

Happy Easter, St. Therese Family!

It's official – the Lenten season has come to a close. Holy Week is behind us, and the focal point of the Christian liturgical year has arrived. While Christmas may be most of our children's (and adults') favorite holiday, it is Easter that is truly the foundational miracle and the radical beginning of "The Way" as the early Church was called. It's true, without Christmas there would be no Easter to celebrate, but without Easter, Christmas wouldn't have been recorded in history. It's also true that in order to arrive at Easter, we have to journey through the Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday. There is suffering and death before there is resurrection and life. This flow, this rhythm, is not just meant to be a memory for us to recall each Spring. Rather, this flow and rhythm is the way of our very lives! We are called to be a Resurrection People, and Easter People, but to authentically be an Easter People, we must first ask ourselves how we can live our Easter faith in the world today. As always, we look to Jesus as our guide in a world and time in dire need of hope.

In his final days, Jesus recounted for his closest friends his core teachings, "Love one another as I have loved you," "There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends," "Do this in memory of me...." He showed them, by example, what faith-filled servant-leadership looked like by washing their feet before his agony in the garden. He attempted to model for them in his final hours, once again, how to pray – to unite God's will with his own, even in the face of great discomfort. He modeled obedience "even to the point of death on the cross." And in his weakest, or perhaps strongest moment, nearing his last breath, he spoke of his radical, counter-cultural love for his enemies, "Father, forgive these people, for they do not know what they are doing." He then bowed his head, and he died. Jesus never stopped teaching and modeling for us. In a time when many adults have forgotten how to respectfully engage in authentic dialogue and conversation with each other, we need not look further than to Jesus as our reminder and model – Christ the Teacher truly is The Way!

We all know that Jesus' death was not the end of the story! On that first Easter morning, Jesus rose from the dead to defy all laws of nature, expectations of humanity, and the power of evil. The Resurrection of Jesus is a testimony of God's boundless love for the world and all of us in it. We cannot explain it rationally or with scientific evidence, so we accept this on faith. Our challenge is not just to believe that Jesus rose from the dead, but to trust that Jesus rose from the dead. If we truly trust that Jesus is Risen, and that we, too, will rise with him when we are called Home, we will live our lives accordingly. This Easter season, let us all remember the hope and joy that comes with the first Easter. People dropped everything they had to follow Jesus, and they radically changed their lives as a testimony to their faith in him. We are often intentional about what we will do differently during Lent, but too often "return" to bad habits or comfortable lives once Easter arrives. This year, I challenge all of us to acknowledge the radical reality that Easter invites us into, and to live our lives with the hope and joy that this miracle demands. I believe this radical Easter lifestyle starts with how we treat one another, so let us begin this Easter season with a radical commitment to love one another as Christ loves us!
