- Our organ was in need of repairs to the tune of nearly \$5000. A generous benefactor donated the amount out of a love for the instrument and the joy it brings to our community.

- It has been a goal since the beginning of my tenure here to have services online for those that cannot make it to in-person services. The restrictions caused by COVID motivated us to get it up and running. Although we could benefit from some better equipment to streamline the process and improve the quality, we have a service that can be watched in homes or on phones. Many thanks to Matt Reynolds, Summer Green, Trish Shurtz and Barry Shurtz.
- We now have a new website that looks fabulous and provides many tools to guide and direct us in our ministry here. On the website we can now: make donations, access sermon archives, After Thoughts archives, ministry information, get email contacts, fill out our pledge cards and sign up for events. Many thanks to Trish and Barry Shurtz.
- While the thought of having to record a Christmas Eve Service was not something I was looking forward to, the finished project was the best possible substitute short of meeting in person. I was moved by the virtual choirs and other music, the lectors offering readings of Scripture and a liturgy to help us settle into the season. Many thanks to all who participated and, especially, Matt Reynolds for putting it all together for us.

So, for a year that has had so much change, God has been faithful to us here at Holy Trinity. May He continue to bless us and may we continue to be a blessing to our community.

Sunday School Report 2020

This was working well with only a few incidents of children asking for food prior to snack time, which is still accommodated, although in an informal manner. Our social gathering & eating time is now mainly at the end of class instead of at the beginning.

We were very sad to have to stop meeting in March & look forward to the time when the children can all be together for Sunday School again.

Friends of HTC created and donated a beautiful new, custom-made Level II work project used for teaching the older children all about the books of the Bible. It is currently in the Atrium waiting for the children to return.

During this down-time we have also been expanding our treasury of familiar songs and hymns, creating flip-charts with lyrics to help the reading children sing along. We currently do not have a music person to help teach music to the children as we did for a while in 2019. We do our best, however that is one area we could still use some help with, when we are able to meet for Sunday School again.

I am blessed to have the opportunity to love and serve God and our Parish at Holy Trinity, and I pray that we will all be together again, safe & healthy, very soon.
