Richard Rohr's recent book, "The Universal Christ." The 15-episode season covered a wide variety of topics, but centered on the six opening themes of "The Universal Christ" shown in the picture below. These themes are gateways themselves, but my one-line summary that I was left with to ponder and celebrate over Easter was:

### "Who is Christ? And who am I (are we) because of Christ?"

These are not only the central questions for a Church grappling with a changing world but also for the Marianist Family, who takes as its model a human woman whom Love was poured so generously into that she carried Christ, and all of us *in* Christ, into this world. These are indeed mystical questions with transformative implications. As our group met week after week, it started to really sink in how *alive* Lent became when celebrated within an intentional community and discussing what it means to live in a Christ-soaked world. I often thought of Lent as a time of preparation for a death *too tragic* to understand, but this year I left feeling like what I was really preparing for all along was a new life in Christ that is still *too good* to understand. I can't thank the eleven others who joined me enough for their role in that – and I invite others to join next time!
