In 2020, we celebrate 50 years of ordaining women into ministry in the ELCA and its predecessor bodies. We celebrate 40 years of ordaining women of color and 10 years of LGBTQIA+ colleagues being able to serve freely. As part of this 50-40-10 anniversary year, we lament that women, women of color, and LGBTQIA+ individuals were barred from serving, and were bullied, dismissed and excluded. And we acknowledge that we have so much more work to do!

Today, we celebrate that we have come this far by faith, and we look to the future of professional leadership knowing that we are becoming the church in a whole new culture and context.

At our RMS Theological Conference in October 2019, we celebrated our LGBTQIA+ colleagues with stories, blessings, and worship. Today, we honor our female/femme colleagues in ministry and commemorate fifty years of faithful ministry.

A reading from Ruth chapter one

In the days when the judges ruled, there was a famine in the land, and a certain man of Bethlehem in Judah went to live in the country of Moab, he and his wife and two sons. The name of the man was Elimelech and the name of his wife Naomi and the names of this two sons were Mahlon and Chilion; they were Ephrathites from Bethlehem in Judah. They went into the country of Moab and remained there. But Elimelech, the husband of Naomi, died, and she was left with her two sons. These took Moabite wives; the name of the one was Orpah and the name of the other Ruth. When they had lived there about ten years, both Mahlon and Chilion also died, so that the woman was left without her two sons and her husband.

Then she started to return with her daughters-in-law from the country of Moab, for she had heard in the country of Moab that God had considered his people and given them food. So she set out from the place where she had been living, she and her two daughters-in-law, and they went on their way to go back to the land of Judah. But Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, "Go back each of you to your mother's house. May God deal kindly with you, as you have dealt with the dead and with me. God grant that you may find security, each of you in the house of your husband." Then she kissed them, and they wept aloud. They said to her, "No, we will return with you to your people." But Naomi said, "Turn back, my daughter, why will you go with me? Do I still have sons in my womb that they may become your husbands? Turn back, my daughters, go your way, for I am too old to have a husband. Even if I thought there was hope for me, even if I should have a husband tonight and bear sons. would you then wait until they were grown? Would you then refrain from marrying? No, my daughters, it has been far more bitter for me than for you, because the hand of the Lord has turned against me." Then they wept aloud again. Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her. So she said, "See your sister-in-law has gone back to her people and to her gods; return after your sister-in-law." But Ruth said,

"Do not press me to leave you or to turn back from following you! Where you go, I will go; Where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, your God, my God. Where you die, I will die — and there will I be buried. May the Lord do thus and so to me, and more as well, if even death parts me from you!"

Affirmation of Deacons:

The Ministry of Word and Service has New Testament roots in the ministry of *diakonia*: Pheobe and Priscilla are honored in Paul's letters; Stephen, Philip, and five others oversee the distribution of food within the church in Jerusalem; St. Lawrence, one of the seven deacons of the church in Rome was responsible for the church's treasury, and lost his head to Emperor Valerian when he refused to bring the "treasure" of the church and rather brought a collection of orphans, lepers, and beggars before the tyrant.

Although this ministry has taken different forms throughout the church's history - and many different names - its emphasis has been clear.

Those called to the ministry of word and service speak God's word to the world, and in turn they advocate for the needs of God's world to the church. They give leadership to the church's mission to witness to God's love through both words and actions. They embody Jesus' ministry of service as they work to empower their communities in faith and mutuality.

Today we recognize Ministers of Word and Service in the Rocky Mountain Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Having been called to the ministry of word and service, having been consecrated or commissioned to this ministry, we affirm that they are included on the roster of those ordained as ministers of word and service.


