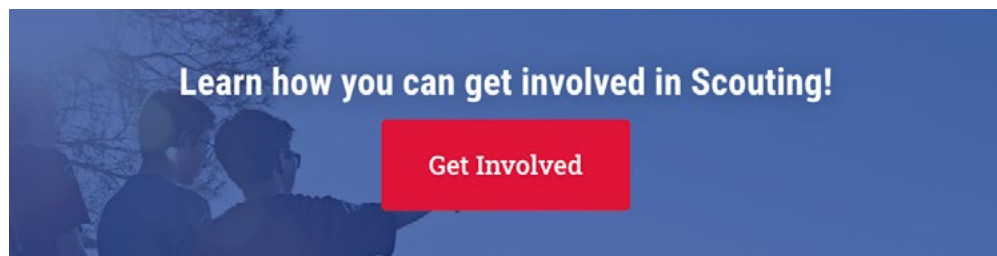
President's Message

Recruitment Readiness

February Membership Article

Welcome to the February monthly Membership news article. While Arrow of Light-to-Scout Transition and Spring Recruitment will be discussed at Roundtables over the next couple of months, I would like to use this article to briefly nurture that seed of “proactive planning” for these two topics. Remember, Peer-to-Peer Recruitment can also be part of these two events.

While Scouting For Food is a great opportunity to help those in need within your community, this is also an excellent opportunity to use this event as a springboard to your Spring Recruitment, whether you are a Pack, Troop, Ship, Crew, Club or Post. The Scouting For Food committee has created a doorhanger that has a blank space on the back for a 5160 Avery Sticker. A unit has options to what information they would like to place on this sticker, whether an upcoming unit event, a unit meeting or just your unit’s contact and website information.

As your Arrow of Light (AOL) Scouts are getting ready to crossover to a Troop, here are a few questions for our Packs and Troops to determine your Scout’s readiness for Arrow of Light-to-Scouts Transition this year and potentially identify areas of opportunity for next year. This is an important time since Crossovers are the main recruitment performed by most Troops.

Packs:

- Has your AOL Den completed your visit to at least one Scouts BSA troop meeting and one Scouts BSA-orientated outdoor activity?
- Work with troop leaders to secure den chiefs, with a focus on AOL dens
- Work with troop leaders to get assistance with delivering AOL required and elective Adventures
- Invite the Scoutmaster and troop youth leaders to special pack activities to help create familiarity and a level of comfort with the AOL Scouts and their parents
- Plan a meaningful crossover ceremony that includes troop leadership accepting the AOL Scout as they graduate
- If a troop does not exist in your community, work with your DE and District Membership Chair to discuss your options of other existing troops vs. start a new troop vs. your AOL Scout becoming a Lone Scout in Scouts BSA

Troops:

- Become familiar with the requirements for the six AOL required Adventures
- Schedule and prepare for AOL Scouts visit a troop meeting and outing as soon as possible
- Select Scouts to serve as den chiefs for each AOL den & arrange for den chief training
- Serve as a resource for overnight activities – includes equipment, leadership and logistics
- Conduct orientation for parents when AOL Scouts are visiting your troop that includes the difference between Cub Scouts and Scouts BSA
- Get to know the parents and leaders in the AOL dens
- Work with Cubmaster and AOL den leader in planning a meaningful crossover ceremony

Troop 618's First Female Eagle Scout Builds a Legacy

Maggie R. has made history as the first female Eagle Scout of Scouts BSA Troop 618 in Oak Lawn. Her journey to earning Scouting's highest rank included completing 59 merit badges and leading a transformative Eagle project: creating a community garden at Immanuel United Church of Christ in Evergreen Park.

The garden, built in a previously unused playground, now provides free fruits and vegetables such as tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, and squash to the public. "It feels great knowing I could be an inspiration for other girls who want to pursue Scouts," Maggie said. "I wanted this garden to bring the community together, and I'm proud of what we created."

Maggie's project was inspired after her church's preschool closed, leaving the space vacant. "I saw an opportunity to turn it into something positive for everyone," she explained. With the help of church members and volunteers, the garden opened in July 2024 and will be cared for by the community after Maggie graduates this spring.

Reflecting on her Scouting experience, Maggie said, "I figured out that I can be a good leader. I like helping people, and Scouts gave me the confidence to do that."

Reneker Family Camp - At Owasippe

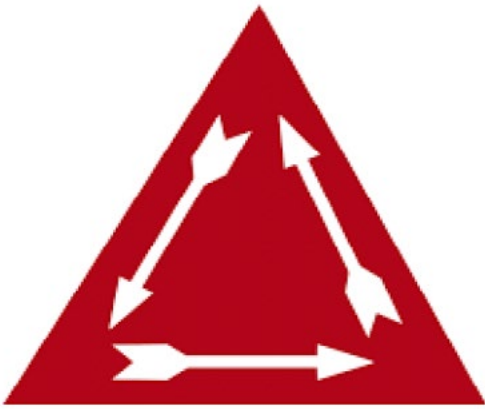

William A. Lee Memorial College Scholarship

APPLY FOR THE WILLIAM A. LEE SCHOLARSHIP TODAY!

Each year, the Chicago Federation of Labor awards 10 William A. Lee Memorial Scholarships to high school seniors, five to the winners of the Academic Competition, and five to the winners of the Random Drawing. Applicants must choose to enter either the Random Drawing or Academic Competition for the William A. Lee Memorial Scholarship. Applicant or applicant's parent must be a member in good standing of a CFL-affiliated union.
