The Irreducibly Diverse Nature of Ministry

In the 90's there were these books that were sweeping the nation's middle schools called The Magic Eye. At a glance, they just looked like nonsense—a mish-mash of color and shapes. But when you stuck your nose up to the page, crossed and unfocused your eyes, and slowly pulled back the book... voila! an image would appear from the chaos. But you can't focus your eyes or the whole thing fizzles into nothingness.

Unfortunately, I was never able to see one of these images. I still can't. All I ever managed to do was give myself a headache and make my eyeballs hurt. All around me, classmates were oohing and aahing, saying, "Hey! It's a fish! This one's a boat!" And there I sat, like some poor kid whose parents didn't let him trick-or-treat, like some loser who was allergic to everything and got picked last for kickball. "Hey Dennis, do you see it? Do you see it?" Once in a while I'd fake it and say, "Oh yeah! Cool!" But I never saw the image. I tried again this morning and decided the whole thing is a hoax. Either that or my eyesight is so perfect that I can't possibly be unfocused enough to see it. Yeah, that's it. One of those.

The longer I am a pastor the more I believe that the ministry is like these Magic Eye pictures. By ministry I mean more than just the Divine Worship and the means of grace; I mean the entirety of interactions that Christians have with Christ, with each other, and with the world. For the local gathering of Christians in a particular congregation, the whole of their lives and interactions is undefinably rich and confusing. Somewhere hidden in there is the image of Christ. Somewhere hidden in those colors is the unity of His body fleshed out in the lives of the saints. But as soon as you focus on one specific part, you lose the whole image. Oh, it's there alright, but it's only a part of the whole. The entire image cannot be reduced to the sum of its parts.

I'm old enough to remember a world view wherein the church trained its pastors to systematize and compartmentalize portions of the ministry in strategic ways with the universal goal of growing the church. My impression of such "strategic planning" has grown increasingly stale as I perceive this view treating the ministry like a business, with the pastor functioning as a CEO who passes out mandates from on high. At best, the program fails and the CEO is blamed for the loss. At worst, the saints perceive the strategies as a new law and their identity in Jesus Christ is buried under the rubble of we-tried-thats and we-used-tos. This "purpose driven" stuff is still around (train this group this way; send these people to this retreat; organize the boards in that method); but there is an

increasing number of pastors who scoff as I do at these fly-by-night strategies. Besides, if there is a silver bullet for church growth, why haven't we found it in almost 2000 years of ministry?

You can't find it because your eyes are too focused.

The body of Christ is irreducibly diverse—thus, so is the ministry. The lives of all the faithful differ in as many ways as there are people and experiences. The bigger the congregation, the more diverse the ministry. Ask a young man why he wants to date a particular girl and he'll tell you the answer—you can probably guess it. But ask a husband of sixty years why he loves his wife and he'll stare dumbly at you. There are too many reasons, too many experiences. There is so much wrapped up in that question, so much to speak of that our eyes cloud and our heads ache trying to find the answer.

So too the ministry. There are things happening that you would never even consider (but nevertheless are) "ministry". For every church potluck there's a break-room conversation about church. For every hymn sung there's a lullaby to an infant before bed. For every funeral there's a phone call sharing the grief. For every youth gathering there's an unspoken question answered that builds faith. For every welcome packet there's a smile that changes an outlook. For every retreat there's a kitchen-table devotional in the quiet morning light. You get the picture, even if you can't see it. Every speck makes up the greater image, and only by looking beyond the separate can you imagine the whole.

That's what the Ministry Center is all about. We aren't spending \$3+ million just because the road is busy (on Sunday mornings it isn't busy at all). We aren't building a new kitchen just to make funeral lunches (last year funerals were less than 5% of the kitchen usage). We aren't installing classrooms just because there isn't enough Sunday School space, or a

second door to the women's restroom just for brides to prepare. We are stepping out in faith, spending the money, building the Ministry Center because of the road and funerals and the handicapped and youth and children and Sunday School and weddings and Bible Studies and support groups and worship and family events and fellowship and whatever else you can think of. It's everything we're doing now, and everything we could be and will be doing in the future. By we I mean us, meaning you and me and you again; no mandates from on high, no "this is now our identity", but real people with real interests, gifts, and passions, all making up a diversity of ministry whose only limit is the sky. Our identity is in Christ, and we are His body. We can no sooner privilege a hand because it isn't a foot than we can privilege any single ministry in the church.

Do you see the image?

(& 5) Pray that God's mercy and grace will be very apparent in each person's life!

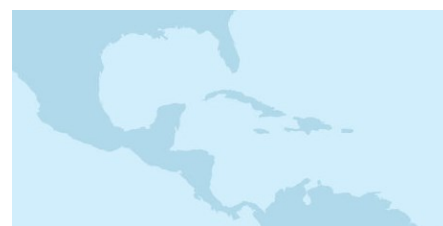
Also pray that we will be found worthy of being called "Christian" because it is the highest honor to be called by the name of Christ.

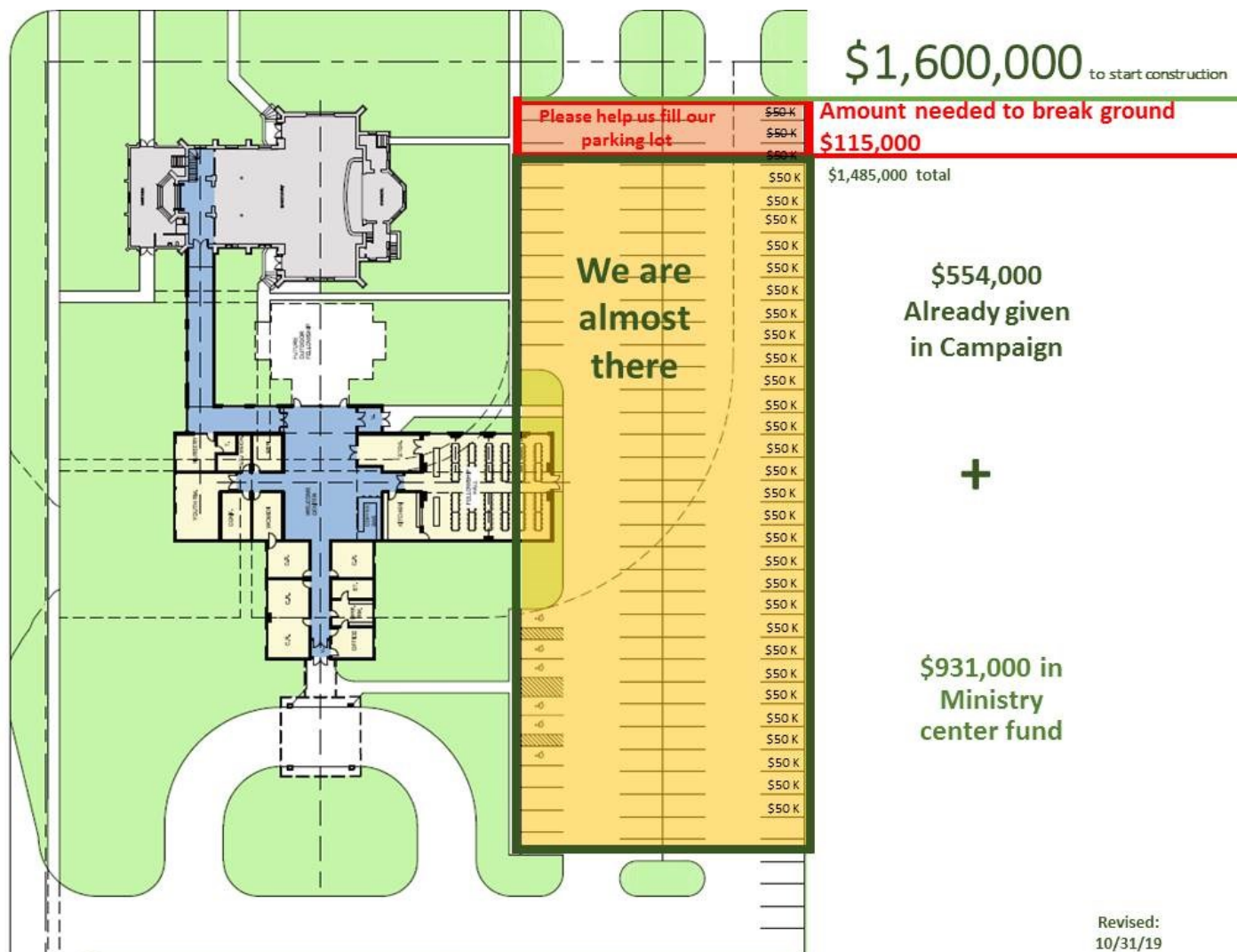
