Module 2: To Know the Charism

Every spiritual tradition in the Church has a set of grace-filled characteristics that give life to the spirituality. The Church refers to these as a charism. Brother Tom Giardino, SM, describes these characteristics as a sign of the “Holy Spirit working in and through” the natural beliefs and talents of the founders.

We call these grace-filled characteristics our Marianist “charism.”

Charism gives each spiritual tradition its culture and “personality”—how those who follow the traditions live, work, and impact the world. There are Jesuit traditions, Benedictine traditions, Franciscan traditions and many others besides Marianist traditions. If you visit a community in these various traditions, you will find their prayer life, work life, and mission interests to be quite different, depending upon where their charism takes them. All are wonderful examples of “doorways” to God and God’s work, and they attract people to God in different ways.

You undoubtedly know that Lay Marianists come to the Marianist Family from all walks of life and with varying levels of experience and knowledge of the Marianist charism. Many things can be learned simply by belonging, but knowing the charism requires study, prayer and conversation. Over the years there have been a variety of formal and informal formation experiences. These range from programs sponsored by the Marianist Family Council of North America, the Society of Mary and Marianist institutions to self-study, community meetings on specific topics, and coursework through the North American Center for Marianist Studies. Because communities are always evolving and welcoming new members, it is possible for members to be at different places in their understanding of the Marianist charism

Regardless of your level of formation, we invite you to explore the Marianist charism.

In Module 1, *We are Called*, you learned that our Marianist spirituality is focused on the incarnation: God becoming human, and Mary showing us how to continuously bring Christ into the world. In Module 2, *To Know the Charism*, you will deeply explore the five core manifestations (or pillars) of the Marianist charism: Faith,



Mission, Mary, Community, and Inclusivity. The graphic above was created by Brian Zampier, SM to depict the five manifestations of the Marianist Charism.

It is interesting that in the North American region, “Inclusivity” is pulled out of “Community” as a pillar of its own. However, those in the International Organization of Marianist Lay Communities (IO-MLC) consider Inclusivity to be a subset under Community. IO-MLC sees inclusivity as one important way we *do* community, along with Mixed Composition, Welcoming, Hospitality, etc. Therefore they do not see that it is necessary to pull out Inclusivity as separate. However, in North America the “doorway” of Inclusivity is one that attracts many people to our spiritual tradition, especially those who sometimes feel left out of the traditional Church. For those reasons, Inclusivity is an important gift of the Holy Spirit for those of us in North America to raise up and celebrate!

At the end of Module 2, you should be able to answer these two key questions:

- **How does the Marianist charism concretely look when it is understood deeply by an individual or a community?**
- **What are the ways the Marianist charism could impact the larger Church and the world?**

The key learning experience for this module is to deeply describe each of the five manifestations of the Marianist Charism. Reflect about how each of these pillars look when a person or a community is “living” them. Then consider what impact these characteristics have on other people and systems when they are understood fully. You may also identify areas you’d like to explore more deeply to gain a fuller understanding.

Reflection Questions:

1. Which manifestation of the Marianist Charism (Faith, Mission, Mary, Community, Inclusivity) most drew you to the Marianist spirituality?
2. What pillars of Marianist life are easiest for you to understand?
3. Which pillars are most challenging for you to know and appreciate?

DISCUSS

The “Discuss” section of each module is meant to be used as a tool to foster dialogue and discussion within Marianist Lay Communities. The questions below as well as the “Reflect” questions above can be discussed and shared at a community meeting. However, these questions can still be answered by individual Lay Marianists.



1. How do you currently understand your mission and commitment to the Marianist charism?
2. Which Marianist manifestations stand out as a priority for your community or yourself?
3. Which manifestations does your community appreciate?
4. How has your community brought people closer to God?
5. What might be an area of growth for your community?

SHARE

The “Share” section of each module is a call to action for individual Lay Marianists and Marianist Lay Communities to share what they are learning with others in the Marianist Family and to build our collective wisdom and knowledge. Please read over the options below and choose at least one of them to share your experiences either as an individual or community.

LEARN

The “Learn” section of each module is meant to be a reflective piece for communities and individuals to bring back to themselves (often at a community meeting) after sharing their knowledge and learning with others in the Marianist Family after participating in one of the options in the Share section.

1. Summarize key ideas and insights you have learned from your study and discussions about the Marianist Charism.



2. What are ways the Marianist Charism could impact the larger Church and the world?
3. What aspects of the charism will you be more intentional about in the future?
4. What aspects will help your Lay Community deepen in the future?

The “Action” section of each module is the culmination of the reflection, interaction, and discernment throughout the entirety of the module. This may be best explored within the time of a community meeting (and can be combined with the “Learn” section). Respond to one or more of the questions or actions provided below with your community or reflect on them as an individual Lay Marianist. **Please pay special attention to submitting an individual and/or community survey so MLC-NA can use your insights from Module 2 as we move forward.**
