Greetings from Sher

As you know, HWAH is a Senior Sanctuary dedicated to providing a safe and loving place for senior dogs and cats to live out their lives.

When my husband Joe and I started HWAH in 2006 we were middle aged and thought we had many years of rescuing seniors ahead of us! Now my Joe is in heaven and I am over 70 so that brings some worries. I know that I have to provide for the Sanctuary residents in case something happens to me. I have made sure to identify volunteers who will help if I am sick. I have also purchased life insurance that will be used to care for any dogs and cats that would outlive me.

When I was younger I was focused on accepting residents who would need medical care and love. Currently, we have 30 critters that rely on our HWAH volunteers, foster parents, supporters and me. Every day, at some point, I have a moment of worry about what will happen to them if I am not here.

My life would truly have no meaning if I wasn't devoting myself to saving senior pets. However, it would be unacceptable to keep bringing in residents when my time to be here for them is getting shorter. Hence our K9-Medical Miracle Fund and our new program to save Seriously Senior dogs from shelters was conceived. This program partners us with other Rescues. These rescue partners provide adoptive or foster homes for senior dogs pulled from shelters. With the help of our Supporters, HWAH provides Medical Grants to prepare these pups for adoption, or for a comfortable and quality Hospice care experience.

As we move forward, I am hopeful for another 15 years caring for the current HWAH residents and Forever Fosters, and sharing with you the success stories of the many seriously senior dogs we will help each year with our K9-Medical Miracles program. This will be a joint effort because without YOUR support, we could never complete our mission.

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Meet the Newbies



COCO [12 YO] came to us when her owner could no longer care for her. She was suffering from dental disease, bladder stones, and tumors on the back of her legs. We got Coco the surgeries she needed. But she had been in pain for so long, and was hesitant to be picked up. Unfortunately, Coco was not used to being around humans, and is very fearful of human touch. She gets along with other dogs, but would rather be left alone to sleep in her bed all day. We are working hard to get Coco to trust people, and will keep trying until she knows she is loved.

MARLIE [12 YO] & DIXIE [13 YO] have lived their entire lives in a local community of Sisters. Unfortunately, the sisters were unable to keep their beloved pups so they searched for a safe place for Marlie and Dixie to live out their lives, and found us. Dixie is a beautiful female Rat Terrier. She is friendly and incredibly loving! Her companion Marlie is a handsome male toy Australian Shepherd. He is a very dedicated, affectionate, and faithful boy. Both were very shy when they first arrived, but soon realized that they were safe, and are now very sweet pups who love to greet everyone who walks in.

ROCKY [10 YO] was brought to us by BARCS through Pet Connect following an Animal Control violation by the original owners. His condition was heartbreaking. This poor pup was very emaciated and needed surgery on both eyes. He had severe dental disease as well as a ruptured mass on his rear. Once he gained enough weight he was able to handle all the surgeries needed to make him more comfortable. Rocky makes us laugh at all his silly positions when he sleeps! He is a sweet boy and will live out his life in comfort and love now.

Welcome to Our K9-Medical Miracles Program

We have embarked on a new way to help Senior and Special needs dogs. By partnering with local Rescues who will pull a 13+ year old dog from a shelter, we will provide a Grant for the necessary medical care to make that pup ready for their new forever home.

Often when a rescue group goes to a shelter, they only look for young healthy dogs, even though many people are now considering a Senior or Special needs dog when deciding to adopt. Our goal is to encourage rescues to sometimes choose a senior knowing that HWAH and its supporters will help with the expensive medical costs associated with an older dog.

K9-Medical Miracles 2018 Update

All of us at HWAH are thrilled that with your support 2018 has been a successful year for our new K9-Medical Miracle Fund. HWAH working diligently along with our Rescue partners was able to save 13 senior or special needs dogs that had little chance of adoption because of their age and medical conditions.

we now know that she will require heart meds the rest of her life.

It Takes a Village, a rescue in North Carolina saved Diamond from the shelter and asked for our help with her medical care. *It Takes a Village* had planned on keeping Diamond in hospice care because of her medical issues, but they found a family willing to adopt her and give her love in her final years! Diamond is living the high life now.



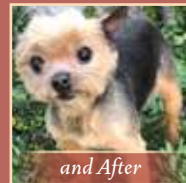

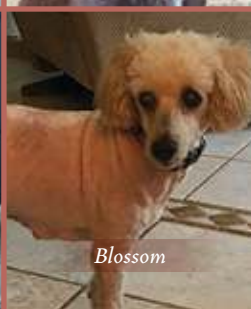

TATOR [8 YO] was rescued by PetConnect Rescue from a hoarding situation. They asked for our help to evaluate him as he was pooping and peeing in his crate. Tator spent his life in a crate and this was normal for him. So we have been very patient to teach him to poop outside. Tator is extremely shy, and would run and hide when anyone walked in the door. Slowly but surely, Tator has started venturing out when people arrive. He has even started letting some people hold him and pet him! Tator has come a long way from the scared little man he was. We are thrilled to see him thrive with our pack.

TINKER [16 YO] was a tiny scared Chihuahua at the local shelter, and was suffering from an enlarged heart and heart disease. Knowing that she didn't have a good chance of being adopted, we couldn't leave this old girl in the shelter. Tinker was very snarky when she first arrived. We had to pick her up with a blanket to avoid the damage this petite cutie could muster up. Finally, Tinker has warmed up to us and will allow everyone to pet her. Tinker does NOT like sharing human affection with the other dogs and is very vocal about wanting all of the attention.

MARCO [12 YO] was at the PG County shelter when space was limited. Marco was listed as a fear biter. He had horrid dental disease, but was otherwise in good health. He was transported to HWAH and we scheduled dental surgery and a good grooming. We kept him in a pen to evaluate his behavior. We discovered that Marco is a sweet loving dog. If someone is sitting down, you can guarantee that boy will be in their lap. He will let you know LOUDLY whenever he sees his favorite people! Marco is a very happy, silly pup and quite the snuggle buddy.

CASEY [16 YO] & WRIGLEY [15 YO]: One of our rescue partners, Senior Dog Sanctuary of Maryland approached us about a bonded pair who were living at the local animal shelter. Casey and Wrigley: Casey was 16 and Mom to Wrigley who was 15. They needed to stay together. The loving pair arrived at HWAH. Casey loved to play peek-a-boo with her blankie and she was a talker with many opinions that she loved to share. She was never far from Wrigley and you would often find them cuddled together. Sadly, Casey passed away in September but not before charming all of us for many months. Wrigley has transitioned nicely into the pack now that he no longer has his Mom. He may not have any teeth but that doesn't slow down his love of treats or meals. He does enjoy being held in your lap and we all try to give him extra attention.

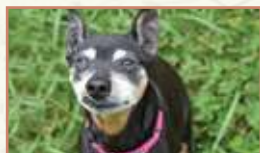
