

Symmetry and Symbolism

You may or may not have noticed, but there has been a bit of an aesthetic change in the chancel area recently, so allow me to take the time to point it out in this brief newsletter. On the Sunday of the Baptism of Our Lord we dedicated some new communion ware for use in worship: cloths, linens, individual trays, and an additional pix (which holds the host), and also some new candle lighters. That time was as good as any to shift (physically) the focus of the altar. That means the Sacrament of the Altar is in the center, whereas for who-knows-how-long it was on the side. There are two reasons for this:

Physical Symmetry of the Divine Word

Divine worship is that unique weekly experience we have wherein Jesus comes to us by the Word and Sacraments. The Christian church (especially in the Lutheran tradition) has always emphasized the Word, and we can consider the Word as embodying three different “forms”: the personal Word (who is Jesus Christ), the written Word (which is Scripture), and the spoken Word (which is preaching). All things of course are united in Christ, the divine Word through whom, for whom, and by whom all things were made and reconciled to God the Father by his Holy Spirit.

Simply put, the visual arrangement of the chancel area is now symmetrical: on one side, there is the lectern, from which we hear the written Words of Scripture; on the opposite side, there is the preached Word, which rightly distinguishes and applies that Word to the hearers; on the altar in the middle is the personal Word, the very body and blood of Jesus Christ. It's an added bonus for us that we have a crucifix painting that hangs over all as a visual representation of the same Lord. *Sola Christus (by Christ alone).*

The Altar

Altars have been used for millennia for one primary purpose: sacrifices. Since Jesus has already been sacrificed on the altar of his cross, we no longer butcher and burn animals. Neither does Jesus get sacrificed again and again. But the altar still stands as a symbol of that sacrifice. So what of the Sacrament?

Well, in our context a few things get put on the altar: the altar book (which exists to aid the pastors), the candles (which I've heard affectionately called "dinner candles," the offerings, and (of course) the elements of bread and wine that become the body and blood during the Service of the Sacrament. The offering is placed there because frankly there isn't a better place to put them. Likewise the altar book. That leaves the primary focus: since altars are sacrifices, the remembrance of Christ's sacrifice is now "front and center," as it were.

Simple, but Intentionally Meaningful.

I want to be absolutely clear: there was nothing wrong with the way things were before. Still, it's nice to have reasons for doing what we do, standing where we stand, moving the way we move, and serving the way we serve. In liturgy and worship, as in all things, these reasons reflect the centrality of Jesus Christ in our lives as he serves us with his very body and blood for the forgiveness of sins. As we worship, we do so in physical ways that help our hearts and minds focus on the true purpose and effect of worship: salvation through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Turns Out, I Learned Some Things

Last week, Pastor Matyas and I were in St. Louis, MO participating in the next round of classes for the Specific Ministry Pastor Program. I was taking a class; he was teaching one.

I don't know if you have ever been to Concordia Seminary but it is well worth a look-see if you find yourself in St. Louis with some time to pull off I-64 at Clayton Rd. Parts of the campus are newer than others, but many of the original buildings date from the around the 1920's (and others were built to match) and have a very castle-like style. Many facilities have seen multiple updates while retaining they're classic charm. It's a pretty neat combination of solid, almost Old World, look and feel with modern use and facility. Exposed beam truss ceilings, neo-gothic arched windows, lots of stone and real wood paneling, and good WIFI. Actually, If St. Paul was made of stacked limestone instead of brick, they would be very similar. One becomes aware that Christians have been at this learning thing a looong time.

It's to this place that we send normal guys like me to learn about the unknowable, comprehend the incomprehensible, and explain the inexplicable. (For you Harry Potter fans, it's basically Hogwarts for Lutherans... but we'll save that fun for another time.)

The class I was taking as a one-week intensive was called "Creedal Themes". It required reading lots of stuff by guys with names like Basil the Great, Irenaeus of Lyon, Cyril of Alexandria, Nestorius of Constantinople, Eutyches, Arius, and Athanasius. Dudes from a really looooooong time ago. What could they possibly have known that we need today?

Turns out, a lot.

But it also turns out that there is a lot we don't know (and I would suggest can't, and shouldn't). When I was a young student of theology (like "11th-Grader-In-A-Lutheran-High-School" young), and for more years than I care to admit, I really thought and was motivated by the idea that God wanted us to know Him, and so it was my goal to learn absolutely everything about Him, to find all the answers to all the questions, and to master all the things so that no one could question my Smarty-Pants status as The Guy Who Knew Things. Some would call this "putting God in a box" and I either didn't see it that way or didn't care. Either way, I was unperturbed by criticism, but really frustrated by the lack of answers out there for some of the world's burning questions.

I have for some years now been getting more and more comfortable with the answer "I don't know" to many theological questions. We have, for some time now, prepared Confirmands for Public Questioning by telling them that the answer to the question "Can you explain HOW God can be the Trinity – 3 in 1 and 1 in 3?" is "No I cannot, but I believe and confess it none the less, because it is taught in God's Word."

What's that now? God's Word draws some lines of "This/Not That" around doctrine? Huh... What do you know...?

Turns out, God has made a box, of sorts, out of Doctrine, and THAT – what He sees fit to teach us - we CAN learn. We will NEVER know EVERYTHING about EVERYTHING inside this infinitely spacious box, but we can see the lines, and – not unimportantly – we can see what is NOT in the box.

There must be lots of Gods in the universe. NOPE! There is only One God.

The Son must have been created by God. NOPE! The Son IS God.

The Holy Spirit must just be a symbol of the Father doing things. NOPE! The Holy Spirit is real, personal, and active in power for your salvation.

Jesus was just a man. NOPE! He was God the Son.

Jesus was just God making Himself look like a man dying on the cross. NOPE! God the Son, The Word in Human Flesh died for your sin and rose in victory to life so that you may also live forever.

Call it a box if you like, but God has told us all we need to know for salvation in the teachings of His Word. Anything contrary to those doctrines is outside the box, and by definition makes war on your saving Faith.

Maybe that's why, once upon a time, they built seminaries – and churches! – to look like castles. Here is a fortress of sound teaching and worship of the one God that can withstand the attacks of the enemies of your Faith.

Turns out, there's a bunch more inside that box than we'll EVER know the end of. But we'll keep learning.

I'll see you there on Sunday.

All Things Considered #7 “God is Moving in Myanmar/Burma”

This is the seventh in a series of more positive news items coming from nations which, historically, have been hostile to Christianity and to the followers of Christ. After so many years of writing about harsh negative and harmful responses to Christians it is good to see there are nations where terroristic actions are becoming less extreme. This vignette was taken from The Voice of the Martyrs 2022 Global Prayer Guide.



Last month we looked at a little story about what's happening in the sub-continent of India. The country to the east of India is the country of Myanmar/Burma. During WW2 Burma was in the thick of that terrible struggle in the CBI/Asian theater. It is a country I studied with great interest because my father spent time serving there and was part of the horrors of the tail-end of a battle called the "Burma Run." If you are interested look that battle up. Burma still experiences upheaval and many political and social unknowns. Below is a small synopsis of that harsh history from a Christian perspective.

"Myanmar has experienced great political upheaval, but front-line workers continue to minister to their predominantly Buddhist neighbors, including unreached people groups, as they are able. Indigenous missionaries are sharing the gospel, while other workers continue to support persecuted believers kicked out of their homes or villages. "Things seem uncertain.., a VOM worker in Myanmar said, "but one thing we are sure about is Jesus is still our King. Nothing happens to us without His knowledge and permission.'"

In times of troubles and trials God is there and we are thankful for His presence. The Christian church of Myanmar/Burma truly needs our prayers. Pray that those ministering there will experience success and remain faithful to their calling. Pray also that we may be found worthy of being called, Christian.
