Blessed be the longing that brought you here

I wonder what you long for. I wonder what quickens your soul with wonder. I wonder if you have the courage to listen to these longings and go in new directions. This blessing poem by John O'Donahue was presented to me for reflection at a recent meeting. We were asked to spend time with it, reflect on it, see what stirred us, called to us, where our longings lay and to listen to them, maybe even have the courage to speak them out loud. It was a refreshing time to take the space to let my heart open to the longings within it.

As we say goodbye to one year and begin another, I think this is the perfect time to reflect upon our longings. It is the season of New Year's Resolutions after all. And what are New Year's Resolutions but goal setting based on our longings? I wonder what it would look like if we invited God into that process, into that resolution making, into tending to the fresh start of a new year. We've been asking the question lately, "What difference does being a Christian make in my every day life?" What if we considered: "What difference does being a Christian make to my hopes and dreams for this coming year?" What if we recognized God's presence in our longings, saw them as God's divine urgency in our life? Where might the year take us then?

Here is my challenge to you: Find a cozy (hygge!) spot, a piece of paper, pen or pencil, maybe a warm beverage, and invite God to be with you as you read the blessing poem above. Consider first what line or phrase calls to you, shimmers, shines, draws your attention. Then read it again and tend to what images or sensations this blessing brings to you. Read it a third time and consider how it connects to your daily life, what it calls you to do or be. And finally, take time to dig deep into your soul, recognize your longings, have the courage to name them, and see where they lead you this year.

Need a little more direction? Come to worship on January 12 and receive a StarWord, the gift of a word to connect and explore God in your daily life this year.


Using the Christian Language System and Talking about Your Faith!

One of the big things I love about Montessori-inspired faith formation projects is the idea that the Christian faith is like a language and so, faith formation is like learning a second language. Just like a recipe or a building project, there are pieces and ingredients you can use to make meaning. In the picture above you can see how the Godly Play Foundation and Rev. Dr. Jerome Berryman organize a room to be a living and tangible Christian Language System that you can walk into and immerse yourself in. This helps us get beyond the idea that the Christian Language System is only for experts, must be theologically orthodox, and is not for everyday life.

Sometimes you will hear people say, “It is hard to talk about my faith. I don’t want to get it wrong or say something heretical.” But learning a language cannot be done in such a precise and abstract fashion, it must be done in a messy, funny, and immersive process in which you make mistakes. I don’t know about you, but I still make “mistakes” using my first language! Sometimes the “mistakes” are important moments of learning! The funny thing is that even in trying not to talk about our faith or engage in “theology,” “ethics,” “testimony,” “witness,” or “biblical scholarship” (other names for talking about your faith that carry a certain cultural meaning), we say something about our faith using the Christian Language System, or at least our understanding of that language.

I hope in this new year you find new ways to explore using the Christian Language System to talk about your faith. Young people at St. Mark have suggested these small group opportunities as places we can begin practicing our new language together. Consider whether you might want to join one of these groups and let me know you are interested...



“Blue Card” Update from the Stewardship Team

We initiated the blue pew card last year with a dual purpose. One was to have a card to put in the offering plate that would be a “contribution” to the offering when you have elected to use electronic giving.

The other use was to be a reminder that stewardship living involves the way we live our faith in our regular daily lives –with neighbors, colleagues, friends and family. It is not limited to giving money, important as that is. It’s not focused on going to worship or bible study, important as they are. As a reminder of this broader understanding of stewardship, we provided space to jot down experiences from our weekly activities in which we encountered God, or experienced God’s presence in how we reacted to other people, or how they helped us. It may be how we react to good news or bad, how we solved a problem or faced a challenge. We all do this every day, but unless we have a “steward’s mindset” we might not recognize God’s activity.

We are developing a new blue card with more space for writing and some simple questions to stimulate your thinking of how God was active in your life and how that makes a difference in your spiritual well-being. Recently a neighbor posted a note of gratitude on a local web page regarding a stranger who brought her wallet to her home after she had inadvertently left it behind at the post office. She was so grateful and wanted to let others know how good that experience was. It’s those kinds of experiences that we all need to hear about because we certainly hear a lot of the opposite!

Below there is a compilation of notes from St. Markers in recent months. It is heartwarming to realize the many times and places they have encountered the divine. We hope you will share your experiences with others by reporting on the blue card when you are so inspired, and also in your regular conversations with others.

We’ve decided to separate the electronic giving pew card from the report on daily living encounters. We hope that all of you who give electronically will use the new card that indicates you give electronically. These cards will be recycled back so they will be used repeatedly. We hope this will be a simple reminder to yourselves and your neighbors in the pew of the importance of participating in the offering.

Many of you have read this compelling and intense true story of how Andrew Papke's life was dramatically changed when he was convicted of killing two teens in a drunk driving accident in Texas. Sentenced to a 40-year incarceration in the Huntsville prison, he was transformed by the Victim Offender Mediation/Dialogue program. The book is hard to put down once you've started, and stimulates deep thought on the nature and consequences of addiction, restorative justice, forgiveness, punishment, and accountability.

CHANGE IS JUST Another Word For Opportunity



Sharon Stobe shared a thoughtful reflection on death. Three years ago, her husband died suddenly after a neighbor noticed him motionless on the lawn tractor. She writes:

The first few times I mowed the lawn I was a "dripping faucet." But time passes on and I have "adjusted." However, I have come to realize that there is one spot in my yard that triggers some anxiety in me. There is a rock garden in the back of my yard. It seems almost without fail, that when I go behind it I find myself thinking, "I could drop dead on this thing and no one will see me." But then I come out of the area and I think, "I have survived. It must not be my time." Soon the mowing season will be over and I will not need to get on the tractor until next spring, but I think I will miss it. It makes me come face to face with putting "life" and "death" in perspective.


