## EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

### NOKUSE STEEPHEAD

January 29, 2022 - We started the year off with a hike on the Nokuse (pronounced no-go-see) Steephead trail. If you are not familiar with a steephead, it is formed when ground water leaks through porous sand onto a sloping surface. Steepheads remove sand from the bottom of the slope, causing the sand above to slump down and get carried away by the stream. Through this process, steephead ravines are continuously lengthened as the seeping water erodes from the bottom up. On this 6-mile hike we were treated to a cookout by chapter members Wallis and Paul Mayo, JP Husted, and John and Marsha Hooten.



### ALAQUA BASIN

April 16, 2022 – The spring blooms did not disappoint on our hike through the Alaqua Basin. The mountain laurels, anise, and wild azaleas were on show as we made our way to Demon Bridge. A short rain shower, two snakes, and two bridges were just a few highlights from the trail.





The bridge was an extraordinary accomplishment for our chapter and we are grateful to all of our members who volunteered to see this project to completion!


