Chops Don't Fail Me Now

This past summer I bought myself a “new” trombone. A silver Olds with an F-slide, to be precise. It was used, off eBay, and there’s a sticker on the case with the fall football schedule of some high school team in Alabama, 1979. Oh, the stories this thing could tell, and the memories that came flooding back.

The day I got it I polished it up, pursed my lips, and ... *phew* ... was reminded immediately that I haven’t played the trombone in over 10 years. There’s a reason why no one says, “It’s just like playing a trombone.” It isn’t a bike. There are specific muscles in your face and mouth used for brass instruments that, like any muscle, grow weak if unused for a long time. So if you don’t keep your “chops” up you’ll feel it sooner rather than later.

I needed to get my chops back because a friend asked me (and Vicar) to play brass during the main Divine Service at our annual All Pastors Conference in Boyne Mountain. Sure, it wasn’t really taxing music—more of a “pick up and play” situation with just a few hymns, a Sanctus, and a postlude—but again, picking up and playing after a decade of *not* would have meant a blown out embouchure before the service was even half over.

So I practiced. After a few weeks, the muscles came back and I could play for longer: 10 minutes, 20 minutes, 30 minutes. Still nowhere near the endurance I had in my heyday, standing on the sidelines of a football game blasting out Chicago’s “25 or 6 to 4” and Pink Floyd’s “Money” at top volume. But it was enough for the more genteel setting of a Lutheran worship service.

Incidentally, one of the themes of the conference was on Christian identity and how we all need to strengthen our core spiritual practices for the culturally dark days ahead. Not quite a “circle the wagons” doomsday scenario, but rather a refocus on who we really are as Christians. In the face of so much evil outside of the church, we need to keep our chops up: worship regularly (*in church*), read the Bible, pray continually, be around other Christians, focus on your family. Get strong in peaceful (or at least neutral) times so that in hard times you know what to do and how to pray.

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I'm reminded of a fairly new Big Band jazz standard I played in high school called "Chops Don't Fail Me Now" by Dominic Spera. The song was fairly tricky, but it kicked. It was sloppy yet sharp in all the right ways befitting a jazz band. But yes, as the name says, you needed good chops. If we played that song towards the end of a set, your cheeks were screaming. Toward the end of the song you literally thought, "Chops don't fail me now!" Like the last pushup before your arms give out or the final stretch of a footrace. Endurance wasn't just beneficial; it was necessary.



I don't know what the future holds, but Christians need stronger chops as a rule. To repeat what one of the speakers at the conference said (his name was Rod Dreher), "I am not optimistic about the future. But I have hope." I agree: I frankly don't believe in my fellow man. I think the real miracle is that anyone does any good at all. I think humanity is just as wicked, selfish, and irrational as it always has been. I think our current culture is getting worse, and maybe headed to the brink of another internal combustion. No, I'm not optimistic about the world *at all*. But I do have hope. I have hope that the Lord will sustain his church and send millions of hurting people into the arms of faithful Christian congregations. I have hope that Christ will continue

to be our constant bulwark against a godless cultural maelstrom, even when our faith is vilified more and more in the public square. I have hope that the Holy Spirit will strengthen our chops so we can make it to the final postlude.

As Jesus said about the End Times, *"Because lawlessness will be increased, the love of many will grow cold. But the one who endures to the end will be saved. And this gospel of the kingdom will be proclaimed throughout the whole world as a testimony to all nations, and then the end will come."* (Matt. 24:12-14)

If the following essay seems brusque or heavy on the snark, please forgive me and understand that it is coming from a frustration with those who would continue to say that the World is fine, and not out to enrich itself at the cost of your kids' mental and emotional health. They are generally not on your side, and the data shows that.

Dear Parents,

It has come to my attention that you would like some counsel on internet and social media use for your kids. My advice will be different, depending on the age of your children. I will attempt to pass on to you what the people who design and produce the environments and algorithms that control much of cyber-space allow for their own children. (hint: it is as little as possible)

To begin with, have you been training your children in righteousness by sharing with them a knowledge and love of Scripture, bringing them regularly to the Lord's House for worship and spiritual feeding, and indoctrinating them in their true identity as a child of God and a servant of Christ? GOOD! Keep doing that! As far as the On-line world goes, it's mostly a pack of wolves that I'll try to help you navigate.

Let's start at the top: High Schoolers. It is nearly impossible for a high school student to function without a phone, tablet, or computer capable of communicating over the internet. Many parents find it convenient and comforting to know that their student has a phone so that they can communicate with them as needed, particularly if they have a driver's license. This, of course means a smart phone, and so the entire world is in the palm of the student's hand. By this time you will have taught your teenager what is expected of a Christian interacting with the world, and if they are an older teen approaching adulthood, there is very little left for you to do besides advise and influence. Very soon all the choices will be theirs. The pressure to follow their peers into interacting with the worst people on the planet in the worst ways is great, and they lack fully developed brain of an adult to help them make good decisions.

I recommend that you make sure you have the ability to access their phone (which you are most likely paying for for your convenience) so that, as Godly Christian teens, they know that they are in fact still accountable to others, their parents in particular. You can decide how much you are willing to trust your children, but you must be able to pull the reigns in if they prove to be unable to make good decisions.

If you have middle school aged kids, they too will be expected to use the internet for things like school work, and many entertainment options (e.g. games and videos) today can only be accessed with an internet connection. Most internet-capable games have a play option that allows them to interact with real people in the game setting (hopefully with a permission level filter where you can control who is interacting with your child). My recommendation is simple. If you do not chose to say, "Sorry, but no." to these types of activities where there is potential for predatory or unchristian behavior, you must be in control and monitor what your middle schooler is doing on-line and with whom. Use software to filter unwanted sites, limit the amount of time they are allowed to engage in this activity, and have the equipment in a public place. If at all possible, do not allow them to have their own device, but use the family technology, learning the important skill of taking turns. Purely social media sites that exist solely to exchange communication and identity (like Instagram, Snap-chat, etc.) and video platforms (TikTok, YouTube, etc.) are extremely popular, extremely addictive, and extremely detrimental to the healthy development of a pre-teen/young teen, not limited to but particularly bad for girls. Jr. High is already the deepest pit in hell: don't make it worse by allowing you child to be exposed to the poison that is the world's opinion of them.



If your children are in lower-to-middle elementary grades, do not allow any unsupervised internet activity of any kind. Again, make sure the equipment is in the main area of the house, limit the amount of time, and monitor, monitor, monitor the content, because it is a very small percentage of the internet that actually has your child's best interest in mind. Social media and networking is right out. Pick up YOUR phone, text or call another parent, and set up a playdate for your child to socialize. Really. Social media = Just don't.

If they are younger than elementary school, when it comes to the internet, if you are not present, in control of, and aware of the source and content, again, give them the gift of 'No'. The best research is showing us that not only is the possibility of damaging content high, but the screen time itself is not good for early childhood brain development. Children's brains need to develop the ability to live in a 3 dimensional world where the laws of physics apply, and they need to develop the interpretive framework and skills to be able to understand this reality.

Research is showing that children of this age who have too much screen time do not develop these important abilities, because the work of interpreting the world into informational packets the mind can picture and think about is already done on the 2D screen. They cannot make their own mental representational pictures (listening to/imaging a story for instance) of the 3D world, because their brain has never had to do this work.

In short, the on-line world is a cesspool of the worst of humanity, flowing with currents of filth, but dotted with islands of useful and important information and experiences. Why would any parent turn their child loose in that environment, even with copious amounts of moral training and Christian up-bringing? Why would you send your child into a pack of wolves wearing a suit made of lunch meat? You would only do so out of necessity, with strong protections and your immediate presence whenever possible.

Pray for your Pastor, Vicar, and Day School Teachers.

One of the areas of mission work that LWML feels strongly about is the work that goes on in each and every congregation. One of the most important jobs a congregation member can do is to pray for their workers. Your professional church workers NEED and covet your prayers!! They are the frontline to the ministry that happens here at St Paul. They need to be lifted up in prayer and encouraged each and everyday from the congregation who supports them! Over the next few months we will include prayers that you can use to pray for the people God has Called to serve us here at St Paul! We will start with prayers for Pastor and Vicar.

1. Pray that your pastors will always have a passion to know Christ more intimately.

Prayer: Father, help our pastors to know Christ and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of sharing in His sufferings (Philippians 3:10). Since we know of their faith in the Lord Jesus and their love for all the saints, may we never stop giving thanks for them, always remembering them in our prayers. We will keep asking that You, the glorious Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, will give them the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that they may know You better (Ephesians 1:15-17).

2. Pray that your pastors will minister out of a humble spirit.

Prayer: Lord God Almighty, would You help our pastors to humble themselves before You and under Your mighty hand, so that You will lift them up (James 4:10; 1 Peter 5:6)? May You, the God of hope, fill our pastors with all joy and peace as they trusts in you, so that they may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit (Romans 15:13).

4. Pray that your pastors will be persons of prayer and of the Word (Acts 6:4) in order to live a holy and pure life.

Prayer: Glorious God, we pray that our pastors will seek You with all of their hearts. Help them never to stray from Your commands. May they hide Your Word in their hearts so that they will not sin against You (Psalm 119:10-11). Give them a deep desire to meditate on Your precepts and to consider Your ways. May they delight in Your decrees and never neglect Your Word (Psalm 119:15-16). Give them understanding so that they will keep your law and obey it with all of their hearts. Direct them in the path of Your commands where they will find delight. Turn their hearts toward Your statutes and not toward selfish gain, and turn their eyes away from worthless things. Preserve their lives according to Your Word (Psalm 119:34-37).

5. Pray for the families of your pastors.

Prayer: Gracious Lord, may our pastors fear You so that they will have a secure fortress that will always be a refuge for their children (Proverbs 14:26). May they consistently teach their children to revere Your commands by following their example (Psalm 34:11), so that they might be blessed (Psalm 112:1-2). Help them to manage their families well so that their children will obey them with proper respect (1 Timothy 3:4-5).....

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May husbands love their wives just as Christ loved the Church (Ephesians 5:25). Help them to be considerate and respectful to their wives so that nothing will hinder their prayers (1 Peter 3:7). Help them to have a good reputation with outsiders, so that they will not fall into disgrace and into the devil's trap (1 Timothy 3:7). May You, the God of peace, equip our pastors with everything good for doing Your will, and may You work in them what is pleasing to You, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. 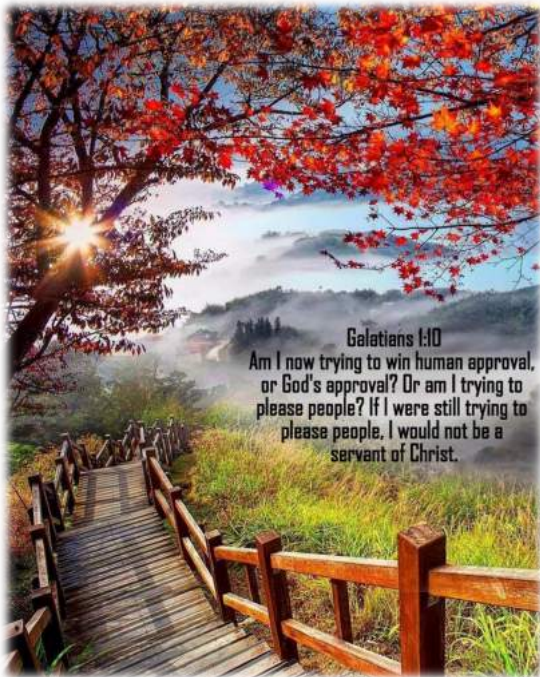

People are finding ultra-orthodox Islam to be so repulsive and restrictive that they are questioning what they're being told by the religious leaders. They are beginning to look elsewhere for faith filled living. There is a God-shaped hole in each heart that seeks to be filled. Praise God they are searching and reaching out to Christ for His peace, mercy, grace and hope.

We give humble thanks that Iranians are coming to Christ in such a hostile environment. We rejoice that God uses whatever avenue is open for His word to invade even Iran!

One of the small victories for Christ at work follows giving us a glimpse into the lives of searchers for true and lasting faith. “Tala, new believer from a Muslim family, was surprised one day to find her brother reading a New Testament and her sister working on a crossword puzzle in a Christian magazine. All the answers to the puzzle her sister told her, were found in the Bible. A Christian worker had secretly delivered the Bible and Christian magazine to their family's home, and Tala's siblings were interested. Tala then took the opportunity to start sharing about her new faith with her family. “Pray for them to find Jesus,” she said. Front-line workers are finding creative ways to share the gospel with many in Iran who are seeking truth.”

1. Camp LuLayLea
 - A. Camp Licensing Report from inspection of 7/19/2022
 1. Camp is in compliance with Michigan Dept. of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs
 2. Report erroneously indicates: Camp zip line was inspected on June 1, 2022, that winter sports equipment was in use and that the Rock Climbing Wall was inspected by the manufacturer on 5/19/22.
 - a) Erroneous information contained in the Licensing report was brought to the attention of Samuel Love, LARA Consultant, and will be corrected by LARA.
 - B. Financial year end Projected Receipts and Expenses
 1. Receipts \$126,700.00
 2. Expenses \$159,000.00
 3. Ending Cash Balance : \$23,746 resulting in a net change in cash balance of (\$32,300.00)
 4. Full financial report may be inspected by church council members by appointment.
 - C. Last session of camp closed on Monday due to COVID outbreak among campers and staff.
 1. Early camp closing was very organized and was performed with great skill and care for the campers and staff was paramount.
 2. All families were timely notified and pick-up of campers was very orderly.
 - D. Fundraising efforts are underway to make up for the shortfall and to pay for unforeseen expenses.
 - E. Camp Director and Camp Staff outperformed expectations and are to be congratulated.
2. KERYX Prison Ministry
 - A. Prisons are again open to volunteers
 1. Ron Reuther and Tom DePrekel have been attending weekly groupings with the inmates and other volunteers at the Thumb Correctional Facility in Lapeer on Thursday evenings. Both pay for their own travel
 2. Tom DePrekel has been attending monthly Ultreya meetings with inmates at the URF/Chippewa prison in Kinross, MI in the U P. Pays for own travel and meals.
 3. NOTE: Saginaw Regional Facility in Freeland is closed due to COVID outbreak, as are other facilities in the state. Thumb Correctional Facility in Lapeer closed again last week until further notice due to COVID outbreak.
 4. Chippewa Correctional Facility has a KERYX Prison 4 day weekend scheduled for Nov 3-6, 2022, with 48 candidates who will participate in their first KERYX weekend. This is all subject to COVID restrictions which may be put in place. PLEASE PRAY!
 5. One of the Correctional Facilities in Ionia has invited KERYX to put on a weekend in their facility. Training an inside team has begun and weekly meetings are taking place.
 6. Thumb Correctional Facility has indicated that the probability of a KERYX Weekend in January is being considered, as long as the COVID restrictions are lifted by then. If so, St Paul may again be asked to host the overnight team training. I have asked the KERYX leadership to tour our new facility.

3. LUTHERAN UNIVERSITY at local colleges
