The Jewish tradition teaches us that we help loved ones achieve eternal life when we remember them. Through our memories, the loved ones we have lost continue to accompany us throughout our lives - sharing the power of moments both great and small.

It is because of the emphasis that Judaism places on memories that one of the walls of our sanctuary, the space where we gather most frequently, is dedicated to honoring the memories of those we have loved and lost. Each name that appears on our Memorial Wall tells the story of someone who has been and will continue to be a blessing for a member of our congregation.

As the secular year begins, we know that many of us are thinking of loved ones who have passed away, and we invite you to use this moment of transition, of remembering and looking forward, to commemorate the lives and blessings of your loved ones with a memorial plaque.

Each memorial plaque costs \$360 and will be engraved with the name of your loved one in English and Hebrew (if desired), as well as the date of their passing according to both the Jewish and Gregorian (secular) calendars. Please note that family members and cherished friends of all faith backgrounds can be memorialized with a plaque on TBC's Memorial Wall.

When you purchase a plaque, your loved one's name will be added to our newly created list of **Perpetual Memorials**. This means that every name on our Memorial Wall - including those already on the Memorial Wall - will be remembered in perpetuity.
