-First from our friends at PEC- The Senate Climate deal ("Inflation Reduction Act of 2022") announced on Wednesday One news report by a religious group had this headline: [Faith groups respond to Sen. Manchin's surprise climate deal with shock, optimism](#): "Karyn Bigelow, co-executive director of Creation Justice Ministries, in a statement called the bill "a big win" for climate advocates across the U.S. "who have worked many years for this moment. I hope this historic legislation sets a pattern for Congress to prioritize climate justice for all of God's creation." Beyond praying, your phone calls to your U.S. Senators are needed. Sierra Club offers this guidance: Call your senators at 1-855-980-2275 now to help get this bill across the finish line—or text "senators" to 69866 and we'll connect you. A sample script to use during your call could be *"Hi, my name is [First Name] and I'm calling from [City] to ask my senator to support the Inflation Reduction Act. With the impacts of climate change becoming more apparent every day, passing this bill would be a historic win for our climate and for families dealing with the impacts of inflation. Thanks for your time."* For those who have Republican senators, we still encourage you to make a call. While Republican obstruction is the reason this bill must be done via a special reconciliation process, we believe it's important for every senator to hear from their constituents in support of this bill and climate action in general." If enacted, the bill could make climate-friendly technologies more affordable and lower overall



"The Sacred Waters of Monterey Bay: A Place of Resurrection"

Each week as soon as visiting church youth groups arrive at the Blue Theology Mission Station they are walked to the rocky shore of the Monterey Bay and asked to find a quiet place to sit and soak in the view of the magnificent Ocean. And while each pilgrim settles into the soothing sound of waves, wind and seagulls, each young person is asked to write down a response to this question "How does the Ocean remind you of God?" Responses are easily found and a sense that the waters themselves are sacred flow into each consciousness. As the week progresses, each person finds an understanding that the Monterey Bay is not only a sacred place, but also a place of resurrection...

Rev. Dan Paul is an ordained minister of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) and a graduate of the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, CA. Dan is the director of the Blue Theology Mission Station.

Frontera de Cristo

A Witness for Peace delegation spent a week with Frontera de Cristo and our many ministry partners. The seven individuals from varied USA locations came to learn. They brought open hearts and open minds, ready to experience *la mano de Dios* at work in the Mexico/US border region.

During their week, they learned so much from the community: people struggling with addiction, migrants waylaid on their journeys north, women working cooperatively to build stronger, healthier families, and teachers reaching out to children at risk. They met with the Mexican Consulate in Douglas, participated in a vigil honoring migrants who died crossing into the US, visited maquiladoras (factories) in Agua Prieta, and enjoyed Chiapanecan coffee at Café Justo y Mas, part of a successful coffee cooperative.

They joined with varied members of the community to [plant a cross in memory of Abigail Roman Aguilar](#) and mourn his tragic death of and spent time in conversation with a border patrol agent. They walked both sides of the dividing fence, reflecting on the many ways we are a united family of God.

Because of the monsoon rains, the desert grasses and flowers flourished during their visit. The beauty of the desert and the welcoming of the Douglas/Agua Prieta peoples prepared them for their work ahead. We pray their witness in the borderlands touches new hearts and minds.



In July, we sent out a [newsletter](#) only by email to reduce costs. For those of you who did not receive it, here are a few highlights to provide context for this newsletter:

- *The JHC is in good standing with the [Nicaraguan government](#).*
- *[COPROEXNIC](#), the organic agriculture cooperative, lost their \$1 million dollar credit line with Shared Interest, through no fault of their own.*
- *The CDCA lost six full time staff and one part-time employee due to retirement, resignations, and termination of contracts, leaving the CDCA understaffed and [underfunded](#) after making severance payments of over \$20,000, as required by law.*
- *We offered a [Farmer Shares](#) discount code to increase sales of El Porvenir coffee.*
- *Kathleen retired as [clinic director](#)... her decision was for health reasons. Becca has taken on the responsibilities of interim director.*
- *Nicaragua only requires COVID vaccination verification now to enter the country instead of negative PCR tests... so more people are traveling here.*

Otherwise the work goes on....

Rogelio retired after 25 years. **[Paul and a new staff addition, Luis](#)**, are trying to fill Rogelio's big shoes. Luis lives in Nueva Vida. Not only is he a hard worker and pleasant to be around, he is a licensed electrician, experienced in plumbing, etc. His wife, Karla, is one of our longest-standing lay health promoters at the clinic and works with [Las Lobas](#), the at-risk girls' group.

The **[Clinic](#)** now houses our main office **[staff](#)**. Space has been rearranged for Diana, the office administrator, and Carlos, our accountant, to set up their "shop." Josefa, our clinic administrator, serves as our legal representative as well. So now all the folks working on financing and government reporting are in the same locale.

We have moved Francis from the Center to head up the Clinic's cleaning staff. **We have hired an additional cleaner, Wendy, a founding member of the Las Lobas program.** She is 22 years old and married. She graduated from Las Lobas and studied three years for a law degree but lacked the funding to finish. Now, on Saturdays, she is studying to be a teacher and hopes to pick up her law studies again. This is possible with a salary and, so far, no children.

We reassigned Xiomara, one of the clinic cleaners, into a receptionist / assistant administrative position. She is in her 40s and received her high school degree three years ago. She then started studying Advanced Excel and has good computer skills.

Xiomara, Diana, and Josefa all started working at the CDCA as cleaners. We have gradually moved all three into administrative positions after we learned of their skills and talents. With so many skills why did they start as cleaners? To feed their families.

Haydeé is now our new Community Organizer. She came highly recommended, has studied three years of psychology, worked 15 years as a [health promoter](#) and has worked as a teacher.

In her first few days, Haydeé has started a recycling program at the clinic, visited at-risk patients in their homes, worked with our therapist with these patients, and started working on new classes for the four [teen groups](#). She also wants to revitalize the medicinal herb garden as well as teach people how to grow and make their own herbal tinctures.

[FarmerShares](#) Coffee's revenues increased by 16% thanks to responses from the July newsletter. 90% of the increase was due to people using the code in the newsletter. The El Porvenir cooperative's organic, shade-grown coffee is slowly being sold. It is still an issue to get steady markets; therefore, if you like good coffee and want to truly support coffee growers, you can order coffee and refer your friends. With any [first orders](#) from, use the 20% discount code **ZIDDEC6**. If you want to help sell their coffee, contact info@farmershares.com.

The 2021 crop of the remote, rural cooperative is finally processed and ready to be purchased. It took months for the co-op to process their coffee because of lack of water with their well pump not working. Now to sell the crop. We have possible investors looking at possibilities for opening a coffee shop in Managua to sell the co-op's coffee in-country. It feels like the harder these families work in the cooperative, the harder it gets to sell their coffee.

One piece of good news is that the roads are passable again to their co-op so our dentist, doctor, and nurse are going soon to see patients. And hopefully the roads will be passable in October when we have a large medical delegation coming with doctors, dentists, and vets who will go and see the community.

[Casa Ben Linder](#) will be feeding and housing that delegation, our first big group since COVID! This will help the CBL to meet its monthly expenses. We've been advertising CBL on Facebook as space for rent for family and community events. We've had a few tours of Managua booked through CBL. We are excited and ready to welcome more [volunteers and groups](#), so contact jhc@jhc-cdca.org if interested.

Our CBL's Xiomara, who rents the front part of the CBL buildings for a little restaurant, is doing an excellent job maintaining the CBL staff, schedules, and logistics which has lessened the work for Paul and Becca as well as improving ratings that guests give on web sites.

One Monday Sarah got a message from a friend, "is it too short notice to have you do a ZOOM presentation on Thursday?" Of course not! We are ready and waiting to give presentations about our work anytime while in-person visits aren't possible. Please invite us by writing Sarah@jhc-cdca.org. Before arriving to the 11th Assembly on the World Council of Churches, I had no expectations or really any idea as to what I was about to attend. “Reconciliation” and “unity” were heavily sprinkled throughout the merchandise and materials we received, and those words were heard and seen more than any other throughout the entirety of the assembly. As those words echoed through the halls and auditoriums, the diversity of the world’s Christian traditions gathered. From the most progressive denominations to the most orthodox, Christian leaders from all over the globe came together to discuss the injustices of our current time. Friends and colleagues who haven’t seen each other for years were found laughing and reminiscing about times long past when they had worked together. It was truly an amazing experience to behold, and yet it was a haunting and mind-blowing event, at least for me.
