Pastor's Corner



Easter baskets are filled with bunnies and chicks and candy and all things sweet and new life, right? Well, not so for Thomas this year. There were sweet treats of course, and a bunny thrown in for good measure, but the

highlights were not so sweet. Namely, your pastor's kid's Easter basket was filled with dragons and monsters. Literally. A stuffed dragon. Lego monster minifigures. A lego dragon. These are quite simply the things he loves at the moment, so much so that the plastic eggs filled with candy on his egg hunt were quickly set down to search for another one filled with a monster minifigure.



I felt a little sheepish at first. I mean, shouldn't I stick to the typical Easter images and symbols of new life? But then I got to thinking about it. What better way to mark Easter and all that it means than by taking the things that could scare us most-- monsters, dragons, things that hint at and threaten death-- and making them into toys. What better way to show that death has been stripped of its power, that we do not need to be afraid, that fear has left the building? We can play with these things because we are no longer afraid of them.

In the midst of our readings from First John in this season of Easter there is this gem of a verse: "There is no fear in love, but perfect love casts out fear." (1 John 4:18) In the Gospel of John, Jesus says: "There is no greater love than this, than one lays down one's life for one's friends." (John 15:13) On the cross, and through the cross, Jesus lived out perfect love. The love poured out on the cross led to the defeat of death in the resurrection. There is no fear in love. Because of God's love, there is no fear of death. Because of God's love, we do not have to live in fear. Because of God's love, we do not have to live from a place of fear. Do you know Jesus' first words to the disciples in the upper room? "Peace be with you," as in do not be afraid. Do you know what Jesus says more than anything else in the Bible? "Do not be afraid." Because of Christ, we are freed from fear.

And yet, the truth is, we know fear. We've spent a year surrounded by it in the midst of the unknowns of the pandemic. On my calendar April 13 was marked as FREEDOM. It was the day two weeks after my second vaccine, the date I would be fully immunized. I think when I wrote FREEDOM on that date, I expected it to be the day that I was relieved of the immense burden of fear and anxiety and worry I've been carrying for the past year. I did in fact feel some lifting of burden, but more accurately it has been a shifting of fears. There are now new fears. Perhaps you are having the same experience.

These days, instead of expecting myself to be without fear, I'm working to acknowledge the fear and not let it drive the bus. Instead, I'm working to put love in the driver's seat, for love is stronger than fear and love is of God. "Hey fear, I see you and hear you. But here is love. Love, what should we do next?" Love wins.

In our communal life, I suspect that there are questions we are asking out of our fears: Will people come back? Will we make it financially? Will this be the end of church as we know it? We are not the only ones asking these questions. Article after article in my church resource groups address questions such as these, which helps us know we are not alone. (A couple of my favorites: "Will The



The Church Transformed

There's that great quote that goes something like: "May you live in interesting times." The best part of the quote is that it is described as a curse. My friends, we certainly are living in "interesting" times. I'm not sure if we've been cursed or not, but several parts of our daily life, civic life, church life, and personal life all seem to have unknown and potentially ominous chapters about to begin or continue.




Recently two things have been especially meaningful for me as I think about these "interesting times." Both of these things are related to something Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton (and others) have said. The gist is that the discomfort that we are feeling is not good or bad but that we are in the process of being transformed and that the church itself is undergoing a deep transformation. That language is great, but "what does it mean?" I've been wondering.

The first thing that has helped me define what this "transformation" might look like is Pastor Christie's recent Good Shepherd sermon on the flock and the fold and the idea that these two shepherding concepts can help us understand dual natures of the church. As a faith community, we are gathered together into a safe place like the fold as we gather for worship, meetings, time for prayer, fellowship, in reach, etc. As a faith community, we are also like a flock that wanders and meanders in pilgrimage for nourishment outside friendly confines. The flock travels over hill and dale, in through friendly environs and dangerous places. This is us as we live our lives and our faith in the many different places our journey and the Holy Spirit lead us. So much of our "transformation" is our push to be a flock that is scattered and on a pilgrimage of faith rather than a fold gathered together in the safe confines of our sheep fold.

The second thing that has helped me define this period of "transformation" has been a teaching concept from Buddhist Nun Pema Chodron that is encapsulated in this quote: "We think that the point is to pass the test or overcome the problem, but the truth is that things don't really get solved. They come together and they fall apart. Then they come together again and fall apart again. It's just like that. The healing comes from letting there be room for all of this to happen: room for grief, for relief, for misery, for joy (this is from *When Things Fall Apart*)." I have very much been stuck in the things coming apart and believing it's a sign that the unraveling can only continue rather than that it is the first step in transformation.

Regardless of whether these ideas and concepts resonate with you or however you're feeling these days, I hope you find some space to feel whatever you're feeling and listen for the voice of the Good Shepherd who calls you by name and leads you through both relief and grief.






Sponsoring Flowers for Worship

The accompanying table provides a review of church finances through March. The ongoing pandemic continues to significantly impact offerings and facility use revenues. While we continue to do our best to control expenses (which are down roughly \$14,000 relative to budget and \$6,000 relative to the same period last year), the decline in offerings (down \$28,000 relative to budget and \$11,500 relative to last year) far exceeds our expense savings. We have initiated the application process for a second Payroll Protection Plan loan to help bridge this gap, but whether that will be approved remains in question. Regardless, that support will be short-lived and we will need giving to return to pre-pandemic levels to maintain our existing ministry and benevolence levels.

This comes at a time when we are considering additional expenses to support continued development of online, video and remote worship formats to reach members when they are away from the Northwest Suburbs, better serve the homebound, connect with our youth as well as potential new members, and generally provide new ways to engage, not only for worship service, but also for education and fellowship.

Several options are available to facilitate giving and we encourage you to use them. These include Bill Pay or Zelle which are offered by many banks, Simply Giving, or using regular mail. Our website also has a new section for Offerings & Donations with the PayPal donation link added. Please contact Nancy Hundley at (815) 261-2570 or nhundley@stmarkmp.org if you would like help setting up any of these giving methods.

You have been consistently generous over the years in supporting our benevolence giving and the many community ministries of St Mark. We hope the works of these ministries are a reminder of the joy of giving, and the blessing of being able to give.
