...the Fall 2019 RMSWO Gathering at St. Paul Lutheran Church in Albuquerque, New Mexico was incredible! Over 50 women met to worship, visit, learn, pray, sing and EAT! After all arrived Friday evening, we enjoyed a baked potato bar meal followed by a movie – "The Staircase" – based on the true story of the miraculous staircase at the Chapel of the Sisters of Loretto Convent.

Saturday morning, we sang songs featuring the words "mystery" or "mystic." Pastors Kristi Koppel and Bre Roberts then led us in a "Team" Bible Study. The first workshop featured Gail Starr, who gave an informative and thought-provoking presentation about ABQ S.A.N.E. During lunch, we heard briefly from some of our vendors and exhibitors: Judy Messal, Joy Junction (serving families in transition), the Rape Crisis Center, S.A.N.E. and Storehouse (a local food bank).

Our Keynote Speaker was Carolyn Good, enthralling us with information about the organization "Parliament of the World's Religions." Carolyn also shared music from "Interfaith," a work in progress to become a Broadway musical. Pastors Koppel and Roberts started the final session of the Bible Study inside and then led us outdoors to the beautiful Labyrinth on the grounds of St. Paul. Laura Combs gave a passionate talk about the work that she and others do with Family Promise, an organization assisting families with children who experience homelessness. Rhonda Bentz entertained us with photos and videos of "Mysteries of the Southwest." ...what REALLY did happen to all of that hidden GOLD!?!

Dinner that evening was a plentiful buffet featuring local green chili dishes and local recipes. Our dinner speaker was Tina Kvitek with the ELCA Foundation, who gave us her best "Sherlock Holmes" impersonation and a Food-for-Thought Power Point presentation.

Evening worship and Sunday morning worship rounded out a weekend full of blessings. Read more about each event in this issue of "Views from the Rockies."

Albuquerque SANE

If you have sensitivity or are triggered by a conversation about rape and/or domestic violence, please do not read this article. This article is information shared at the Gathering

On Saturday, September 21, the Synod's RMS-WO Gathering was a full day of learning, meditating and responding about and to God's love.

The first workshop of the day was sponsored by the Albuquerque SANE program. "SANE" nurses are trained as "Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners." In Albuquerque and surrounding areas, the SANE nurses work as a unit to aid and assist all victims of sexual assault.



Gail Starr spoke passionately at the Gathering about this subject. After working as a Registered Trauma Nurse (RN) for 16 years, she is now a coordinator of the SANE program. SANE training, starting in 1976, is an international, in-

tense programing focusing on the medical aspect of sexual assault. SANE nurses are much more than a medical partner in this field. They also work closely with law enforcement.

Facts:

- All SANE services are free.
- IPV (Interpersonal Violence) is very common.
- ACE (Adverse Childhood Events mainly from domestic violence) is very common.

National Statistics:

- 1 in 4 women have been raped or rape has been attempted. Of these, 1 in 3 women are victims of domestic violence.
- 1 in 6 men have been raped or rape has been attempted. Of these, 1 in 7 men are victims of domestic violence.
- About 1 in 5 reports of abuse are sexual abuse.
- 75-80% of sexual abuse victims know their predators.

The focus of the SANE system:

- To provide education
 - o to assist the victim to know the options
- To collect forensic evidence
- To assist the victim to move from victim to survivor

- o 50% of sexual assault victims now live with PTSD. (In contrast, 15% of the military live with PTSD.)
- SANE nurses are sometimes asked to testify in court

Trauma from sexual assault:

- Anguish
- As real as any other wound
- Each person reacts and acts differently, which influences how they respond to the healthcare provider
- Each person deserves medical care
- Rape is about power and control, not sexual

More facts:

- Sexual assault victims
 - 50% live with depression
 - o 50% consider or complete suicide
 - o 61% live with PTSD

What we know about perpetrators

- Most are male
- 91-96% of men are not perpetrators
- Most 'don't look like rapists'
- Most perpetrators rape many times before they get caught
- Victims are more likely to be victimized again
- Most done by serial rapists (90-95%)
- Average age when offending begins is 13-14

Studies show that sexual assault victims under 17 years old live 20 years shorter lives than the average population.

SANE provides resources to get out of domestic violence situations safely. SANE educates both victims and the public.

Advise for how we women can help victims (known or not known to us personally):

- Start by believing, with language such as: "I believe you." "It's not your fault." "Do you want to tell me more?" "Thank you for telling me."
- Be sensitive
- Be aware of your own bias
- Offer a judgement-free zone
- Domestic violence victims mistrust the legal and the healthcare systems
- Sexual assault victims fear being judged and already feel shame
- Churches need to be aware to be a safe place; for example:
 - O Do NOT say "give me a hug." DO ASK "Can I give you a hug?"

Keynote Speaker, Carolyn Good

In 1893, leaders and followers of the world's religions gathered in Chicago, Illinois to discuss the importance of finding common ground among each other's beliefs. It would be 100 years before a similar gathering occurred!

Having been involved with the World Council of Churches, Carolyn Good was a natural fit to attend the November

2018 gathering of what is now called "Parliament of the World's Religions."

After the 1993 event, organizers and attendees realized how crucial it is to try to convene every few years. The recent "Parliaments" have taken place in the Americas, and it is hoped that countries on other



continents will be able to host future gatherings.

Carolyn described how by this time, these "Parliament" gatherings have become such huge and varied events that they require an inch-thick catalog to keep track of all that is offered over the week-long time period. Speakers and presentations about cultures, religions and beliefs were from all over the world, and all are welcomed with respect and acceptance.

Before and after her talk, Carolyn played music for us from a yet-to-be-staged Broadway musical, "Interfaith." The song themes were that we have more in common with each other than we might think!

RMSWO Gathering Bible Study Sessions

Session I:

Pastor Kristi Koppel of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Albuquerque, N.M. and Pastor Bre Roberts of Campus Ministry at UNM & CNM, Albuquerque, N.M. made their presentation using a dialogue format with a strong emphasis upon what All Faith Communities have in COMMON which pulls us together (such as, Baptism, Communion) rather than what separates us into different denominations! The example that Pastor Bre shared that even though she is a Lutheran Pastor, her husband is a Pastor of a Disciple of Christ Congregation!! Pastor Bre's emphasis as she works with Campus Ministry is the Presence of God rather than a particular way of Worship.

The Bible Study was based upon scripture as found in I Corinthians 1:10 and Ephesians 4:4-6, along with a book entitled "The Use of the Means of Grace" (1997) which was used as a resource.

Session II

The focus was upon using a Labyrinth. They shared that walking using a Labyrinth has been part of the Church for centuries, as it creates a pathway in which God can illuminate those who mediate as they walk--creating a union between God and each person. The Pastors, again, made their presentation



in a dialogue manner and stressed that as we exit to St. Paul's Labyrinth to stay focused, be prayerful, and be in a devotional mode, as based upon the scripture of Ephesians 6: 19. An added benefit of St. Paul's Labyrinth was that IF walking was not an option for anyone, there is a beautiful garden area which also has tables and benches that participants can use for mediation as well. There

was a sign on a rock at the Entrance to the Labyrinth which truly says it all!

"All are Welcome. Walk the Labyrinth. You are Not Alone. God is Love."

Family Promise by Laura Combs of Albuquerque

Family Promise (the former IHN, Interfaith Hospitality Network) is a nationwide program to help families that are homeless. The program is found in most major cities. The need for this service far outweighs the availability.

In New Mexico there are approximately 7,000 homeless children. Of the school age children, about 45% are homeless. Living paycheck to paycheck is normal for 80% of New Mexicans.

Unemployment and a lack of affordable housing are increasing the homeless population.



Family Promise has national guidelines to follow. You must have at least one child under the age of 18 in your custody, you must be able to get a driver's license, and you must be able to pass a drug test, including marijuana. They take applications over the phone, after which background checks are completed, a face-to-face interview with more questions about their current situation occurs, and then the family is put on a waiting list. The family must then wait for another family to get back on their feet

before they are chosen to enter the program. Depending on the family, most are in the program for 3 - 6 months until they have found their footing and are able to manage without assistance from Family Promise. The office still stays in contact with the families for at least 2 years to make sure they are doing well.

The families are housed at area churches for a week at a time. Albuquerque has 18 churches that open their Sunday School rooms for bedrooms and their Fellowship halls for meals. They also have 7 helper churches that provide meals, fellowship, and other needs. The 4 or so families are fed an evening meal and breakfast. During the day, the families can go to the Day House to use the computer to look for jobs or let the kids play. Lunch is on their own but some churches have enough leftovers for the families to use. Every penny that they save means less time until they are on their own again.

While families are in the program, counseling on financial matters, parenting classes, skill classes, mock interviews, and many more opportunities improve their lives and their ability to lead a stable life for their families.

Family Promise has been given some mobile homes that they have refurbished and then offered to some of the families as permanent homes. The family pay a small mortgage fee each month to help defray the cost of the refurbishing (done by volunteers).

Family Promise also has an eviction prevention service that provides some money for applicants to help pay rent, thus helping to prevent eviction and homelessness. This is a one-time only service and the money goes fast per quarter.

Family Promise has been a lifesaver for many families over the years and they are proud to offer their services to those in need. For those who call on us and don't fit the requirements the office staff will give out names and phone numbers of other services in the area that may be able to help the caller.

Current for Curran Project

Curran Hospital is a Lutheran hospital located in Lofa County, Zorzor, Liberia, about 200 miles from capital city, Monrovia. The hospital has 125 beds,

outpatient services, a school of nursing and supervision for 23 community health centers and clinics. Lutheran women have been supporting Curran Hospital for over 100 years.

Reliable energy supply is necessary for quality health care delivery. In Liberia, where less than 1% of the population

has access to the electricity grid. Generating needed power at rural hospitals literally is a life-or-death scenario. Solar presents an opportunity for a more reliable energy supply—more reliable for the hospital and the many people it serves. Curran is the only mission hospital that also serves as the Government

of Liberia's referral and teaching hospital in Lofa County.

The project at Curran will cost \$593,000, and as of

August 5 \$233,000 is still needed by the end of November. Please continue to spread the word and encourage folks to donate.

Ribbon Jello

You will need:

A double boiler

Several bowls

1 pkg. unflavored gelatin

1 cup sugar

1 cup cream

1 cup sour cream

½ cup cold water

Flavored jello

Directions: Mix sugar and cream in the top of a double boiler; when

thoroughly mixed add water and unflavored gelatin. (I usually use my measuring cup to mix these together first.)

Cook for 12-15 minutes stirring frequently. Take off heat and beat in sour cream. Set this on a counter so it doesn't gel too quickly.

Make your jello according to package directions. Pour jello into several bowls, or whatever containers you wish. <u>Let each layer gel completely before adding the next one</u>. Alternate the



"creamy layer" with any of your favorite layers. It takes 45 minutes to an hour for each layer to gel completely.

NOTE: This recipe came from a cookbook put out by The Children's Friend Society of Michigan. My mother made this at Christmas time with red & green jello. I have used reds, oranges, and yellows for Thanksgiving and combined several various colors to make pastel colors for Easter. Diane Remer-Thamert, St. Paul Lutheran Church, Albuquerque, New Mexico. 
