Module 3: To Commit to the Charism

Marianist Spirituality presents a wealth of themes that date back to the beginnings of the French School of Spirituality. These themes include concepts that are often familiar to most Catholic Christians. The mystical body of Christ, developing a personal relationship with Christ, and seeing one's own life in the context of unfolding mystery are a few of these elements. Other important elements are exploring the deep implications of the Incarnation, where we find God through Christ in the smallest and largest movements of our lives. And also the theme of mission, most importantly, in immersing ourselves in the task of personal, communal, and societal transformation so God's love for humanity and the earth are clearly manifest in the way we gather together and respect and love one another. This module is meant to facilitate how it is that you are committed to the Marianist Family and to help focus your commitment.

Reflection Questions:

Excerpt from THE MISSION OF MARIANIST LAY COMMUNITIES, foundational document of the International Organization of Marianist Lay Communities.

PRESENT IN THE WORLD

1. 2.1. For us, being present in the world means attempting to know, love, and transform with the heart and the strength of Christ Jesus.
2. 2.2. We recognize everything that is good in the history of humankind and denounce everything that contributes to oppression, violence, and injustice.
3. 2.3. "Clothed in the love of our Savior and the tenderness of Mary," we concern ourselves with the joys and sufferings, the hopes and anxieties of our world.
4. 2.4. Our spirituality animates us and impels us to give realistic and effective answers to the concerns of the world by transforming the many aspects of our lives: personal, familial, occupational, social, educational, political, economic, cultural, and ecclesial.

1. Paragraph 4 above stresses that lay Marianists, in the way we live, have an impact on every aspect of the life we live. Are there specific ways that you have committed to transforming the world as part of your Marianist spirituality? Working for racial justice or environmental justice are two examples of ways you may be committed.
2. Are there ways you could deepen your commitment or stretch yourself to be more present in the world or work on another aspect of justice?
3. What is your story of commitment? How does Marianist spirituality assist you to be involved in the world or help sustain your involvement?



DISCUSS

The "Discuss" section of each module is meant to be used as a tool to foster dialogue and discussion within Marianist Lay Communities. The questions below as well as the "Reflect" questions above can be discussed and shared at a community meeting. However, these questions can still be answered by individual Lay Marianists.

Spend a moment or two viewing the opening photo that introduced this module. It is a photo of the meeting room in Fr. Chaminade's dwelling, where the first Marianist Lay Community (called Sodality in that day) met to pray and to contemplate what action the community should take after discerning the "signs of the times". They faced a culture in transition, sometimes violent, a questioning of the structures of the day, both political and religious, and a desire for a deeper spirituality.

1. How does the Marianist spirituality help you and your community face the challenges you have identified?
2. If you have a commitment ceremony in your community, does your commitment ceremony address the challenges you have identified above?
3. Our first animators believed that one's mission, and that of the community, is often lived out in the day-to-day challenges found in our local and regional communities. What do you see as the day-to-day challenges in your local and regional community? How do you respond to and live the mission in those challenges?

SHARE

The "Share" section of each module is a call to action for individual Lay Marianists and Marianist Lay Communities to share what they are learning with others in the Marianist Family and to build our collective wisdom and knowledge. Please read over the options below and choose at least one of them to share your experiences either as an individual or community.

LEARN

The “Learn” section of each module is meant to be a reflective piece for communities and individuals to bring back to themselves (often at a community meeting) after sharing their knowledge and learning with others in the Marianist Family in at least one way above in the “Share” section of this module.

What have we learned about other Marianist Lay members or Marianist Lay Communities?

This section might require you to join in conversation with another lay member or Marianist Lay Community. You can do that through attending one of the Zoom calls mentioned in the above Share section or by asking MLC-NA to pair you with an individual Lay Marianist or your MLC with another Marianist Lay Community. This will require some planning and time. But once you have planned how to meet, answer these questions:

1. How do other individuals live out their commitment as a Marianist lay person not currently connected to an MLC?
2. How do other MLCs structure themselves?
3. How are their commitments similar or different than your personal commitment or your MLCs commitment?
4. Is there anything that you learned about how different individuals or MLCs are involved in their local communities?
5. What are the general themes and challenges that individuals or MLCs face that lead them to become more intentional about mission in their local area?

ACTION



The “Action” section of each module is the culmination of the reflection, interaction, and discernment throughout the entirety of the module. This may be best explored within the time of a community meeting (and can be combined with the “Learn” section). Respond to one or more of the questions or actions provided below with your community or reflect on them as an individual Lay Marianist. **Please pay special attention to submitting an individual and/or community survey so MLC-NA can use your insights from Module 3 as we move forward.**

When you think of how you want to follow up to what you have learned, are there any specific actions that you and/or your community wishes to embrace?

1. Connection:

- 1.1. Is there any action that you want to take to be more connected with other MLCs in your region and/or the country. Who in the community will take responsibility for that action? Would it be helpful for your community to pair up with another MLC? If so, see option #2 in the above Share section.
- 1.2. Is there any action that you want to take to be more connected with another Marianist layperson? Would you find it helpful to connect regularly with the MLC-NA At-Large Member for Lay Marianist Engagement or Head of Education to learn about continued formation?

2. Communication:

- 2.1. Is it possible to be in more frequent communications with other MLCs in your region? How will that happen and who might take responsibility for this?
- 2.2. Is it possible for you to be in more frequent communications with other Marianist laity in your region?
- 2.3. Is it possible for you to be in more frequent communications with and learn more about other Marianist laity around the world, through exploring additional online resources, subscribing to global newsletters (Gifts & Tasks and Friday Magnificat) or social media sites ([IO-MLC](#))?

3. Mission arising from Challenges:

- 3.1. Are there any common challenges that you have discerned between your community and other MLCs? Is there a way for you and your community to be in touch around those common challenges?



- 3.2. Are there challenges you have discerned in your interactions with other Marianist laypersons who are connected to a Marianist Lay Community?

4. **Commitment:**
 - 4.1. What can you do inside your Marianist community/circles to commit to the charism?
 - 4.2. Are there any similar ways you and other communities celebrate commitment? Are there any possibilities concerning commitment rituals where you and other communities can communicate and collaborate more effectively?
 - 4.3. How might you celebrate your commitment to the Marianist charism? Are there rituals that might work for you or others who are unable to be part of a MLC at this time?

5. **Submit a survey response to MLC-NA so that we can collect your thoughts, insights, and actions moving forward from Module 3.**
