The new DFARS Interim Rule takes effect November 30, 2020 and will impact ALL contractors doing business with the Department of Defense

## Who Should Attend

Hawaii defense contractors and their executives, supply chain managers, contract managers, program managers, IT managers, and FSOs

Hawaii's defense community faces a major challenge that may have significant impacts. DoD cybersecurity rules are complicated and difficult to implement, and in the past there's been uncertainty about how the DFARS 7012 clause, NIST 800-171 standards, and Cybersecurity Maturity Model Certification (CMMC) program will integrate and how they will affect Hawaii companies. Now the DFARS rules are changing, to provide more clarity and prescribe the processes that all defense contractors will need to follow. Featured Speaker Katie Arrington is the director of the CMMC program and has been a driving force behind the rollout of these new rules. Katherine "Katie" Arrington is a member of the Senior Executive Service and serves as the Chief Information Security Officer for Acquisition and Sustainment (CISO(A&S)) to the Under Secretary of Defense for Acquisition and Sustainment (USD(A&S)). In this position, she serves as the central hub and integrator to align acquisition and sustainment cyber strategy and efforts to enhance cyber security within the Defense Industrial Base (DIB). Ms. Arrington is responsible to provide a central coordination point and common compliance standard that serves to synchronize the various existing disparate cyber security efforts and standards across the Department and Industry. She is leading efforts that help ensure a secure Defense Supply Chain through the implementation of Trusted Capital vendors and Supply Chain Risk Management principles, enhance DIB security and resilience, and establish a common cyber security standard within Departmental acquisition efforts. She also synchronizes these efforts across other federal agencies and works with legislators to ensure Departmental authorities and actions align and support the nation's security goals.

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
