



BOOK REVIEW




I will be sending each of the volunteers more details via an e-mail. This will be an opportunity for all of us to meet prior to working any shifts. We will go over expectations, sorting process, prices, genres and timelines.

If you are still interested in volunteering, please complete a Volunteer Application. Once our form is completed, return it to the library and staff will give you an application from San Diego County. This application form needs to be returned as soon as possible in person so that we can get the vetting process done. They will need to see your driver's license and social security card. The County vetting process can take 6-8 weeks, so please be patient. This is needed before you can volunteer in a bookstore connected to the library. The County has additional requirements to volunteer within the library.


BOOKS SET IN LIBRARIES

[The Littlest Library](#) by [Poppy Alexander](#)






