Dr. Beatrice Adera, Associate Professor of Special Education, researches the educational needs of English Language Learners, the untold struggles of voluntary immigrants, and refugee families.

Dr. Michael Gawrysiak, Assistant Professor of Psychology and licensed clinical psychologist , has extensive experience providing mindfulness-based interventions (MBIs) to help those with severe stress, PTSD, depression, and drug and alcohol addiction.

Dr. Stevie Grasseti, clinical psychologist and Assistant Professor of Psychology. Her research focuses on school-based interventions for disadvantaged youth who have been exposed to trauma and other difficult life events.
