Methodology – Survey Specifications

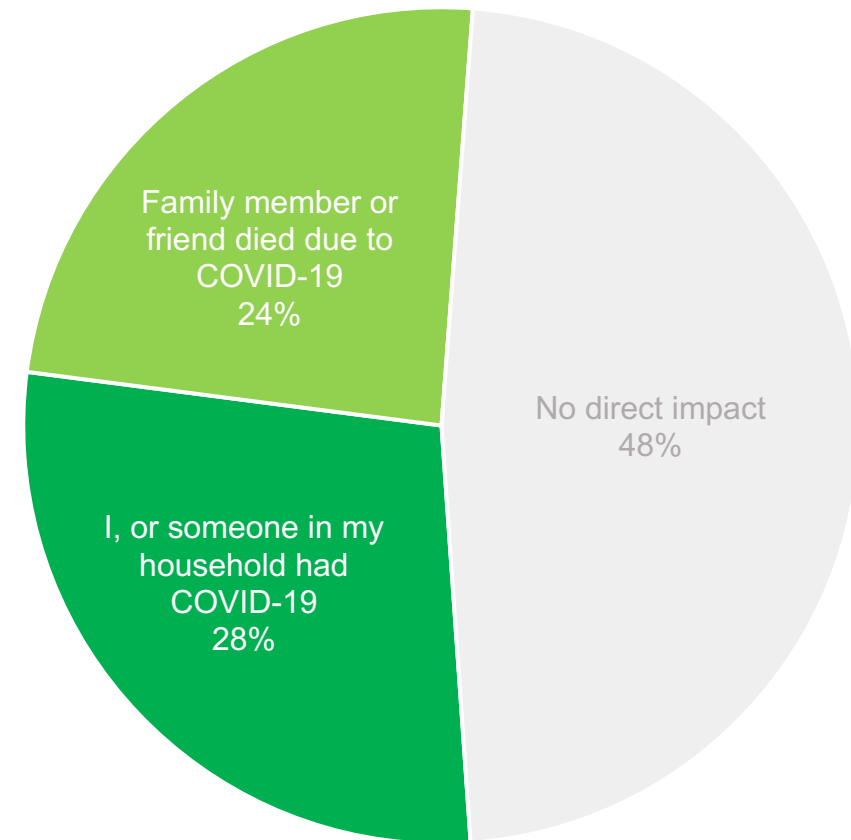
The state-wide survey, which along with an identical survey of Latino leaders across the state and a demographic landscape analysis, provides a comprehensive view of the “state of Latinos in New Mexico”

- The survey was conducted with a sample of Latino adults (N = 1,000 / +/- 3.1%) across the state of New Mexico.
- The survey has an oversample of immigrants (n=245) to ensure that the views of all Latinos across the state are represented.
- Field Dates: December 8 – December 29, 2021
- Data was collected through a blended approach including web-based and telephone interviews (both landlines and cell phones).
- The survey was conducted in both English and Spanish with 33% of interviews conducted in Spanish.

COVID-19 Continues to Devastate the Latino Community in New Mexico

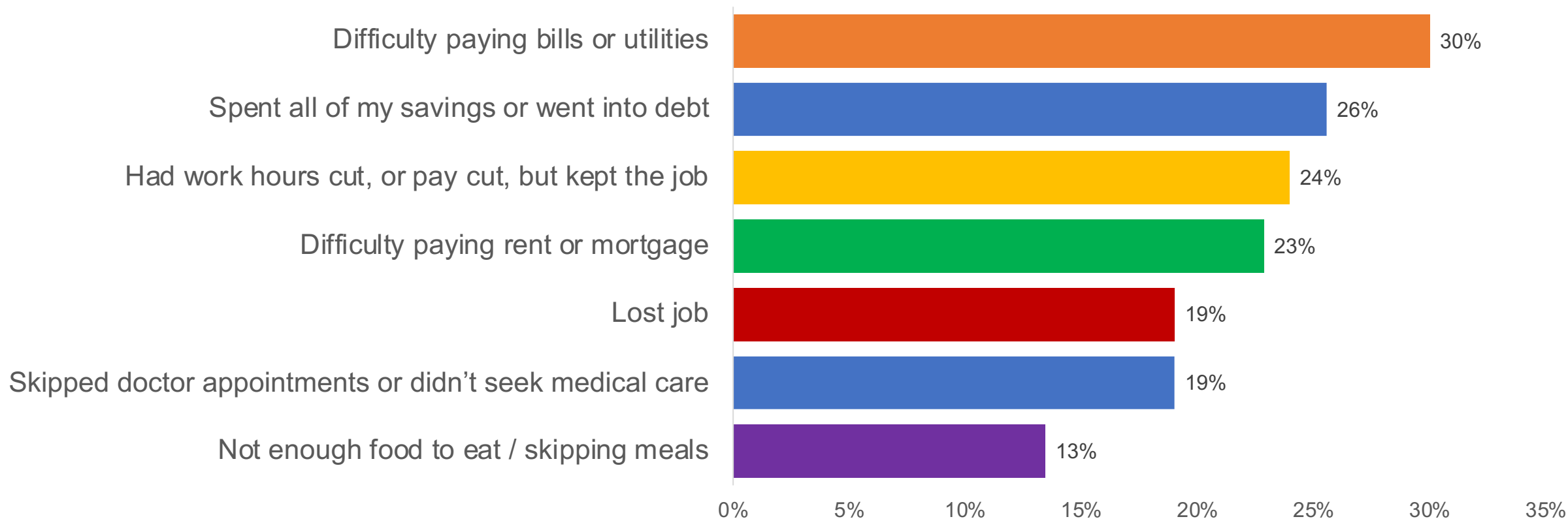
- 28% of respondents reported themselves or someone in their household having COVID-19
- 24% had a family member or friend die due to COVID.
- Department of Health data suggests:
 - Latinos in New Mexico have suffered higher hospitalization and casualty rates than non-Hispanic whites.
 - Hispanics are twice as likely to be hospitalized than whites.

During the past year due to the coronavirus pandemic, did you, or anyone in your household experience any of the following?



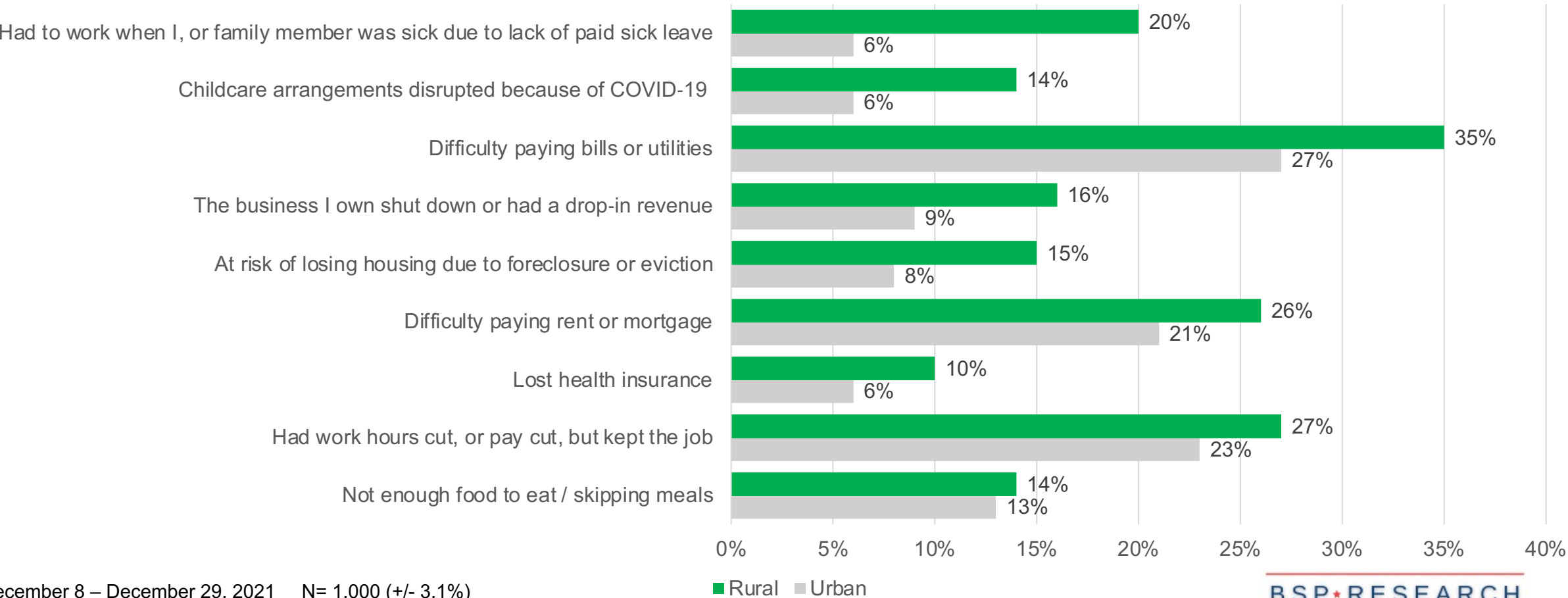
Economic Impact of COVID-19 on Latinos in NM

During the past year due to the coronavirus pandemic, did you, or anyone in your household experience any of the following? (% yes)



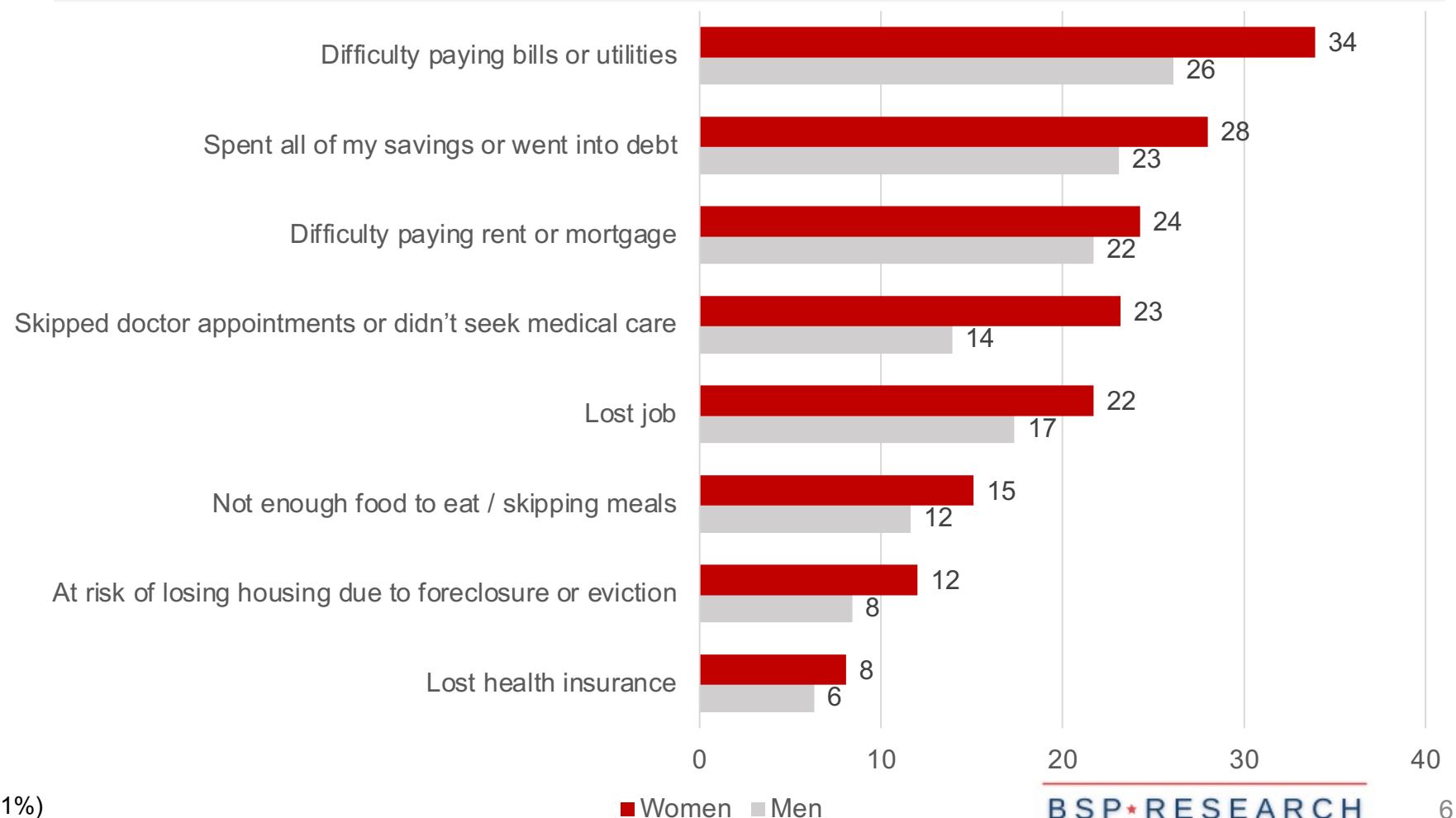
Economic Impact of COVID-19 on Latinas in NM

The survey suggests that **Latinas are having a more difficult time economically** during the pandemic

This includes:

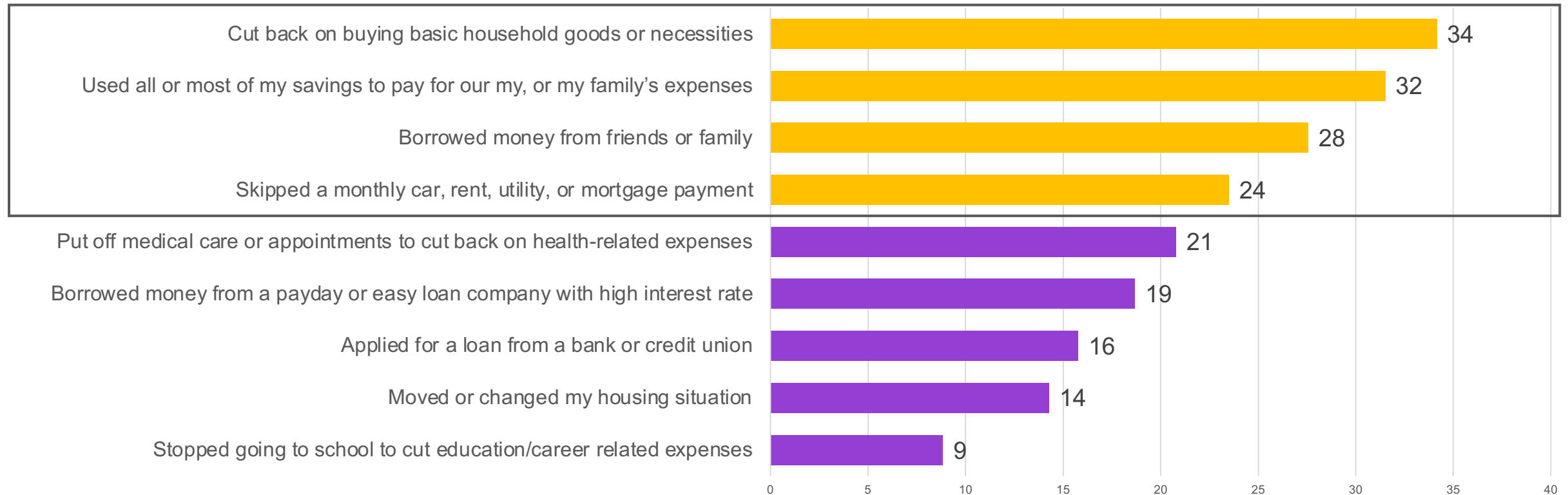
- being more likely to: have difficulties paying for their bills or utilities (+14%),
- to have lost a job (+5%), or
- to have spent all their savings/went into debt (+4%).

During the past year due to the coronavirus pandemic, did you, or anyone in your household experience any of the following? (% yes)

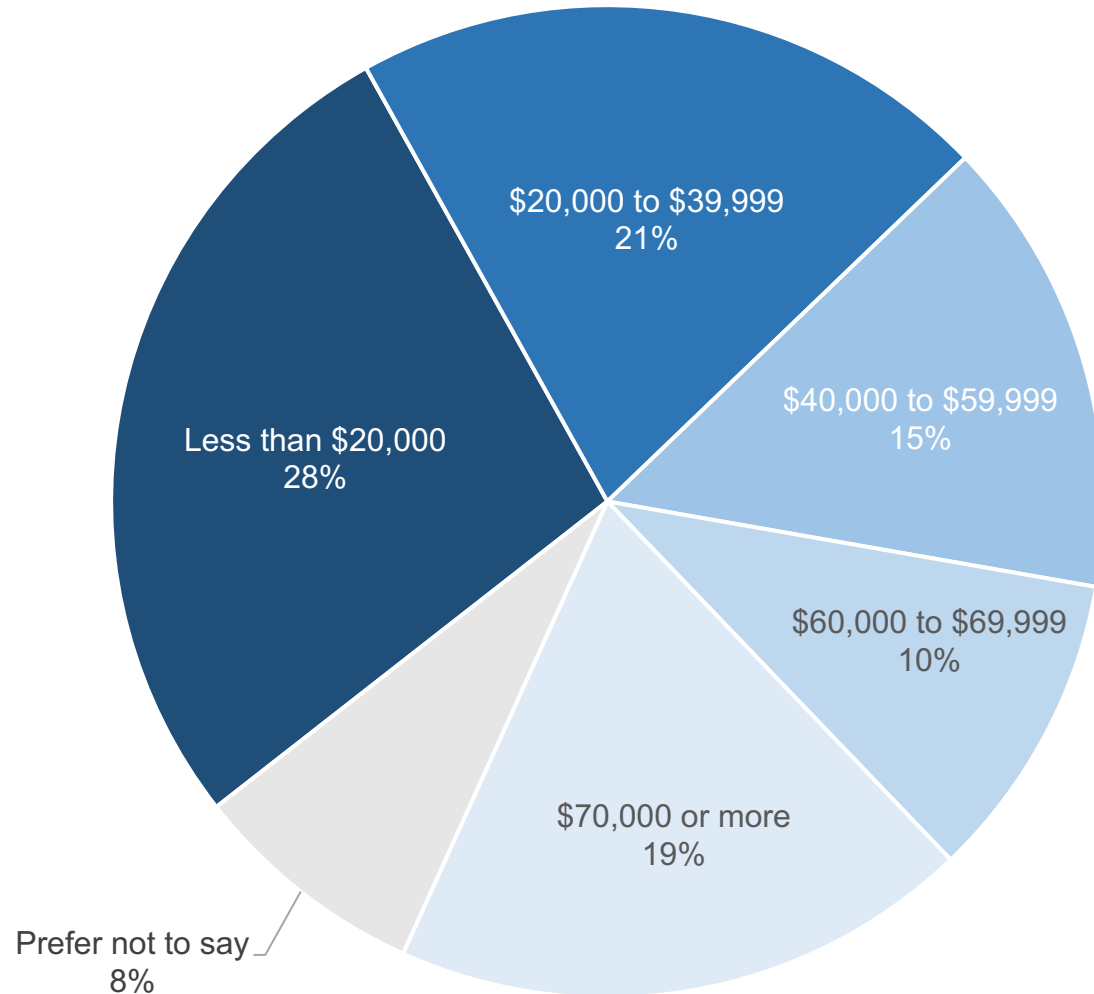


Economic Actions in Response to Pandemic

Household Income of Respondents



Overall, 28% of Hispanics across the state reported making less than \$20,000 annually in 2020 before taxes, including:

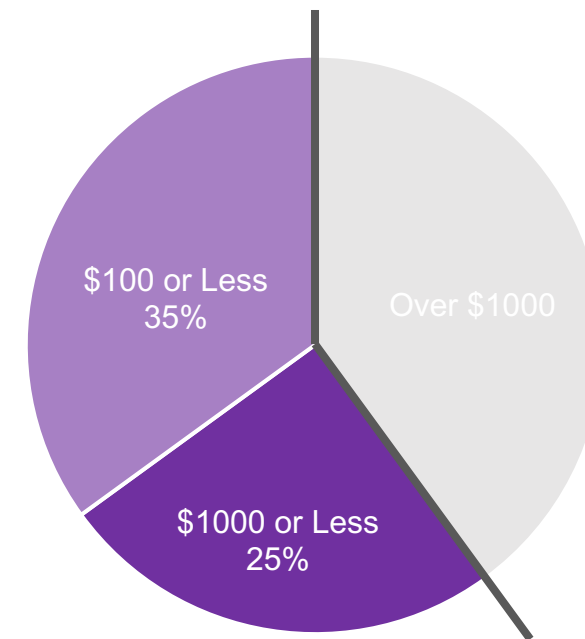
- 35% among Latinas
- 34% in NM-CD1
- 36% among Spanish dominant Latinos.

Latino's in New Mexico Have Very Limited Savings to Fall Back on During This Challenging Time

An alarming 60% of New Mexico's Hispanic population have only \$1,000 or less in savings for financial emergencies, 35% with an astonishing \$100 or less

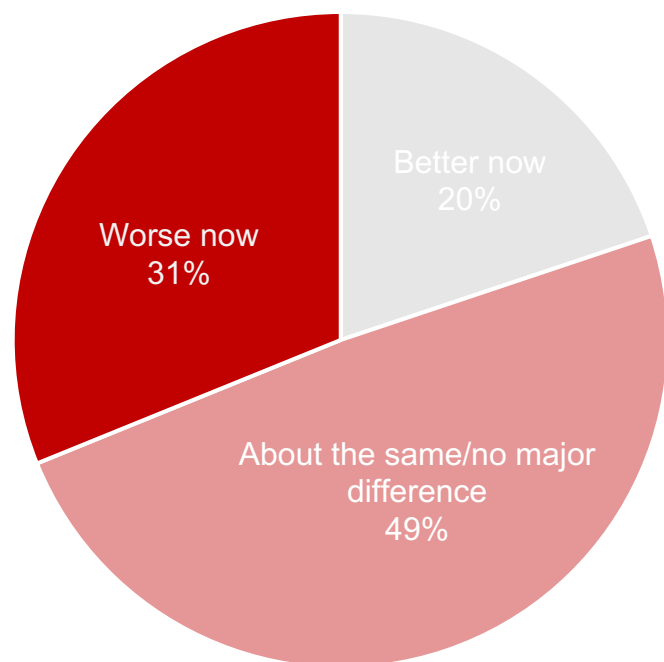
Savings Accounts

Financial Situation is Worse Now For 1/3 of Latinos in NM

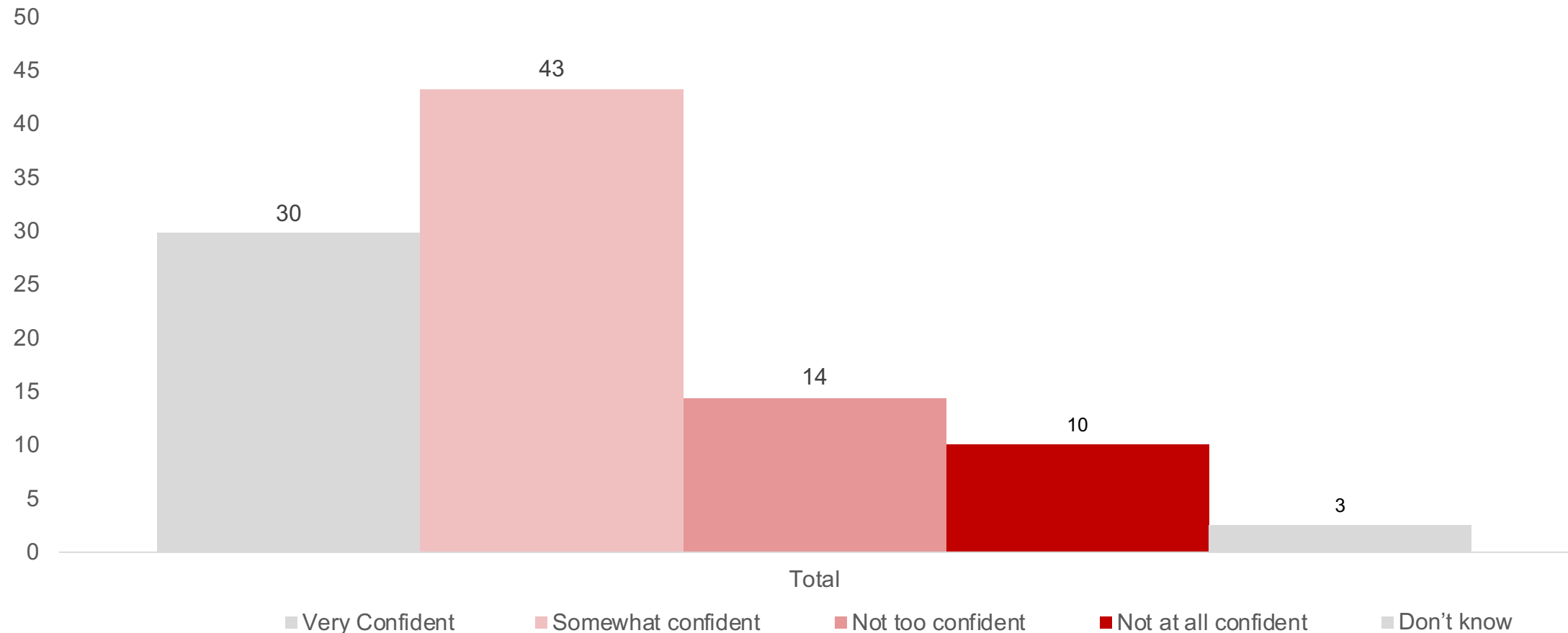
Is your personal economic situation right now better, or worse, compared to what it was like before the pandemic?



- Some specific sub-groups of the overall population were more likely to report that their situation has gotten worse since the start of the pandemic:
 - Latinas (37%)
 - Long term residents of the state (38%) who have lived in NM for 20 or more years.
 - Those with a household income lower than \$40,000 and those who lack a college education (35%).

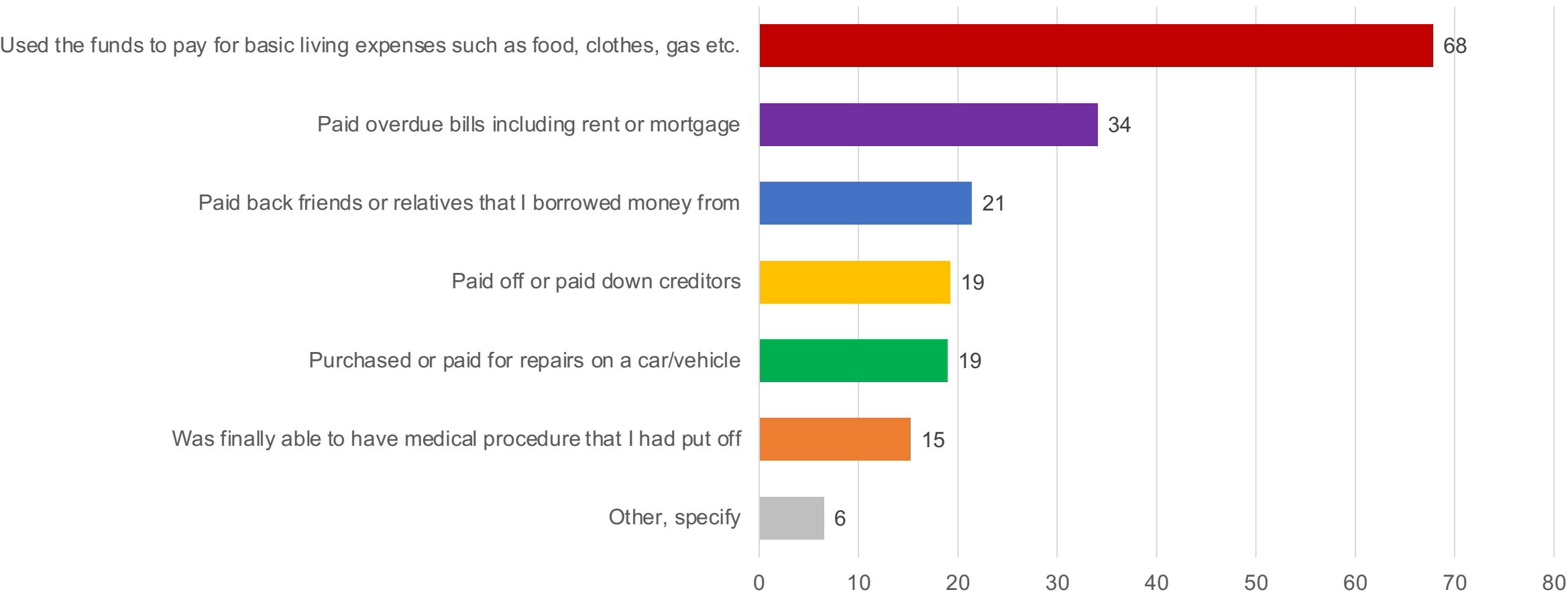
Confidence in Paying for Basic Expenses

Latinos are Using Pandemic Resources to Cover Living Expenses Vital to Their Well-Being

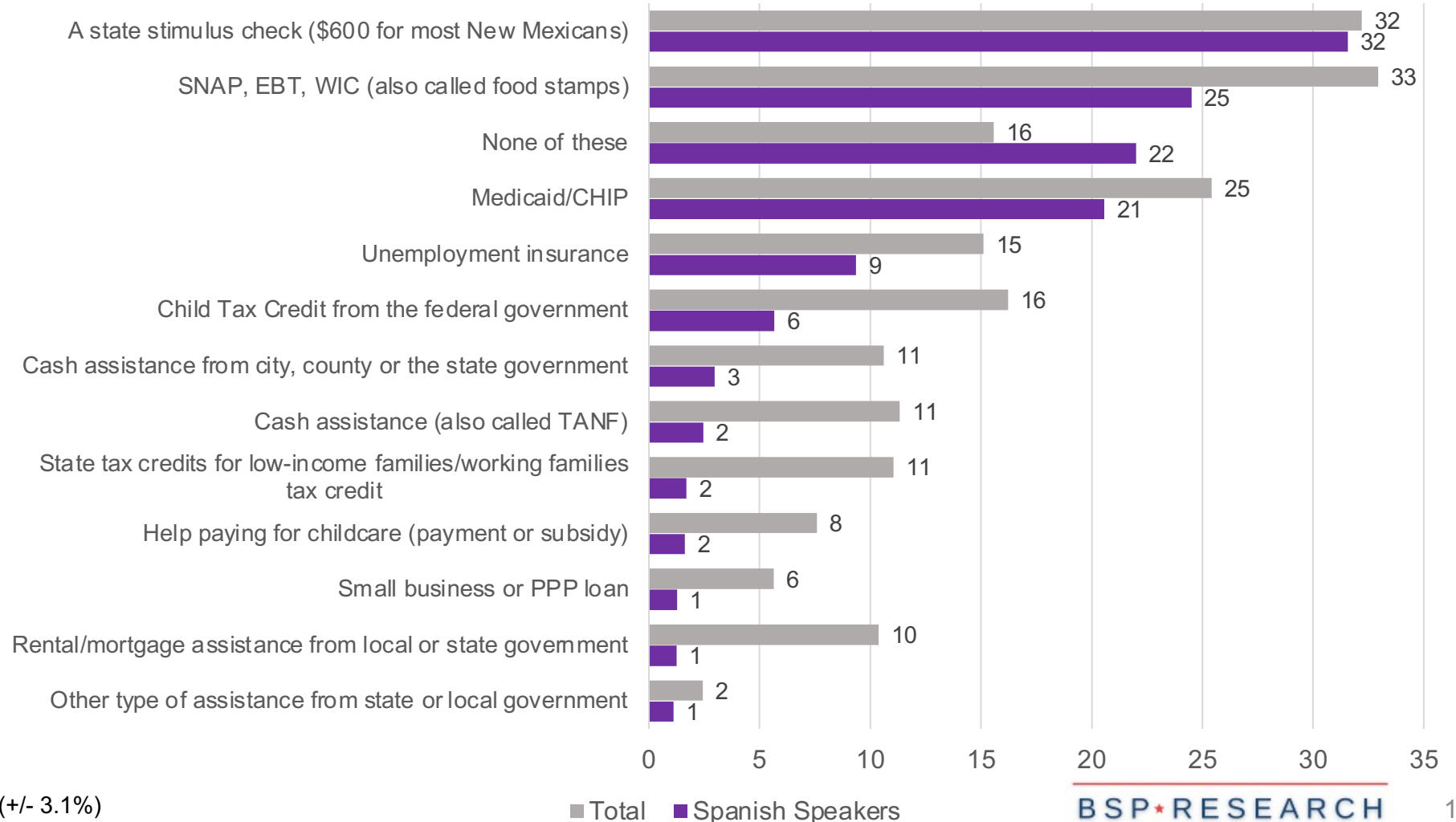
How did you use the economic relief or cash assistance you received from the federal or state government?



However, Not all Residents are Receiving Resources:

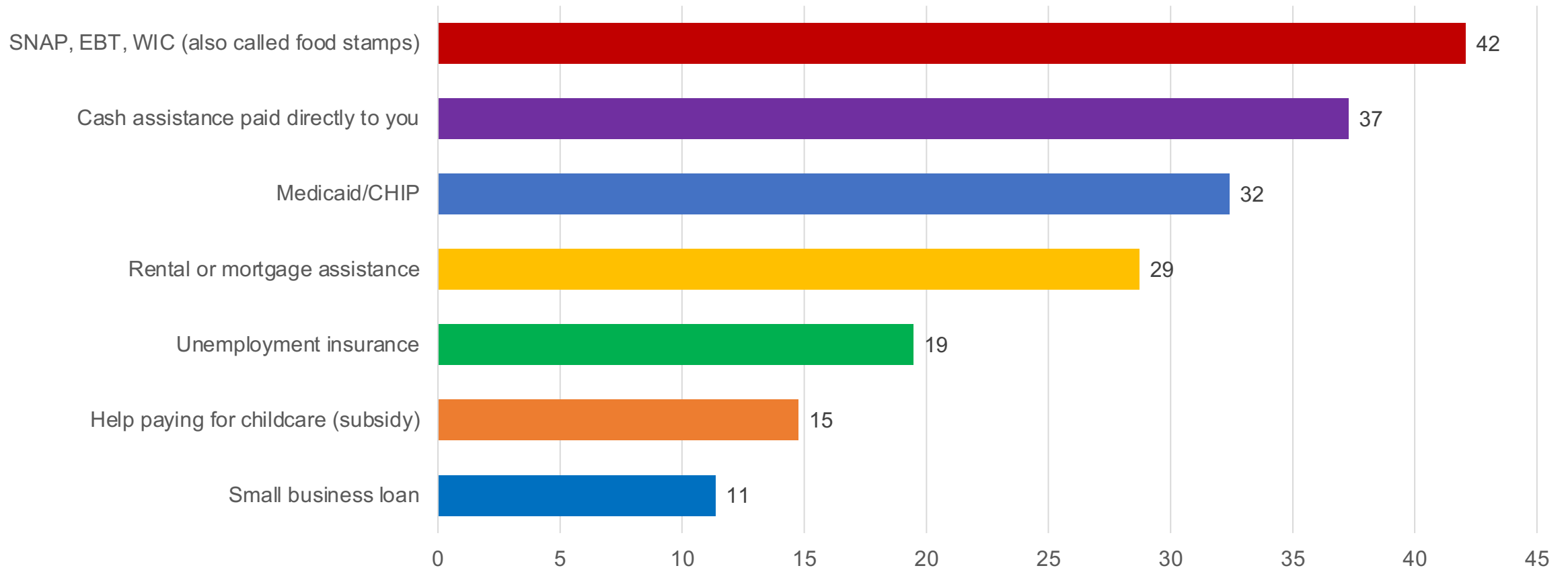
For each of the following government programs, indicate whether you or someone in your household received any help since the start of the pandemic.

Regardless of whether you have received any support over the past year, could you or your household use support from the following government programs, assuming you would qualify?



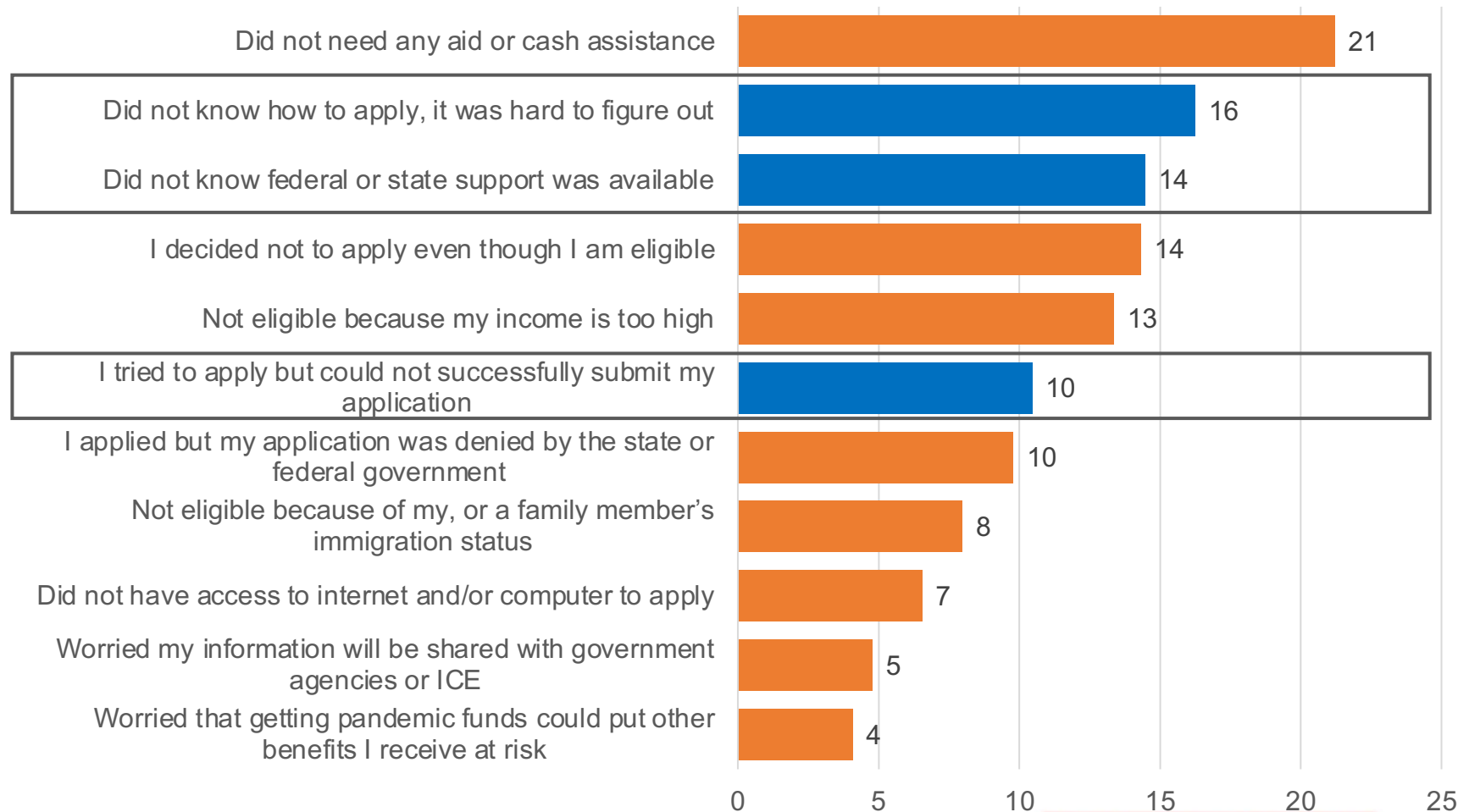
Current Barriers to Receiving Aid

Many obstacles have gotten in the way of the rest of the population getting the help that they needed

A significant amount of respondents cited difficulties with **not being able to complete the applications** or **not knowing that resources** were available.

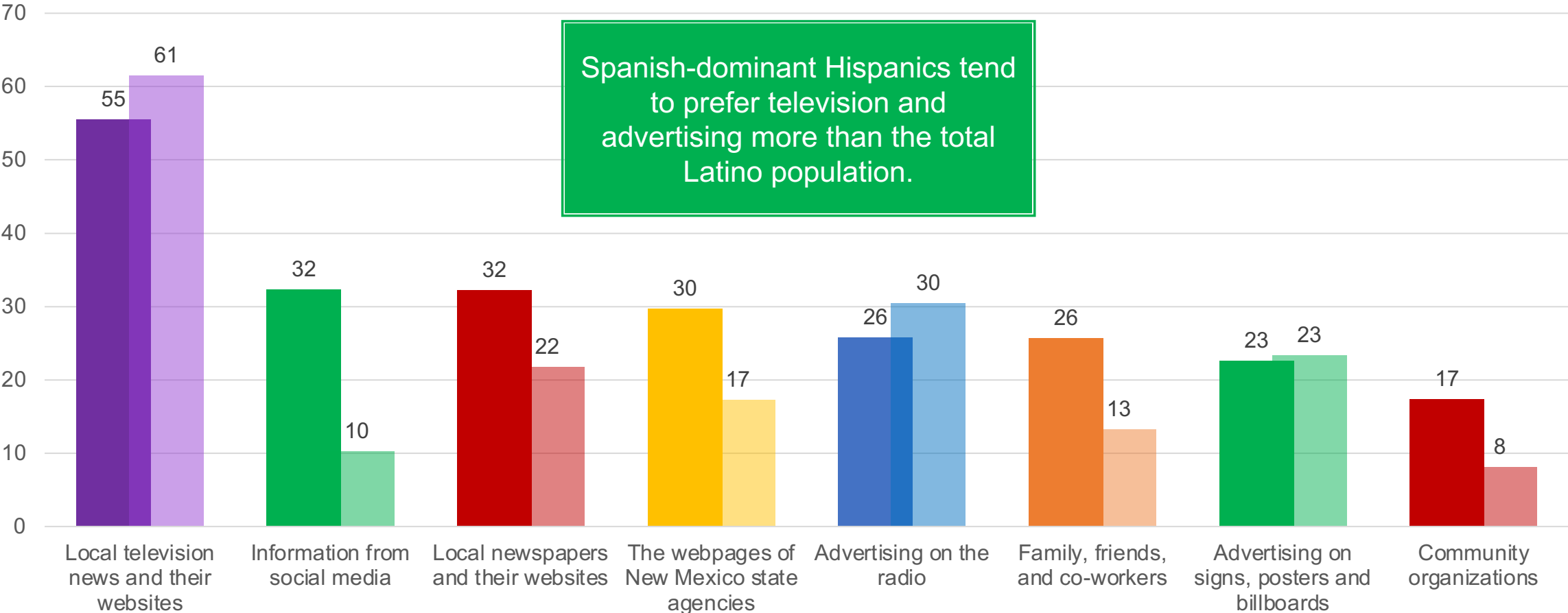
This suggests the need for **increased outreach efforts.**

How would you prefer to get information about federal or state resources, services, and support to deal with the pandemic?

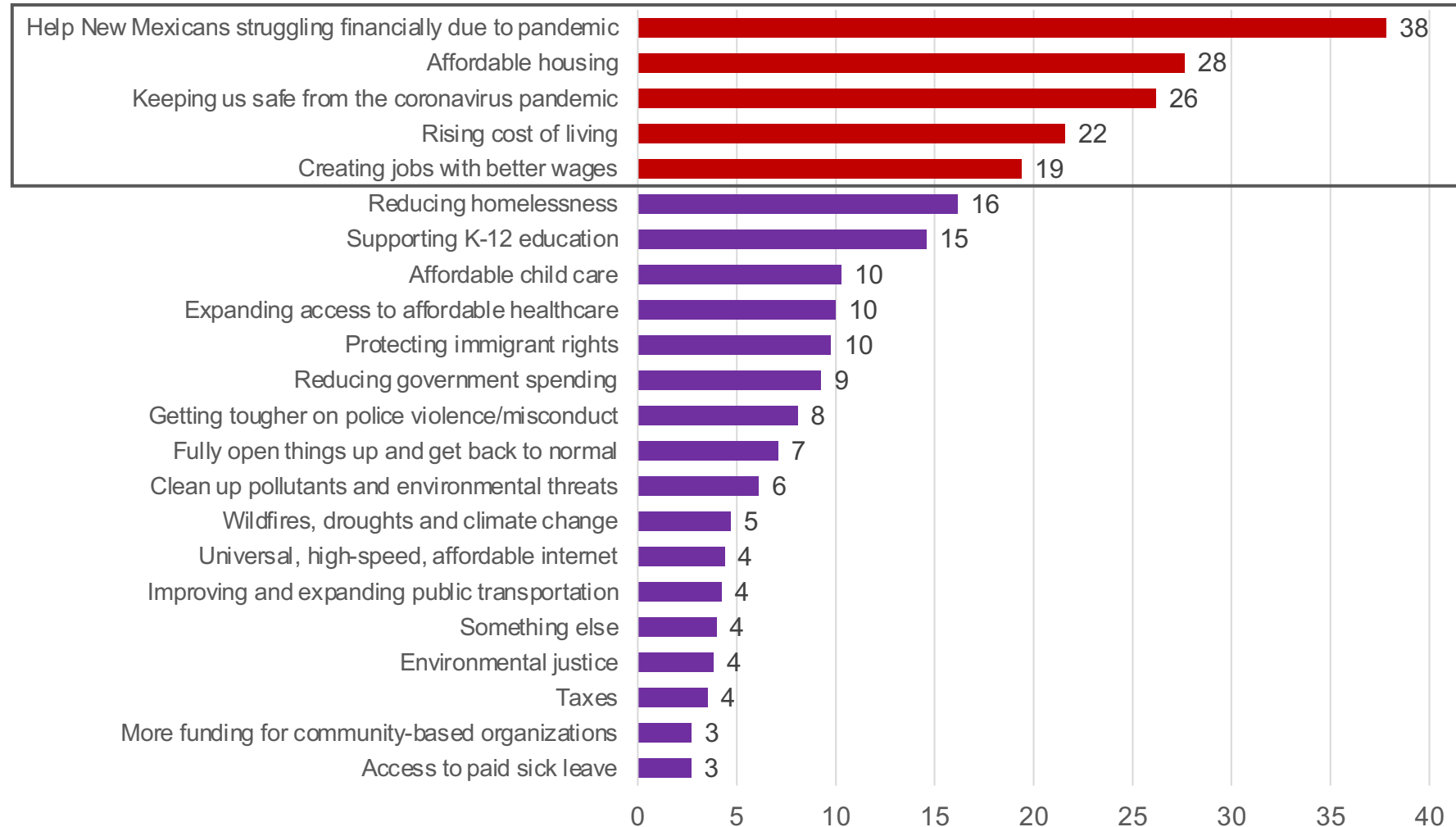


Local Policy Issue Priorities

“What are the most important issues that you want New Mexico’s governor and the state legislature to address?”

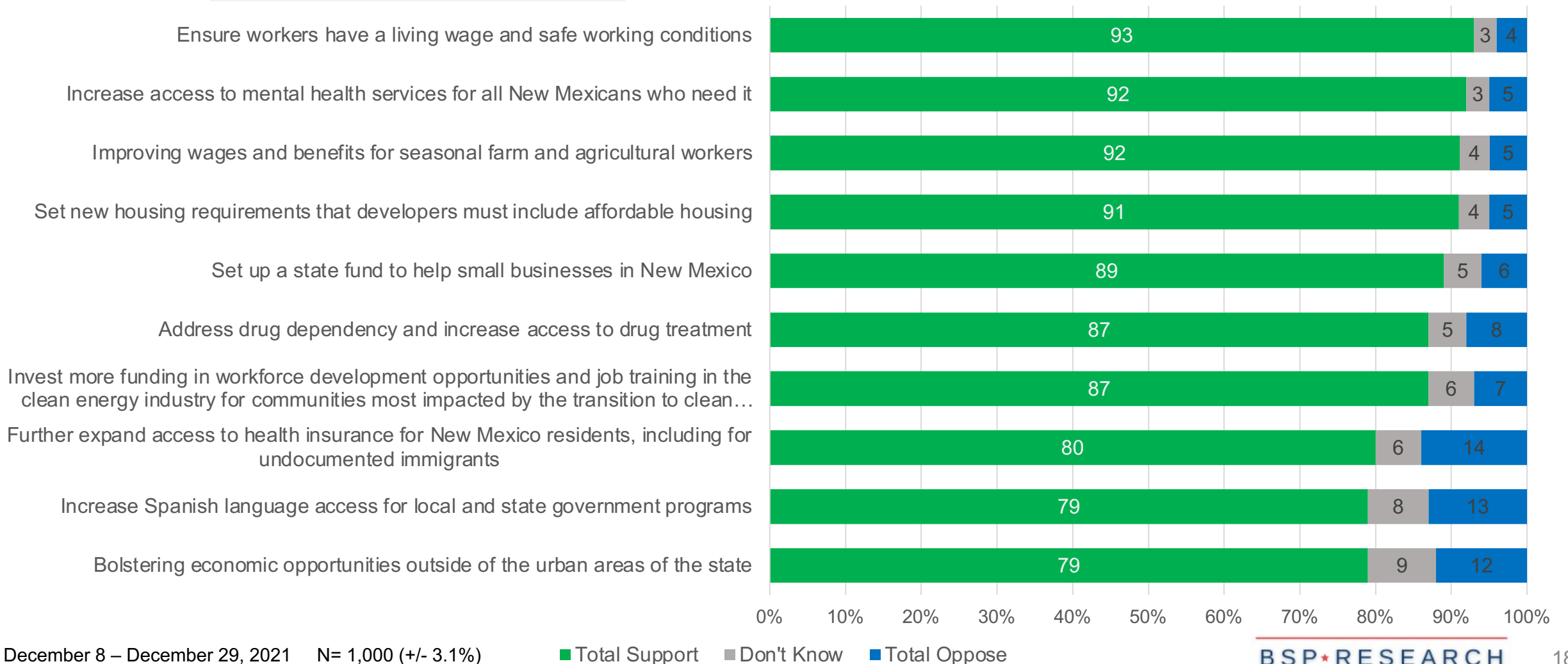
At the state level, **pandemic financial assistance** and **affordable housing** are the top two issue areas for the Hispanic community.

Do you support or oppose...

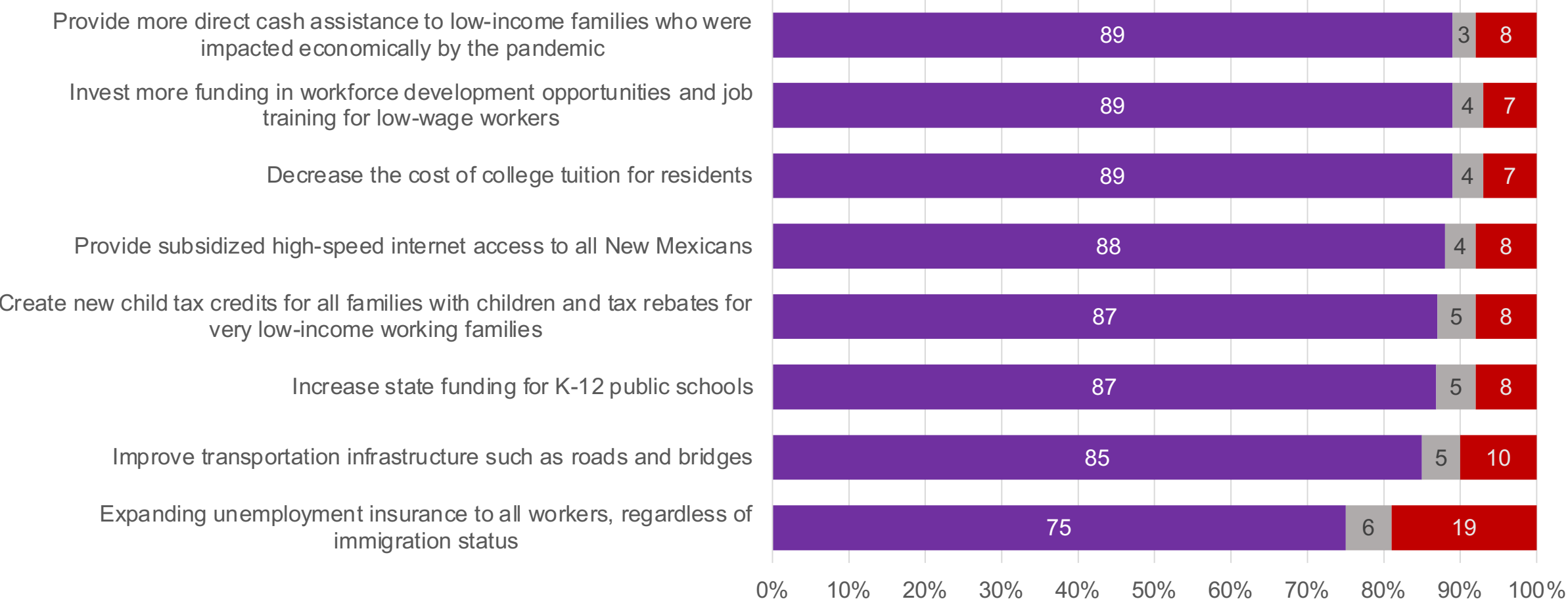

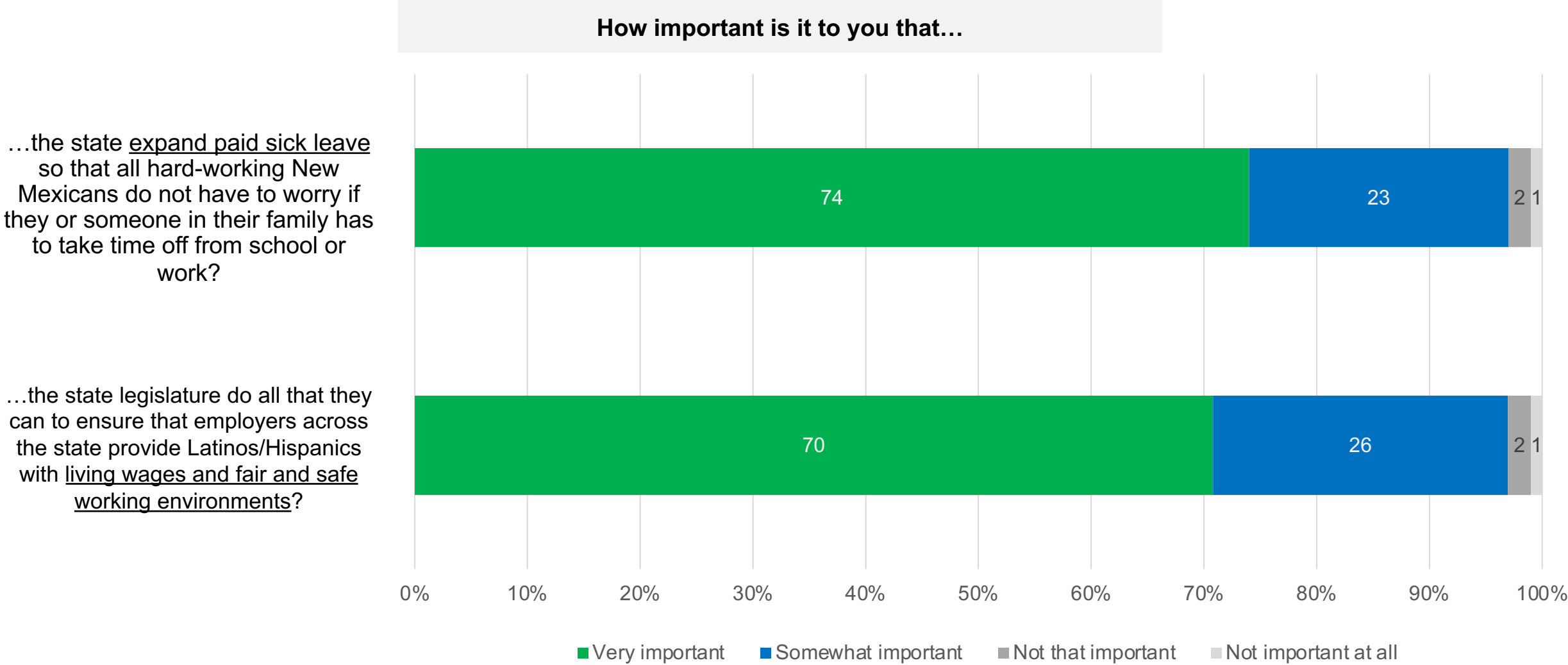

Respondents Prioritize Worker's Rights

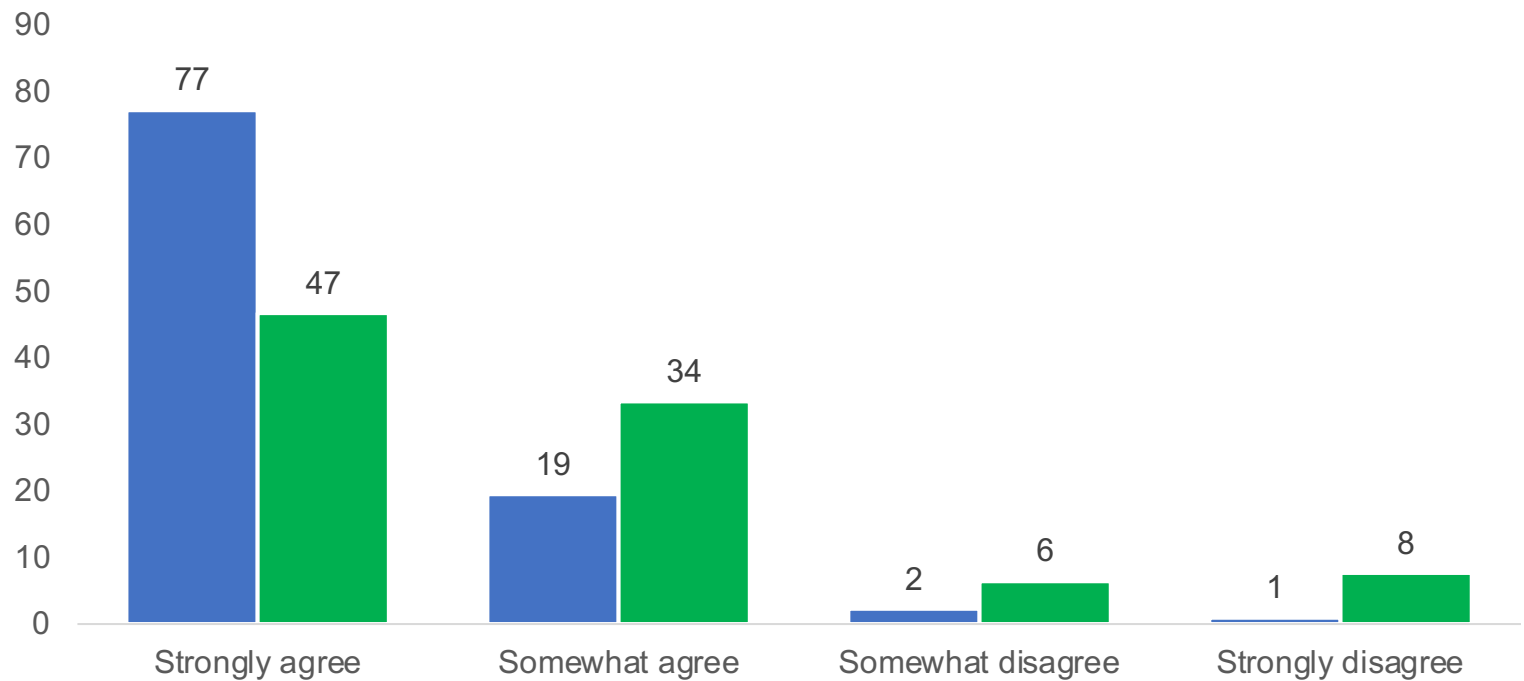
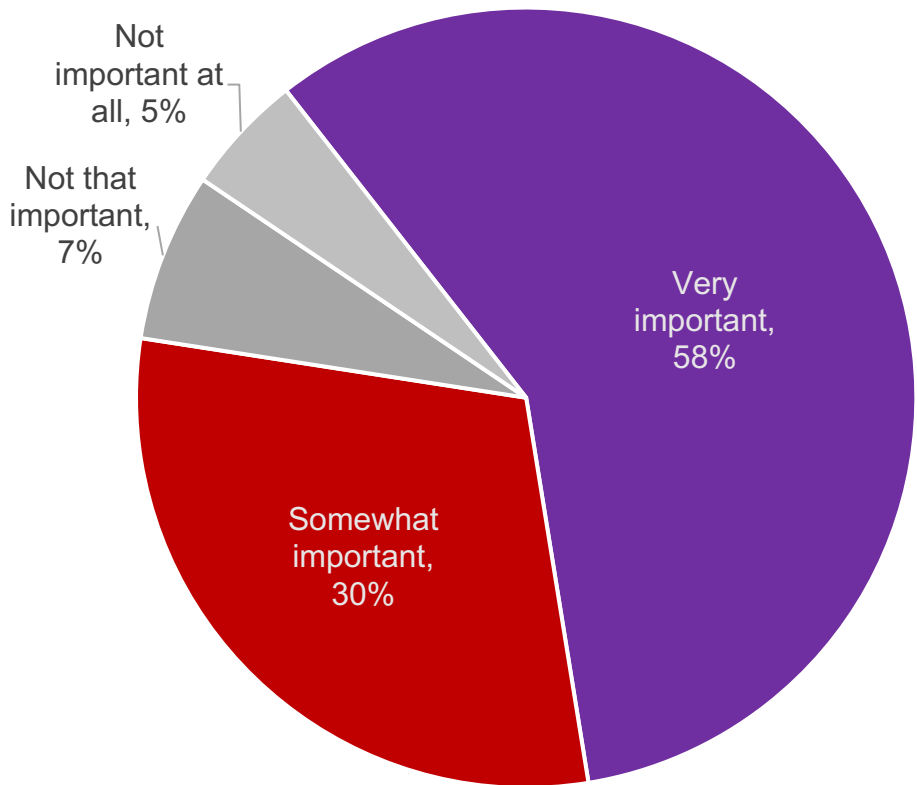


The Majority of Latinos Want Funds to go Directly to Working Families to Help Them Get Back on Their Feet
