SUMMER PROGRAMS

Writing the College Essay, instructed by Ms. Catherine Strycharz, is geared toward rising seniors (maximum 25) who will begin writing their college admission essays. The course will teach students how to respond to college essay questions, focus on developing students' ideas into an effective piece of writing, read and analyze sample college essays, and discuss the positive and negative aspects of those sample writings. Students will also receive 1:1 instructional time with the teacher to edit and revise their college essay. The course will be offered online unless social distancing restrictions allow for in-person instruction. **Registration is on a first come, first serve basis.** Cost for the workshop is \$75.00.
