### FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BRIAN...

With Confirmation coming up at the end of May, since Pentecost Sunday again falls on Memorial Day weekend, I've had the joy-filled opportunity to read and respond to our 2<sup>nd</sup> year Confirmands' faith statements... and as I sit down to write this, last night was the Confirmation Dinner when those who will be celebrated on Sunday read their statements for those gathered. Even after two years of study, discussion, and practical hands-on ministry experience, we don't expect our young people to have a fully realized understanding and expression of their burgeoning Christian faith, that's something many adults still struggle with later in life. Our hope for them is that through our lesson plans and dialogue, they have thought seriously about the nature and person of God, what it means to be a follower of Jesus, and some ideas about the Holy Spirit, the Bible, the Church, and how their own spiritual journey connects in meaningful ways.

In other words, the days are long passed when Confirmands were required to resight the answers to The Heidelberg Catechism or to memorize and affirm The Apostles' Creed in its totality. For instance, do any of our older members still recall the answer to the first question of the Catechism: What is your only comfort in life and in death? How many of us would answer with these exact words: "That I belong, both body and soul and in life and in death, not to myself, but to my faithful savior Jesus Christ, who has totally paid for all my sins with his precious blood and completely liberated me from the power of the devil, and who takes care of me so well that not a hair on my head can fall from my head without the will of my Father in heaven."

Wow... did you notice that was just the first sentence of that answer? And I'm sure you realize that it's been several generations since people talked that way, and likely we're all aware that many of us who call ourselves progressive Christians would likely choose very different words and ideas to give expression to our faith and current understandings of what it means to be a person of faith. And, in case you're curious, that's just fine with the rules of faith and practice within The United Church of Christ, which since its inception in 1957 has been decidedly non-creedal. In fact, one of our key values and principles is "Doctrinal Freedom," recognizing that different covenants and confessions of faith are accepted in different congregations, and the realization that times and contexts change, requiring a willingness to "Redefine Faith," understanding that each generation will be responsible for rethinking its beliefs, as God's word unfolds and conditions change.

I can confess my own struggle with the traditional Creeds of the organized Christian movement, as the language and emphases of both the Apostles' and the Nicene creeds no longer adequately express my beliefs and values as a 21<sup>st</sup> Century person of Christian faith. For instance, both statements go out of their way to call the mother of Jesus, "the Virgin Mary," as if that's her first name or something. To my mind, that designation expresses a prescientific understanding of conception, and over time came to represent a very negative view of human sexuality which has proven not only unhelpful in many cases, but destructive in some. It just feels really important to the underlying Christology of the creeds, and I'll admit it's not that important to me personally.

More importantly though, the Creeds skip over the life and teaching of Jesus almost entirely, jumping right from the idea of his almost magical birth to his trial under Pontius Pilate, crucifixion, death, and resurrection. It isn't important to the Creeds that Jesus gave us the Beatitudes and the rest of the Sermon on the Mount, they make no mention of his parables or his miracles, his feeding and healing, and the compelling reasons that so many of his disciples chose to follow him. As these teachings are integral to my own faith, the Apostles' Creed is less attractive to me than the words of our UCC Statement of Faith, which says briefly that God "in Jesus Christ, the man of Nazareth, our crucified and risen Savior, you have come to us and shared our common lot, conquering sin and death, and reconciling the world to yourself," and goes on to call Christ's Church to "accept the cost and joy of discipleship, to be servants in the service of others," living after the model of Jesus' life and teachings.

So, it's likely no surprise that the young people of our congregation are expressing the same kinds of questions, concerns, and uncertainty that many of our adult members are giving voice to. Like many other people who identify as progressive Christians, folk in UCC congregations are less likely to think of God as male, or Father, or to speak of God with exclusive male pronouns. As many of us have witnessed verses of the

Bible misused to limit women and clobber our LGBTQ siblings, we're less likely to think of the Bible as the "inerrant and infallible Word of God," rather than as Marcus Borg describes, a human product of two faith communities, Jewish and Christian, bearing witness to their experience of God and evolving understanding of life in light of God's activity among them. I like to tell people that "we take the Bible too seriously to take it literally."

And like many of us, our kids have no interest in believing in Hell, as it has been traditionally described in many Christian communities; how can a loving God send any of their beloved creations to an eternity of suffering punishment. And while they don't have the words to express it, or the history to understand its origins, they struggle when they hear the language that "Jesus died for our sins," the shorthand expression of "penal substitutionary atonement theory" (I preach about the problems with this thinking from time to time, but it's quite common among so-called Evangelical Christians. So, you could google it if you want to know more). That thinking is only necessary if you still buy into the idea of "original sin," but that too is an idea many of us have tossed in the garbage bin as unhelpful to the point of being destructive.

What the kids have heard, taken in as participants in our congregational life and these years of Confirmation classes, and come to value according to their own faith statements are things we emphasize here at David's and are commonly valued throughout the UCC and in many other progressive Christian traditions. They understand that God is love and see that expressed throughout the life and teaching of Jesus, centered in his command to "love your neighbor as yourself." They understand that love is the motivation to feed the homeless, and work for a just world for all people, all God's children. And they expect to see that love lived out in the Church, which they believe should be inclusive, offering an extravagant welcome to all. They appreciate that David's Church is Open & Affirming, inclusive and supportive of our LGBTQ siblings, and are grateful to see women in leadership throughout the life of our church, on lay boards and the Church Council as well as in the pulpit and lectern.

They have felt that their questions are welcome and realize that it's normal and healthy to experience some doubts, and not feel that they have to have all the answers. These youthful new members of our community anticipate growing in empathy, kindness as well as understanding as they continue on their spiritual journey, realizing we're all a work in progress. Each one of us doing the best we are able at this point in time and together in the church are working out our salvation alongside others in this growing community of faith.

My word to them in the sermon on Confirmation Sunday is to stay in relationship, to keep coming to worship, to participate in the SIGNS ecumenical youth group, to stay engaged and involved. We all know that growing up in this world is challenging, and can be difficult, but studies have shown that young people increase their capacity to grow up safe and be successful in their pursuits, exhibit positive behaviors and are less likely to attempt risky behaviors when they participate in religious groups and have supportive peer engagements and build relationships with adult role models in and beyond their families. They gain a sense of self-esteem and moral values like honesty, integrity, caring, empathy for others when participating in efforts to make a difference in the world through service projects, peace-making and working for equality and social justice. In short, the kind of relationships that can be made through regular participation in church life and activities.

Our faith, like our personalities, our education, our growth as compassionate beings, doesn't arrive overnight with a certificate, but is a growing organic aspect of life, something that develops and evolves over time as we mature, make mistakes, and move forward in our lives. My hope is that more of us might grow to see the value and the added qualities of peace and love that we experience in our lives by coming together often as the church in worship, in service, in mutual support and celebration. We are better together and can make a greater difference in the world when more of us are fully present and engaged.

This month's Dateline article features St. Paul United Methodist Church Outreach Ministry who works in conjunction with the Greater Dayton Food Pantry and together they strive to address food insecurity in their 45403 neighborhood by operating a food pantry.

They keep it stocked with items that can sustain life for impoverished individuals and families such as nonperishable items including canned food like meat, vegetables, soup; fruit; dry beans; jelly/jam; pasta; pancake syrup; cereal; oatmeal; mac & cheese; toothbrushes, toothpaste; tissues; shampoo; dish soap; laundry soap; diapers (all sizes); bar soap.

St. Paul also has an active thrift shop. Its purpose is to put good used clothing and household items into the hands of people who need them. The staff at St. Paul long ago realized that most people do not want a hand out; instead, they want to be part of the economy by purchasing items at an affordable price. This, in turn, provides much needed income for the St. Paul Outreach Ministry.St. Paul UMC appreciates your generous donations of clothing and household items. The shop is always in need of good, clean clothing (all sizes), household items, curtains and blankets.

Additionally, St. Paul UMC serves a carry out Breakfast on Saturdays at 8:45 a.m. and a carry out Lunch on Tuesdays at 11:30 a.m.

Bernie Wheeler, who delivers the donations you place in the blue barrels at the Fellowship Hall Door Entrance, has observed recently that the barrels have been very lean. It is the hope of the Mission Board that you'll be as generous in your gifts to help the hungry in the St. Paul area as you have been in supporting the Holiday Baskets and Lesotho Nutrition Initiative. Bernie would be very happy to deliver an abundance of pantry items along with the cans you place in the "Cash for Cans" tubs. 
