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Sometimes I get curious about the words we use in the church. I think I know what they mean, but then when I try to define them I come up a little short. There is so much vocabulary, insider lingo we use in the church. I wonder if that is a good thing. Take this theme of discipleship that I've seen in our readings since after Christmas continuing until Lent. Our readings tell of Jesus calling the disciples, of people giving testimony to who Jesus is, of the

challenging things we are called to, how we are to be salt and light. "Oh, these are discipleship," I thought to myself. Then, as I prepared to write this article, I wondered, does discipleship really mean what I think it means?

So I did some research. I googled "Discipleship Definition." I'm sure my seminary professors would cringe, but I found some really helpful information on Wikipedia. "In Christianity, disciple primarily refers to a dedicated follower of Jesus... It is not the same as being a student in the modern sense. A disciple in the ancient biblical world actively imitated both the life and teaching of the master." https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Disciple_(Christianity). This highlighted something for me. Discipleship is not just learning the stories of Jesus but working to emulate and embody the ways of Jesus.

I thought about what that really looks like. I know there are complex theories and processes out there, but I don't find the need for them. Instead, I'm seeing discipleship play out in our congregation, with our people, in everyday life circumstances.

I recognized it last week when I heard that my son Thomas now knows how to hold his hands out in front of him to receive the communion wafer, instead of the grab he has been using. Open hands, waiting to receive what we need from God. That sounds like Jesus to me - remember when he prayed over the 5 loaves and 2 fish and asked God to give them what they needed, and everyone was fed?!

I recognized discipleship at work in one of you considering the word you'd received when we gave out star gifts in early January, and feeling God's call to say yes to a different ministry you hadn't been willing to take on previously. That sounds like Jesus, the living Word, calling people to things they didn't dream possible (fisherpeople to become fishers of people).

I recognized discipleship at work in people's willingness to ask questions and have conversations that are sometimes hard. One such example? Last year Linda Olson said to me, "Disciple Rick should come for Transfiguration Sunday. I just don't get it." And low and behold, Disciple Rick will be here for Transfiguration Sunday on February 23. Paul Brask and I have been wrestling with the significance of the Transfiguration. Did you know that Jesus answered most questions posed to him with questions? And he always was open to conversations with people (like the woman at the well, or Nicodemus, or the disciples who just didn't understand). Questions. Seeking answers. Learning and growing. That sounds like Jesus to me.

I recognize discipleship at work in people learning to manage and support themselves and others in the midst of health concerns. People turn to prayer with their worries and their fears. Jesus prayed in the garden before his crucifixion. People learn to be patient with one another and bear one another's burdens. "Love one another as I have loved you." Jesus washed the disciples feet. People learn to ask for help when the caretaking is too much. Simon of Cyrene carried Jesus cross. These all sound like Jesus to me.

Maybe that's just it. Discipleship isn't complicated. It really is about life, and learning to live it in a more Christlike way, leaning on God, serving, questioning, and growing.

God work in us ever more to become more and more Christlike. Amen.



The Season of Transformation

Ya'll know I love to make up "seasons" to celebrate, to go with the seasons happening in the natural world and the seasons of the church year. I made up a new one: "The Season of Transformation." Thanks to some questions Mark Sarasin was asking me back in "The Getting Ready Season" (Advent) and the theme we are using in Lent, I have a new season in my calendar! I'll spend more time writing about "The Season of Transformation" and my slightly absurd, definitely awesome calendar in the next few months as we celebrate but I don't want to get too distracted now.



So it all started when Mark asked me if I had had an "aha moment" that lead me to seminary and to becoming a deacon. It had been awhile since anyone had asked me the question so I laughed and told him I hadn't mostly because it's really hard to tell my story without making other people laugh at the simplicity and everydayness of it. To be honest I kind of lied, because there have been huge moments of transformation and transcendence in my young life. I've been so very blessed to have had moments of my life intersect with God's grace in poignant and deep and painful and joyful ways. They just don't look much like a movie and the moments don't sound all that earth shattering to anyone but me.


Pastor Christie and I have been working on this theme of transformation where we will ask people to reflect on specific Bible stories of transformation that we read in Lent: Nicodemus, The Woman at the Well, Jesus raising Lazarus, and others, then see if people have any similar moments of transformation. The cool thing that will happen is, just like me, you'll realize there have been significant moments of transformation in your life where God was working and they will be just as ordinary and lovely and life changing as any story in the Bible. The next cool thing will be you may not have realized them at the time, they may have been slow and steady, gentle and dramatic, or maybe they were the big aha, blow your hair back moments. The third cool thing that you will find is that when you share your stories of transformation you will find out they were not just private moments of personal significance, but they were moments meant to help transform your community.

So as we come out of this season of Epiphany where we celebrate the big aha moments of the world coming to know, we will slowly begin to meditate and reflect on the transformation that happens in the wake of these big moments (whether we realize they were or not).

I wonder what moments of transformation you remember and hold on to in your life...

If you don't think of anything you might ask God for help by praying. You might let go of the notion that it has to be an overtly dramatic or "religious" moment. It definitely did not have to happen in church and it definitely doesn't have to be a scene from a movie. Were there moments in your life where something unexpected happened? Were there moments in your life where you accomplished something you didn't think you'd ever do? Have there been hard and painful moments of your life? They might be moments of transformation not because God sent them to test you, but because life can be hard and painful and God loves us intensely in the midst of those things.

Anyway, I wonder what comes to mind when you think of moments of transformation in your life...







I seem to find myself frequently complaining to myself about a ton of small, about I inch or so, pinecones that are scattered all over my driveway and patio. I made the mistake of complaining about them out loud to my daughter one day when she came over. I said, "I don't remember so many pinecones and having to sweep them up every time I turn around."

She had no sympathy for me. She said, "Of course not, because Dad always picked them up." I don't remember him complaining about pinecones. Leaves, yes.

One day my son and I went to mow the lawn at the house that he recently purchased to rehab. When we arrived there, we saw a man in a motorized wheelchair in the middle of the lawn. With his very limited hand mobility and grabber, he was picking up sticks and twigs and putting them in a canvas bag that he had attached to his wheelchair.

When he saw us he said, "I figured you'd be up here one of these days and there's no way you could mow the lawn with all these sticks and twigs around unless they got picked up first."

We thanked him for his effort. That was a pleasant surprise and a big help.

I thought, "Here he is with his very limited mobility, and with great effort, picking up sticks in a yard that doesn't even belong to him just because he wants to help others."

I told myself I won't complain about the pinecones on my driveway. I should be thankful I have the ability to pick them up. After all, there was a time when I was flat on my back in a hospital bed, told to be still, and commanded not to get up or out of bed for any reason. "If you slip, or fall, or jar your neck, you are going to be paralyzed from the neck down."

How quickly one forgets to give thanks and be grateful for what one is able to do.
