The Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reading 1 EX 22:20-26

Thus says the LORD: "You shall not molest or oppress an alien, for you were once aliens yourselves in the land of Egypt. You shall not wrong any widow or orphan. If ever you wrong them and they cry out to me, I will surely hear their cry. My wrath will flare up, and I will kill you with the sword; then your own wives will be widows, and your children orphans.

"If you lend money to one of your poor neighbors among my people, you shall not act like an extortioner toward him by demanding interest from him. If you take your neighbor's cloak as a pledge, you shall return it to him before sunset; for this cloak of his is the only covering he has for his body. What else has he to sleep in? If he cries out to me, I will hear him; for I am compassionate."

Reading 2 1 THES 1:5C-10

Brothers and sisters: You know what sort of people we were among you for your sake. And you became imitators of us and of the Lord, receiving the word in great affliction, with joy from the Holy Spirit, so that you became a model for all the believers in Macedonia and in Achaia. For from you the word of the Lord has sounded forth not only in Macedonia and in Achaia, but in every place your faith in God has gone forth, so that we have no need to say anything. For they themselves openly declare about us what sort of reception we had among you, and how you turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God and to await his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead, Jesus, who delivers us from the coming wrath.

Gospel MT 22:34-40

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a scholar of the law, tested him by asking, "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He said to him, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments."

“The Pharisees gathered together, and one of them, a scholar of the law, tested him.” Matthew 22:34

Jesus is a Jew. A devout Jew. A teacher. So when he is asked by this lawyer, “Which commandment in the law is the greatest?” he replies with the basic acclamation of faith of Judaism, the Shema (Deuteronomy 6:4-5): “You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind.” He then adds Leviticus 19:18: “Love your neighbor as yourself,” and notes that “The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments.”

Indeed, the first reading, from Exodus 22, is an example of the law being based on love of God and neighbor. There are three commandments there: Do not molest or oppress aliens, do not wrong widows or orphans, and lend to the poor without interest or collateral. All of these boil down to not taking advantage of people with less power than you have.

In the second reading, Paul lauds the Thessalonians for turning away from idols to serve God, which lines up pretty well with Exodus. When we make idols of wealth, or our favorite sports team, or any other hobby that keeps us from loving neighbor, we have moved away from loving God.

Institutional racism came to the fore this past summer. It is the modern American version of violating Exodus 22 and all the commandments that underlie it. Let us work for the Kingdom and support those who are working to dismantle the exclusionary disadvantages built into our society.

We made our Annual Catholic Appeal Goal! Yea!!! Thank you to all who supported the work of the Church of Western Washington! As I have mentioned many times, much of your contribution comes back to the parish in the form of central office services, such as facilities and personnel consultations, payroll servicing, and management of employee health insurance and retirement funds.



If you’re really not sure how you might fit in, take the Strength Finders assessment on the website. THANK YOU PARISHIONERS AND FRIENDS

The dear Lord and our patron St. Vincent de Paul blessed us. Thanks to you parishioners and a few special friends. In addition, we received timely help from our great King County SVdP Council celebrating its Centennial year.

During our fiscal year October 2019 through September 2020, we provided the following benefits to our neighbors:

\$72,887 in rental assistance

\$15,515 in aid to neighbors in the form of utilities, food, household goods, etc.

These involved: 74 Food Requests given; 226 Rent Requests given; 37 Utility Requests given and a total of 470 requests responded to if we include beds, furniture, gas, baby items, education and other items.

This did not include the weekly benefits of food from the parish and Leschi Market given to The Food Bank at St. Mary's.

We received \$48,919 from our parish family and a few friends which includes our savings account (Kristine Cares)

\$34,000 from our King County SVdP Council

\$5,000 from St. Joseph parish conference

We are contacting our neighbors encouraging them to apply for benefits from the King County \$41 million Eviction and Rental Assistance program. We are also working on a Block Grant program through our King County SVdP Council which will provide some rental relief for some of our neighbors.

Reflection from October 16, 2020 **We are respectful and compassionate community members who practice stewardship of God's creation with their time, talent, and treasures.**

Greetings, St. Therese Family!

As we transition more fully into the beauty of the autumn season, the beauty, grandeur, and awe-inspiring rhythms of nature are on full display. The cycle of life that occurs throughout the calendar (and liturgical) year are symbolic of our own creation, death, and eventual resurrection to eternal life. However, we likely don't think of the changing of the seasons that way. However, **we have much to learn from nature, and our faith calls us to not only be in right relationship with God and our neighbors, but also with the beautiful and bountiful Creation** that God has invited us to care for.

Our SLE for this week reminds us of our call to be stewards of God's Creation, not just by picking up litter on occasion and separating our waste, but by truly **reflecting on how we use our time, talents, and treasures (resources) to care for all of God's Creation, including our sisters and brothers.** Children often have a unique way of seeing things differently - innocently, perhaps - than adults. A few weeks ago when only a few students were left on campus, a cat wandered onto the playfield as I was supervising our after care crew. While my instincts jumped to germs, safety, and irritability, our students embraced the humble creature. Gio (Kindergarten) and Gabriel (1st Grade) approached the cat with calm voices, slow steps, and inviting gestures. The cat seemed to transition from a hostile, defensive posture to an open, affectionate state. While I insisted that our kids not touch the cat, they interacted for the better part of an hour. In observing this interaction, I was amazed. **Our students truly modeled what stewardship looks like - learning, invitation, and action.** They created a space of welcome for this cat - who eventually was named "Simba" - and seemed to reinvent themselves from high-energy elementary students to compassionate caretakers.

While this example is small, I believe it speaks to what is possible when we embrace a spiritual approach to nature, other creatures, and our fellow human beings. **We live in a time in which the fast-paced nature of life has been greatly interrupted, but what will we learn from this?** Our lives have been turned upside down, and for me at least, this has caused a lot of awareness on my own needs (social, mostly!). However, in a week where Jesus challenges us to "give to Caesar what is Caesar's and give to God what is God's," I feel called to take a different approach to reflecting on my life and current set of circumstances.

How am I using my time? Am I considering the needs of God's Creation and my fellow human beings? How am I putting my talent to use for the betterment of our world and building the Kingdom of God? God has blessed me with a unique set of gifts and talents - am I letting my light shine? Many have been hit hard financially by this pandemic, am I mindful of this with the resources that I have been blessed with? I don't fully know what God has in store for me, for my family, or for our St. Therese community, but I do know that whatever is in store, **our call is to be attentive to God's Creation and our sisters and brothers, and as our theme for the year reminds us: to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with our God.**
