

The Life and Witness of Pauli Murray: An All-Ages Study

Join us this February for an all-ages study of the life and legacy of Pauli Murray—poet, priest, civil rights lawyer, theologian, and saint of the Episcopal Church—whose courage and faith continue to shape both our church and our nation.

We will begin on **Sunday, February 8, (9:40-10:15 a.m.)** with a conversation for all ages in the Houston Room using the book [Pauli Murray: Shouting for the Rights of All People](#), an accessible and engaging introduction to Pauli's life and work (ages 6+). Our study will then continue on **Sunday, February 28 (3 - 5 p.m.)** with a viewing and discussion of the powerful documentary [My Name is Pauli Murray](#), also in the Houston Room.

Pauli Murray's witness helped lay the legal and moral groundwork for desegregation, women's equality, and LGBTQ+ rights in the United States. As the first Black woman ordained an Episcopal priest, and now honored as a saint in our church's calendar, Pauli's life also calls us to see how faith, justice, and identity are deeply intertwined.

Together, we will reflect on themes of privilege and exclusion, faith and resilience, race and gender, belonging and belovedness—listening for how Pauli's story speaks to our own lives and to our call as Christians today.
