of the 911 pilot program and has served since as the first Public Safety Answering Point Supervisor.

Dawn Begay serves as the Native American Affairs Coordinator for the City of Albuquerque. An avid warrior for justice, she advocates for Native Americans from all tribal backgrounds who reside in Albuquerque and helps to protect the indigenous history in the community. She also served on the New Mexico Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women's Task Force, with the Southwest Indigenous Housing Task Force, and continues to advocate for Native Americans across New Mexico.
