

Telligen and NKF Partner to Reduce Cardiovascular and Kidney Disease Risk Through Online Education + Office Hours Support

DES MOINES, IOWA, July 24, 2020 – Telligen is partnering with the National Kidney Foundation (NKF) to offer online continuing medical education (CME) to primary care teams that are interested in assessing and improving chronic kidney disease (CKD) care for their patient populations. This three-module learning experience provides a framework for implementing CKD population health strategies and highlights the integration of the [NKF Chronic Kidney Disease Change Package](#) into primary care workflows.

On July 1, 2020, the National Committee on Quality Assurance (NCQA) announced the inclusion of the [Kidney Health Evaluation for Patients with Diabetes measure in the HEDIS measure set for 2020](#). This new HEDIS measure assesses the percentage of adults with diabetes that have received serum creatinine with eGFR (eGFR) and urine albumin-creatinine ratio (uACR) within the last 12 months. This educational opportunity will also aid in understanding and optimizing performance with this new measure.

The three no-cost CKD education modules will be provided online, and NKF designates this enduring activity for a maximum of 1.0 *AMA PRA Category 1 Credit(s)™* per module for a total of 3 Credits. There will also be additional complementary guidance offered through live engagement with NKF via office hour teleconferences. Successful completion of this CME activity, which includes participation in the evaluation component, enables the participant to earn up to 1.0 MOC points per module in the American Board of Internal Medicine's (ABIM) Maintenance of Certification (MOC) program. Participants will earn MOC points equivalent to the amount of CME credits claimed for the activity.

In the United States, 37 million adults are estimated to have [CKD](#) – and 90% aren't aware of it. 1 in 3 American adults is at risk for CKD. [Risk factors](#) for kidney disease include [diabetes](#), [high blood pressure](#), [heart disease](#), [obesity](#), a family history of kidney failure, and being age 60 or older. People of African American, Hispanic, Native-American, Asian, or Pacific Islander descent are at [increased risk](#) for developing the disease. African Americans are [about 3 times](#) more likely than Whites to develop end-stage kidney disease (ESKD or kidney failure). Compared to non-Hispanics, Hispanics are [almost 1.3 times](#) more likely to receive a diagnosis of kidney failure.
