A board certified internist and epidemiologist practicing at Mid-Atlantic Permanente, Ilse Levin's roots and belief in organized medicine run deep.

She has represented the AMA to the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the CDC's National Advisory Council for the Elimination of Tuberculosis.
