Welcome the Dahans! A Strong Start for the Refugee Resettlement Ministry



Patience and grace filled Marnie Kerr's response to her family member's statement that, "this whole effort seems so inefficient". She replied simply, "Of course it is a bit chaotic, it is called a refugee *crisis* for a reason." Despite the hurry-up-and-wait that St. Martin's newly formed Refugee

Resettlement Ministry has been through this fall, on Wednesday, December 14th the group joyfully welcomed a four-member Syrian family to their new home in Mt. Airy.

The story of how we got to this joyful Advent welcome begins this past spring when St. Martin's leadership authorized the establishment of St. Martin's Refugee Resettlement Ministry. Spurred by concern for

the global refugee crisis, especially out of Syria, several parishioners gathered to begin the exploration of hosting refugee families. Energy for the ministry is abundant, and in June the decision was made to co-sponsor a Syrian college student, Samra, who is now attending LaSalle University. Later in August, The Rev. Jarrett Kerbel and his wife, The Rev. Dr. Alison Boden, decided to answer the call to house a Syrian high school student. Mohamad joined

this bustling teenagerfilled household in order to attend a local Friends school.

In September the ministry agreed to host a 13-member refugee family, coming from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, through our partner Bethany Christian Services, a local organization authorized by the Federal Government to resettle refugees. The call went out immediately for hands,

money, and donations. Within 24 hours a home was secured and furnished. Within 36 hours nearly everything on the donation request list was donated or signed up for. Donations of household goods, clothing, small appliances, toys, and personal care products poured into the drop-off area in the church's narthex (entryway). Just as quickly, team members picked up the items and brought them to the home.

Throughout the fall, the ministry awaited word on the final travel arrangements for the Lubandas, the Congolese family we were expecting. On October 7th, a 50th birthday party celebration for Jarrett also served as a fundraiser for the Refugee Resettlement Ministry, bringing in over \$4,360. Marnie Kerr sent out regular updates while Hal Taussig began training people in French and Swahili in order to welcome and communicate with the family. In November two educational fundraising events were held. People learned more about the Democratic Republic of the Congo,

Planned Giving: A Perpetual Gift

When you do your estate planning and you consider leaving a planned gift to support future ministry at St. Martin's, think about making a perpetual pledge!

In other words, make a gift to the endowment that will generate your annual giving for as long as the church exists past your lifetime. As a rule of thumb, make a gift to the endowment 20 times your annual gift and you will achieve the perpetual pledge level. So, if you give \$2,000 per year to St. Martin's consider an estate plan gift of \$40,000 to St. Martin's endowment.

We believe in Planned Giving and growing the endowment at St.

Martin's because both open doors for ministry! Our land and building were a gift of the Houston family.

These and other gifts have kept our ministry thriving and expanding.

The endowment makes it possible for people of many different income levels to enjoy St. Martin's without the pressure of making large annual gifts.

Here are some ideas of ministries that you could fund in perpetuity:

- A \$80,000 gift would support a paid secion leader position in our choir.
- A \$100,000 gift would support our grounds maintenance costs.
- A \$500,000 gift would support our Youth Ministry position.

A new ministry of congregational care at St. Martin's

"Build on our strengths" is the Rector's congregational development guide star. "In giving and receiving care, we encounter Christ" is a core value at St. Martin's. The root of our new "Care Captains" ministry is our congregation's wonderful ability to rally around families experiencing a crisis or a life-event that requires extra support and resources. In conversation with members of the congregation who have naturally ministered in this way, the staff are working to create a "Care Captains" group who will make themselves available to coordinate basic forms of care for families who ask for assistance. For example: If you give birth to octuplets and your family could use help with

meals and changing diapers, etc. You would call any staff member and we would then ask a Care Captain to organize the congregation's response to your situation. We envision a ministry focused on the basics of meals, transportation, respite, friendly visits, and prayer. The ministry will supplement the work of Stephen Ministry and round out our core value: "In giving and receiving care, we encounter Christ." Look for an opportunity to learn more in February 2017. The Care Captains will be coordinated through the hospitality committee.

the culture, the people, the customs, and the reasons that people are leaving. Over \$1,000 more was raised or pledged for the ministry between the two events.

In early December, a call came from Bethany Christian Services that the Lubandas, were no longer on the resettlement list and would no longer need hosting. Instead they offered the opportunity to host a Syrian family expected on December 14th and the Refugee Resettlement Ministry kicked into action adjusting its arrangements to accommodate this new family.

This brings us back to our welcome of the Dahans. Arriving were Sameer: age 40, who has worked as a tailor and in a sweet shop; Sameer's wife, Majidah: age 26; their son Ayman, age 7, and one-year-old daughter Iman. Joining the ministry representatives at the welcome was Samra, who helped greatly with translation. Ministry members settled the Dahans into their home the same evening that many enjoyed a *Messiah* Sing-Along at the church, at which we raised another \$720 for the ministry.

The depth of need is the undercurrent to the success of this ministry so far. Thousands of Syrians, like members of the Dahan family, flee their country every day. They often decide to escape after seeing their neighborhoods bombed or family members killed. The risks on the journey to the border can be as high as staying: families

walk for miles through the night to avoid being shot at by snipers or being caught by warring factions who will kidnap young men to fight for their cause. According to the U.N., about 11 million Syrians have been displaced from their homes - enough people to fill roughly 200 Yankee Stadiums. This includes about 4.8 million refugees who have been forced to seek safety in neighboring countries.

We also appreciate your prayers for this ministry. Please keep the Dahans, the Lubandas, Samra, Mohamad, our partners at Bethany Christian Services, and all the members of St. Martin's Refugee Resettlement Committee in your prayers.

What happened to the Lubandas?

Here is the context that determines their circumstances: The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) is mandated by its Statute and the UN General Assembly Resolutions to undertake resettlement as one of the three durable solutions. Of the 14.4 million refugees of concern to UNHCR around the world, less than one percent is submitted for resettlement.

In 2015, UNHCR submitted the files of over 134,000 refugees for consideration by resettlement countries. Bethany Christian Services and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services (our partners) are authorized by the federal government to resettle refugees. However, they do not have access to the UNHCR refugee files nor are they privy to how many refugees the UNHCR is attempting to resettle in the US at any given time. Therefore when the Lubandas were moved off the UNHCR resettlement list, we were not given any information as to why they were moved, where they are or how long the wait will be until they are once again back on the list for travel. This is why we decided to go ahead say yes to another family on the list. We are still praying for the Lubandas, that they may have the opportunity they have been waiting and hoping for.





Reading with the Rector

"After Ten Years: A Reckoning made at New Year 1943" by Dietrich Bonhoeffer

Start the New Year exploring the wisdom of Dietrich Bonhoeffer in his reflection on the ten years leading up to 1943 and their meaning for him and for the church. Originally a Christmas letter shared between Bonhoeffer and friends in the German resistance movement, these 15 pages serve as the prologue to *Letters and Papers From Prison*, a collection of the German pastor's writings. In "After 10 Years," Bonhoeffer examines his own conscience and writes:

"Only the one for whom the final standard is not his reason, his principles, his conscience, his freedom, his virtue, but who is ready to sacrifice all these, when in faith and sole allegiance to God he is called to obedient and responsible action: the responsible person, whose life will be nothing but an answer to God's question and call."

Challenging reflection ahead for all who wish to follow God. You can either take a free photocopy of the chapter from the folder in the Parish House foyer or you can buy the book *Letters and Papers from Prison*.




