In recent years, the landscape of Higher Education has become increasingly uncertain with the encroachment of the market as its defining feature. Taking over from massification as the most used neologism, marketisation now appears to have a grip on the sector that appears unwavering. This has emerged alongside the Office for Students, which now acts as the regulator ensuring inter alia value for money and sector effectiveness together with consumer choice and the quality of the student experience. However, despite their apparent disappearance, many of the original characteristics of the public realm of universities still remain embedded in the warp and weft of marketisation. So how might universities realistically challenge the power of the market and how might it be mediated for the public good? This paper will introduce the idea of 'co-opetition' as a way of obtaining the benefits of the market without its detriments.
