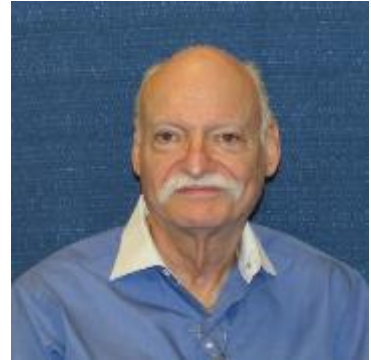


**What's Happening...thoughts from the Congregation Manager**
