One is the loneliest number that you'll ever do Two can be as bad as one It's the loneliest number since the number one

A popular wedding text is taken from Ecclesiastes 4:9-12:

Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help. Again, if two lie together, they keep warm; but how can one keep warm

alone? And though one might prevail against another, two will withstand one. A threefold cord is not quickly broken. (NRSV)

Very few people want to be, or feel, alone. One is always looking for a number two in their lives, whether as a life partner, a dear friend, or a trusted colleague. But three is even better than two when the third strand in the cord is our God, who we experience in three ways as Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. As we approach 2/22/22, let's give thanks for three! When we do, we

will not be quickly or easily broken. In addition, this triune God can take our existing brokenness and make us whole. And when that happens, we experience a strength to fully tackle all that life has to throw at us!

Underneath the bill of my baseball hat I wrote with a black Sharpie marker: "I can do all things through him who strengthens me." Philippians 4:13 (NRSV) It was a reminder of my number three, who was my number one even before I was born and will be long after I am born into eternity!



The discussions for this decision have also included the future of the rummage sale - especially with the alternative ways to raise money for mission that have now been identified. For example, our 2021 "Christmas with A Conscience" event raised more money for mission (with limited time spent) than the recent rummage sales - recognizing the 7 days of 12 hours that the rummage sale requires. Since the rummage sale is now an all-church event, ALB has been asked to consider the issues and will start the discussion for the future of the sale at its next meeting, open to all members, now scheduled for the third Tuesday of the month - February 15th. We encourage you to participate via ZOOM - including your ideas for raising funds for mission. An example would be to ask members to donate what they would have spent at the rummage sale.

The rummage sale has a long history with our church going back decades - mostly with the successful leadership of the United Methodist Women's Ministry and Mary Paull. All of you who have made the sale a success with your hours of dedication can look back and be proud of the resulting contributions to our church missions. Many, many thanks.

February Mission of the Month - Habitat

Milwaukee Habitat for Humanity is our February mission of the month. Loose coins and designated donations will go toward the Men's Ministry 2022 pledge of \$4,000 to Habitat.

The Mission Team has decided to jump start the Habitat pledge drive with \$1,000 from their budget.

The money is used to purchase lumber, appliances, and pay for professional contractors to provide work the volunteers cannot. Habitat has a goal to build 25 new houses in the nearby Harambee neighborhood (north and south of Locust - east of I-43).

In addition, we will be able to sign and decorate studs in February and March. The decorated studs will be used to build the walls of houses this year. 

North Shore School for Seniors Winter Session—February 15

North Shore School for Seniors (NSSS) classes will be offered at United Methodist Church of Whitefish Bay beginning Feb. 15. Classes are on Tuesdays, and meet from one to six times, depending on the subject matter. The school is open from 9 a.m.-2 p.m.



Fees are \$8 per class session – \$8 for one-week classes, \$16 for two-week classes, \$32 for four-week classes, and \$48 for six-week classes.

A brochure has been mailed to those who registered for the Spring 2020 Session and Fall 2021 Session. To request a brochure, phone the NSSS office at 414-292-0960 and the brochure will be mailed. Information also is available at uncwfb.org under the adult ministries heading.

Registrations will be honored on a first-come, first-served basis and can be done by returning the form in the brochure. There also will be in-person registration the first day of classes.

Notes from the Board

We are pleased to announce the addition of two new members of ALB: Lori Aeschbacher and Nancy Anderson.

Lori serves on the Mission Team and recently organized Christmas with a Conscience and has taught Confirmation and been on the leadership team for the Appalachian Service Project for several years.

Nancy co-founded our Tree of Life preschool and Church Camp at Lake Lucerne and has been active in our women's ministry and tutoring program for many years. She has also served on SPRT and the Foundation and Memorials Committee.

Both women are long-time church members with a deep faith and will be great additions to the board. They will join the board in February.

COVID Policy and Changes

Our COVID policy is evolving in response to the omicron surge. The church is open but masks will be required in the church regardless of vaccination status. The staff will provide you with a mask if you need one. Social distancing is encouraged but will be a personal choice. Sunday hospitality and WNL dinners were halted in January but will restart in February.

Missions Ministry

The generosity of our congregation for mission continues to amaze us! Christmas with a Conscience raised \$17,784 for seven organizations. UMCS and MacCanon Brown Homeless Sanctuary each received \$4,500 and the other organizations received a minimum of \$1,700. In addition, Missions received three \$1,000 donations in December for local missions.

Trees of Love donated 100 gifts to Next Door Foundation and 85 \$25 gift cards to UMCS to brighten a child's Christmas.

The FMSC Team has scheduled the next FMSC Meal-Packing Event for September 29 - October 1 and will plan to pack 100,000 meals at a cost of \$25,000. Despite the many precautions taken by the FMSC staff at mobile-pack events, the team decided a spring event was too risky given the recent COVID surge. Although the September date will compress the period in which to raise funds, most of the \$25,000 was raised over the last three years.

Missions is exploring the possibility of co-sponsoring an Afghan family with Lutheran Social Services. We would need a team of 8-10 people who would help find housing, transportation, job training, and jobs over a period of 6-12 months. The Mission Team would donate \$2,000 to the cost.

Update on Boy Scouts of America Settlement

The United Methodist denomination has joined the BSA settlement. The denomination will contribute \$30 million to the Survivor Trust Fund in exchange for a release from possible liability related to the sexual abuse claims pending against troops chartered by United Methodist churches. The Wisconsin Conference will be responsible for \$208,096. Each church will also be expected to review its Safe Sanctuary policies; Pastor Andrew will lead the review for our church. The settlement must still be approved by the court.

Notes

The Facility Use Agreement with Troop 400 has been signed and will provide protection for the church in the unlikely event of a future claim.

Staff Parish Relations

The board approved two new job descriptions for a 20-hour-per-week Director of Membership and Engagement and a 10-hour-per-week position to oversee our new website and our social media presence. The job descriptions primarily split the responsibilities listed in the prior Director of Engagement job description but clarify that the Director of Membership and Engagement will be in charge of WNL and the media position will include developing and implementing a media strategy. SPRT is conducting a final review of the position descriptions and they will be posted soon.

Technology

We have found a way to sync Constant Contact to our automated membership software. This will help streamline our congregational contact information.

Our livestream service was not viable on Facebook for 2 months last fall. The problem was recently corrected.

Trustees

Mission at Home has been cancelled due to the COVID surge. Some small projects may still be assigned.

Upgrades are being planned for the Youth Room, including installing a new floor and painting the walls.

The Narthex Team has retained architect Russ LaFrombois to provide a design for the church building's Narthex welcoming area.

Finances

FY 2021-2022 Budget - we had a very strong December with \$128,772 in pledge and \$16,735 in non-pledge income. The Christmas offering was \$7,685. Our expenses are below budget, driven by unfilled staff positions. Consequently, even after paying the balance of our 2021 apportionment, we had a surplus for the month of \$69,372, which increased our surplus for the year to \$93,982. This is a huge improvement over last year, when we had a year-end surplus of \$51,739, and puts us in a good position to weather the lean winter months.

Capital Account, Future Fund, and Properties Capital Fund - our Capital Account and Future Fund remained the same at \$64,181 and \$97,435, respectively, on December 31. The balance in the Properties Capital Fund was \$213,507 after a payment of \$2,980 to Badger Fence for the dumpster corral.

Meeting Date Change

The ALB's regular monthly meeting date will be moved from the second Tuesday to the third Tuesday of the month, beginning in February.

The next ALB meeting will be via Zoom on Tuesday, February 15 at 6:30 p.m.
