Spiritual Life Hacks

Sitting on top of a counter in my kitchen is a daily calendar. Every morning when Janet and I wake up and go downstairs, we tear off yesterday's date and reveal the new one. Our calendar is a "Life Hacks" calendar. The box the calendar came in promised "Tips, tricks, and daily DIY's ('Do it yourself') to make your life a little more awesome."

If you have never heard of "life hacks," Merriam Webster defines the noun as: "a usually simple and clever tip or technique for accomplishing some familiar task more easily and efficiently." For example, my calendar taught me how to ripen tomatoes faster. The daily entry taught me to place them in a box with a ripe banana. The banana will release ethylene gas speeding up the process. Who knew?

Researching life hacks I read: "If you did a simple search of the word 'life hacks' on YouTube today, you get over 6.5 million search results. That's over 6.5 million videos showcasing everything from 'how to wake up earlier' to 'how to cut cake perfectly with dental floss.'" And that's just YouTube. Considering the way this search trend has skyrocketed in recent years, one thing is certain: we're obsessed with efficiency and delighted by ingenuity. There are life hacks for teachers, life hacks for commuters, and life hacks for stay-at-home moms. But what about life hacks for Christians?"

I believe that there are spiritual and faith based life hacks to help us grow in faith. There are simple things that we can do and methods to offer practical and achievable tools for integrating spiritual habits into busy, technology-centric, 21st century living.

Spiritual life hacks differ from the kind of life hacks I read each morning. The difference is found between addressing problems on the surface of one's life, or, targeting issues at the core of one's being. Between focusing on technology, efficiency, and productivity or focusing on spirituality, humanity, and mystery. But it goes beyond that. Ordinary life hacks are often quick, simple, one-time actions that make life more convenient in the short term because they are so clever. Spiritual life hacks typically require repetition, the formation or cessation of a habit that makes life more meaningful long-term which helps us become the person God has created us to be.

Each week this summer we will be looking at a different Spiritual life hack that will help us establish new life long habits for our spiritual journey. This summer let's worship more than the sun and more on the SON!

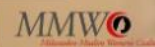

Meal Program Needs

The last 2 years of the Covid pandemic affected our meal programs by causing the 6 agencies we support to either shut down completely or to accept our food but not allow us to provide servers. This is great news but it has presented a challenge for us to get the volunteers we need to sustain our commitments. The Church and Society team at our church has once again partnered with Bread for the World to help address this urgent need. Bread for the World is a Christian organization that advocates to end hunger and poverty at home and abroad by urging our nation's leaders to direct money and resources to where it is needed the most.

- *Expanding free school meals to additional children and making the Child Tax Credit permanent
- *Passage of the Global Malnutrition Prevention and Treatment Act and increasing global nutrition funding.

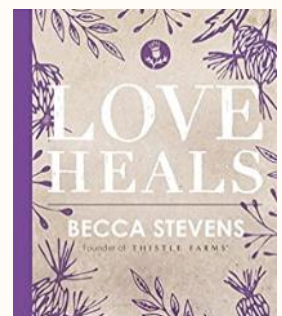

Notes from the Board

During the last two months, we have celebrated the miracle of Jesus' resurrection and gift of salvation during Lent and Easter and heard the call to rededicate ourselves to God during our stewardship drive. At the same time, we have felt new life in our church as more people worship in person, and we welcomed new members into our faith community. It is our hope that these experiences have deepened our faith and strengthened our church.

What's New?

The summer sermon series will be Faith Hacks - how to be more faithful.

Judge Derek Mosley will speak at our church on unconscious bias on Wednesday, June 15 at 6:30 p.m. This event is sponsored by ten other churches and community groups.

The Annual Conference will be held on June 10-13 in Green Bay and will offer a virtual option. A challenge for the Conference is the shortage of clergy resulting in fewer 2 pastor churches and single charges and more foreign pastors.

The Church took in 5 Confirmands and 15 new members in May, including three families.

Attendance at the 9 am service continues to lag but is increasing at the 10:30 am service. About 20 attend the Saturday service. Like most other churches, we are looking for ways to re-engage members and find volunteers.

Staff Parish Relations

We are still looking for someone to fill the 20 hour/week Director of Membership and Engagement and 10 hour/week Director of Media Outreach positions.

Technology Report

Shelby Project - Suzie Webster, Christie Wrenn, Nancy Schacht and Nell Nash (hereafter to be known as "the Shelby Girls") have begun a project to redevelop expertise in the Shelby membership software, to update member information, and to create a handbook of procedures. They have discovered that member information is incorrect in many cases and the expertise and knowledge base in the church is gone. They hope to rebuild that knowledge base through Shelby's online resources, webinars and help line. Pat Wisialowski, our Director of Hospitality, will also be included in the training.

Website - Another piece of the Shelby software relates to the website which still needs to be completed. Anne is the point on the website. One improvement will be integrating the Google and web calendars.

Library Software - we need help in the Library! Our volunteer librarian passed away and no one has been maintaining the Library. The cataloguing software was also not renewed. New books are piling up that have not been catalogued or shelved. If you like library work, please call Nell Nash. We need you!

North Shore School for Seniors - Roger and Beth Stafford and Dick and Loretto Steinmetz are the new lay leaders of NSSS. They are setting up an on-line registration system and, with the help of Pat Wisialowski, are offering an interesting array of classes and seminars.

Trustees

Narthex Renovation

At the board meeting, Craig Walker, chair of Trustees, reviewed the goals of the Narthex Renovation Team:

1. Welcoming environment with clear information and living ambiance for first time visitors
2. Improved traffic flow with clear path to the Sanctuary
3. Comfortable, intimate niches for personal connection and fellowship
4. Strong indicators of legacy, mission, and vision of the congregation
5. Clean, orderly, up-to-date, and professional spaces

Craig said the Narthex Team had hired an architect who produced a basic plan of new carpeting, lighting, signage, and painting and two higher-end plans with more amenities. The team has focused on the high-end proposal but no plan has been agreed upon. Some in the congregation have already expressed their views about elements of the proposal to Trustee and ALB members. Given the level of interest, the Narthex Renovation Team will hold listening sessions for the general congregation and with some groups in the church on their ideas for the renovation before moving forward. The renovations will not be paid for from the operating budget or by a loan but from the Capital Fund and a capital campaign. If the congregation does not support the renovation through the capital campaign, it will not go forward.

Other Projects

We have received approval from the Village to replace the outdated sign on the NW corner of the lot with a modern sign.

The South outside wall of the church is leaking and must be tuck pointed.

The carpet for the Youth Room has been ordered.

Several projects are being planned for 816 E. Glen.

Finances

FY 2021-2022 Budget

We had a strong April with \$70,724 in pledge and \$7,240 in non-pledge income and lower than expected expenses. This increased our surplus to \$18,980. We are cautiously optimistic that we will end the fiscal year in the black.

Capital Account, Future Fund, and Properties Capital Fund

The Capital Account was \$67,151 after paying Russ LaFrombois \$375 and receiving interest income from the Foundation of \$150. The Future Fund remained the same at \$97,435 and Properties Capital Fund at \$213,507.

Designated Gifts

The board discussed a request by a church member to designate a donation to the church as a bonus for an individual staff member. Pastor Matt noted that members can make direct gifts to staff at any time and some staff receive checks at Christmas. However, these gifts are not made through the church. Donating through the church would make the gift tax deductible. Due to concerns about equity to the staff, risk of designations affecting pledges to the operating budget, and the accounting and tax implications for the church, the board decided that the designation of donations to the church as bonuses for individual staff members will not be permitted or honored by the church. Such gifts can be made but should be made directly to the staff member.

2019-2021 Audit

We received a clean audit from Mike Rupp for the period July 1, 2019 to June 30, 2021. The audit report included three recommendations:

1. Financial policies and procedures be reviewed and documented.
2. Tree of Life and Lydia's Treasure be incorporated into the Shelby accounting system.
3. Salary letters will be provided to staff for the 2022-23 fiscal year.

A committee will be formed to review and update our financial procedures, and Pam will address the last two recommendations.

Pledge Drive

The pledge drive is in progress and will culminate with a celebration brunch on June 5 (which is also Pentecost). Pastor Matt sent a letter to the congregation with the invitation to the celebration brunch and the estimate of giving card. An on-line giving form will also be available.

Charge Conference

The Annual Charge Conference took place on Monday, May 16 and was led by District Superintendent Rev. Forrest Wells. The election of new ALB members and extension of Kathy Schluter's term as president were ratified.

Rev. Wells discussed the expected split of the Methodist denomination. The General Conference was unable to resolve the dispute regarding the Discipline's prohibition against LBGQTQ pastors and same-sex marriage in 2018 and has postponed further discussion until 2024 due to COVID. In the meantime, a conservative Methodist denomination called the Global Methodist Church was formed on May 1 for churches wishing to continue the current policy. Rev. Wells noted that abortion is another issue that is problematic for some churches and will need to be addressed.

BSA Troop 400 Update

The Conference is waiting for a response from the Boy Scouts to offered modifications to the Facility Use Agreement.

The next meeting of the ALB will be on Tuesday, June 21, at 6:30 p.m.
