

My Valentine

I don't know much about the modern development of Valentine's Day. That is, I don't know how it evolved from your run-of-the-mill saint day (honoring St. Valentine, who was martyred in 269 AD), to the chocolate-stained worldliness of bad dates and romantic comedies. But I recently read a little bit of the former in preparation for a chapel message at school, and I learned of certain modern practices that can be delightfully traced back to the eponymous saint. I give these stories to you with a caveat: like most hagiography, there is limited assurance in the veracity in them besides the fact that this guy existed, preached the gospel, and was killed for it. Now he's the patron saint of epilepsy and beekeeping (which seems like a dangerous combination). Nevertheless ...

In the city of Terni, northeast of Rome, in the third century, there lived a man named Valentine. Those were the days of tenuous legality for Christians, who were often violently persecuted for their faith. So it was that in the course of his vocation as a Bishop, Valentine was imprisoned for his faith. Like St. Paul before him, Valentine took the occasion to proselytize to his captor. The judge who imprisoned him put a challenge before Valentine: if he could heal the blindness of the judge's daughter, then the judge would know that Jesus was truly the resurrected Son of God.

Piece of cake. Or rather, piece of heart-shaped chocolates.

The daughter was miraculously healed, and the judge believed. Like the Philippian jailer before him, he and his entire household believed and was baptized. Valentine was set free to preach openly again. He spent much of his time consoling and ministering to the persecuted Christians of Rome and the surrounding areas. Even more poignantly, Valentine secretly performed the marriage ceremonies of Christian couples so that the men could dodge conscription into the military, which openly worshipped pagan gods. As a reminder of their vows, Valentine would cut heart shapes out of pieces of parchment and give them as gifts to the couples.

Fast forward (for who knows how long), and Valentine was arrested again. This time (again, like Paul), he managed to proselytize to the emperor himself—Claudius II. Unlike the judge from before, Claudius could not be convinced of the preacher's message either by logic, rhetoric, or miraculous sign. So it was demanded of Valentine that he renounce his faith or be executed. Unsurprisingly, Valentine chose death. Legend has it, just before his execution he wrote a short letter to the girl whose blindness he had healed so long ago. Signed: "Love, your Valentine."

Then they beat him to death with clubs and cut his head off at the Piazza in Rome.

Again, true or not (and there are other stories about him floating around in the ether), hagiography is always fascinating and encouraging to me. And as the Lutheran Confessions state, the saints who have gone before us can be looked to as examples and testimonials of the faith. So this Valentine's Day, let us remember to thank God for the work that our brother Valentine did so long ago: he proclaimed the gospel to everyone with the intensity of a young man wooing a maiden; he defied his emperor's orders for the sake of love and marriage; and he gave tokens (Valentines) to people to remind them of Christ's love and commitment toward us.

Above all, he willingly suffered the beatings and murder of his authorities rather than fall away from his faith in the one who suffered and died for him: Jesus Christ.


From the Principal's Office

Alaska Mission Update



“When pandemic restrictions in South Korea forced discipleship classes to move underground, the instructors feared they would lose the North Korean defectors they were teaching. But instead, the teachers have seen unexpected growth in their students. One student who had failed to attend training in the past was convicted to stick with the training, and she did. After completing her discipleship training, she is now preparing to minister to North Koreans as a missionary.”

And we quietly rejoice and pray for her dedication, safety and ability to reach those for Christ that God wants in His family. She probably knows the trials and terrors of becoming a missionary wherever she goes and yet she steps out to do so. Well done thou good and faithful servant! Go with God. He goes with you.

Writing of this dedication and commitment we can only pray that we will be found worthy of being called, “Christian.” The coming times are fraught with troubles and needs of which we can only imagine and yet must prepare ourselves and our families to stand strong and boldly for Jesus Christ.



A note from LCMS Missionaries, James & Christel Neuendorf

The fire, when it finally came, was the sort of non-surprise that you feel when you roll over and discover with a jolt that it is already morning and you are late for work. We were gathered together for a belated New Year's dinner with teammates on the second day of 2023 when I finally heard the phone's incessant buzzing and picked it up.

"Is this the Lutheran Church?" came the voice from the crackling line in an urgent Spanish. "Yes, this is the pastor, how can I help you?" I replied.

"Your church is on fire."

Ah, yes, that. Alarming.

I wish that I could tell you that it came as a complete surprise, like lightning out of a clear blue sky. We have been begging the city to do something about the collapsed wooden ruin leaning dangerously near our building for years. Drug users often hole up in the ruin and sometimes light fires. Of course this was always going to happen, but now it had.

"We are on our way." I told the voice and soon we were; changing gears in a more than metaphorical way.

Although the face of it was deeply scarred, with the historic balcony and solid cedar doors from the glory days of Ponce turned to charcoal, glass shattered and melted from the heat; inside the building barely a hair was out of place. We were open for ministry again the very same week.

The blaze lit up the sky for miles, it was such a conflagration that when we reached the police cordon and needed to park, it seemed like there was no chance that anything would remain of our ministry center. As we walked up the street, waves of heat radiated from the ruin in a vision from Dante; brave firemen silhouetted against the glow, pouring water endlessly against the walls of our mercy house, standing like Abednego in the midst of the fire; incredibly preserved.

Once again, the Lord preserved us from disaster, and once again He used it immediately to provide blessing. There was an outpouring of support and interest from the community, neighbors came out to see what had happened and before long our list of people to visit and pray for grew longer and longer. An astonishing number of volunteers from our homeschool ministry and ESL classes came and helped us clean up the rubble and the glass. Our ministry appeared on Telemundo during prime-time across the entire island. We held a banquet to thank the fire-fighters and the sergeant said that in 25 years we were the only victims to thank the men who fought the fire. We are now in the process to see if the city will grant us the neighboring property to incorporate into our campus.

All of this was surprising, and yet not surprising. Was it not obvious that the fire would come eventually? Was it not obvious that the Lord would preserve what was important to Him and use even evil things to bless His people and share His Gospel? Hasn't He promised to be with us and accomplish His good and gracious will? Do we even learn anything from reading the scriptures every day?

"Why are you standing there looking into the sky?" said the angel to the disciples at the Lord's ascension. Didn't He tell you all along what He was doing? But they were amazed, and surprised, even shocked. As dismayed as they were at the arrest and crucifixion, as surprised to see Jesus die like He said He would, as astonished that He rose on the third day. How many examples would it take for them to stop being surprised?

Dear friends of the mission in Puerto Rico, here is a lesson for every disciple which you may learn together with us for those sleepless nights of anxiety:

How many disasters will you need to be preserved through before you get it? How many acts of God that show that He has a plan and that the Christ who died for you is sitting on the throne in heaven? How often will His promises need to be proven true before your very eyes? How many times does He need to tell you that He loves you, forgives you, and shines His face upon you and gives you peace... for you to at last realize that the thing you dread, which you can see is going to happen if nothing is done to stop it, is in His Hands?

Nothing can stop the work of Jesus. Not hurricanes or earthquakes, not plagues or fires, not wars or evil men, not the government, not even your own failures or weaknesses! The only direction is forward, and up.

Why are you standing there looking into the sky?

Do you know where your truest Friend is sitting?
